The Santa Anna Mountaineer Basketball boys won easily over the Early Longhorns Tuesday night by a score of 45-33. At the half the local boys had a 17 point lead and coasted the last half, with the coach doing considerable substituting, playing every boy suited out. Doyle McIver was high point man, scoring a total of 16 points.

Funeral services were held at the Santa Anna Church of Christ on Wednesday, December 29th, at 3:00 p. m. for D. L. Davis, who died after a long illness, on Tuesday morning, in the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Otis Jackson. Bro. George Hughes, Church of Christ minister of Blanket, officiated at the service.

Mr. Davis was born April 14, 1885 at Llano and was 90 years, 8 months and 14 days old at the time of death.

The 15th annual Santa Anna FFA and 4-H Club Livestock Show will be held at the Livestock Show Barn, located near the Santa Anna High School, Friday, January 7. Entries in the show will be on display all day long and judging will begin at 1:30 p. m.

J. A. Gray, with the Extension Service of San Angelo, will judge the fat lambs and fat steers in the show and Charles Sargent, Vocational Agriculture teacher of Bangs, will judge the fat barrows.

About \$400 has been set aside as premium money for the entries in the show. This money is derived from the Santa Anna Livestock Association. Money is raised through membership dues alone. Again the directors of the organization have decided not to hold an auction sale here. Most of the lambs that will be sold will be sold at the County Show, to be held January 17 and 18.

All entries of the local show will go to the county show. Reports indicate that 535 lambs have been entered in the county show and a good number of steers and barrows are also entered.

During the past few years competition in the local show has been about as keen as in the larger shows of the state. Most of the top winners here have been shown to the top places in the county show and also the larger shows of the state. A number of the boys plan to take their lambs to the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show the last of this month.

### Farm Families And Social Security

Editor's note: This is the first in a series of articles prepared for farm families by R. R. Tuley, District Manager of the Social Security Administration Office in Abilene.

Farmers, farm workers, ranchers, ranch hands, cotton ginners and their employees, and most other folks who make their living from what might be termed agricultural enterprise, make up the largest single group added to the Social Security family by the 1954 Amendments.

Because of the size of this group, and because the weekly newspaper is an excellent source of information, this series of short articles on how the farm family is affected by the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act has been prepared. Those who save this and following articles will have a ready reference source for most questions that may arise as to what actions are necessary by the self-employed farmer and his employees to comply with this compulsory coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the Social Security Act. Accurate actions now can mean accurate and complete benefits within the framework of the law later; incorrect or incomplete actions at this time might mean loss of benefits otherwise due an individual and his family.

Mention will be made in later articles of the desire of your Social Security representatives that everyone know fully both his rights and his responsibilities under this Federal family insurance system, from which some 7 million persons are now receiving regular monthly checks based on the record of a retired or deceased individual who was insured by reason of his earnings record. This series, thanks to the cooperation of this newspaper, is one means of informing persons in this area. Writing or visiting your Social Security office is another. Asking for a free booklet on the subject or question that most directly affects you is still another. Following articles will deal with coverage provisions for the farmer and his employees, definitions of farm earnings, benefit provisions; things that need to be done now, seasonal employees, the sharecropper and his standing as self-employed or employee, and eligibility for receiving monthly checks.

Although directed primarily to farm families, much of the information in this series as to eligibility for benefits, amounts, reporting requirements for the self-employed farmer, etc., will also be of interest to architects, engineers, and accountants. They, too, will come into the Social Security family in 1955. Readers with questions are urged to send them to the Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas.

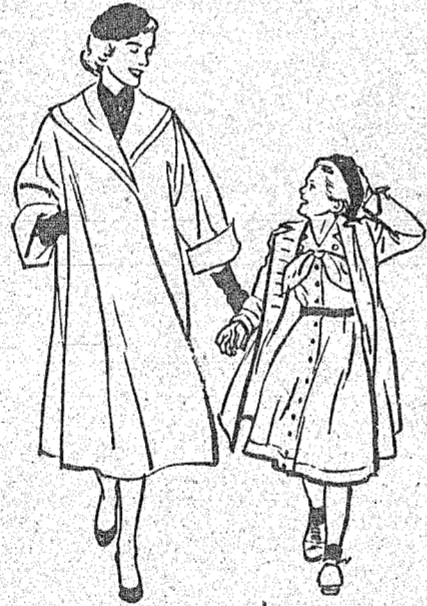

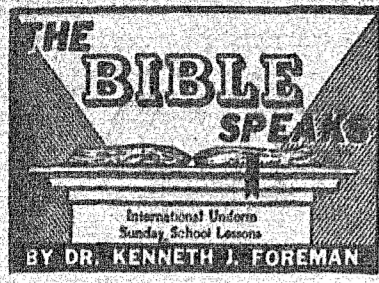

### The Living God

Lesson for January 9, 1955

FOR the next three months the Sunday school lessons will go into the great Christian doctrines. Christian churches are basically agreed about these doctrines. You can go into a church and hear a sermon about the Living God, or about the Holy Spirit, or about Christ, and hardly be able to tell what the denomination of the minister is, from the sermon. Various churches have written creeds, which are their official interpretation of Scripture. But since these lessons to come are concerned with the Bible rather than with formal creeds, this column will not set forth the special views, if any, of particular churches, but will rather try to point out some of the truths which we all hold in common, and which we derive from the revelation we find in the Scripture.

The Bible nowhere tries to prove that God exists. If I were talking to you or writing you a letter I would not waste time trying to tell you that I am a real person. So the Word of God simply assumes that God IS. But that is not nearly enough for a vital faith. Suppose God just IS, like the law of gravitation or the binomial theorem in algebra—quite real but completely blind and uncaring? Suppose he just IS, like the other side of the moon, always there but never to be seen? Suppose God IS, like a block of granite which can be worked on but never does any work? No—by no means! The God of the Bible is the Living God, one who does things. Read for example the first book in the Bible, Genesis. Who is the principal character? Not Adam, not Noah, not Abraham or Joseph, but God. The story of the Bible is the story of the "mighty acts of

God." Only the living God can help living men.

#### God Is Spirit

The Greek of John 4:24 can be translated just as correctly "God is Spirit" as "God is a Spirit," and scholars mostly believe the first translation better conveys the meaning. This does not mean you can turn the sentence around and say "Spirit is God." You are spirit, but you are not God. The great dividing line in existence is not between spirit and matter. It is between the one, the only, Creator-Spirit, God on the one side; and created-spirit and created-matter, on the other side. As Creator-Spirit, we can be sure of some facts about God. One is that he is not and does not have a physical body. If he had a body he would (like all bodies) have to be in only one place at one time. If he had a body he would be limited by his body as we all are. But being Spirit he can be, and is, everywhere. Because he is Spirit, Paul can say he is not far from each one of us . . . in him we live and move and are.

#### God Is Father

The Old Testament tells us much about God, but the New Testament tells us more. It is only rarely that God is called "Father" in the Old Testament, but in the New, we find Jesus using the word "Father" about God more than any other one word. There is a sense in which God is Father of all men—a more intimate sense in which God is Father of Christ and of Christians. Consider the words which would have been just as easy to use in beginning the Lord's Prayer: O creator . . . O Lord Most High . . . Almighty God . . . King of Kings . . . Judge of all the earth . . . But Jesus passes by all those and teaches us to say simply "Our Father" when we speak to the Almighty.

#### The Father and I Are One

Most important, most distinctively Christian, of all truths that we learn about God in the Bible, is summed up in Jesus' words: "The Father and I are one." The original Greek shows that Jesus did not mean to say he and his Father are one person, one individual; but he did mean to say that if we want to see God we must look into the face and into the mind and heart of Jesus. As Paul later said, we see the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. Christians who have given great thought to these things are agreed that any idea of God, any notion we may have about him, must be brought to the test of Jesus Christ. The least we can say is that God is Christ-like.

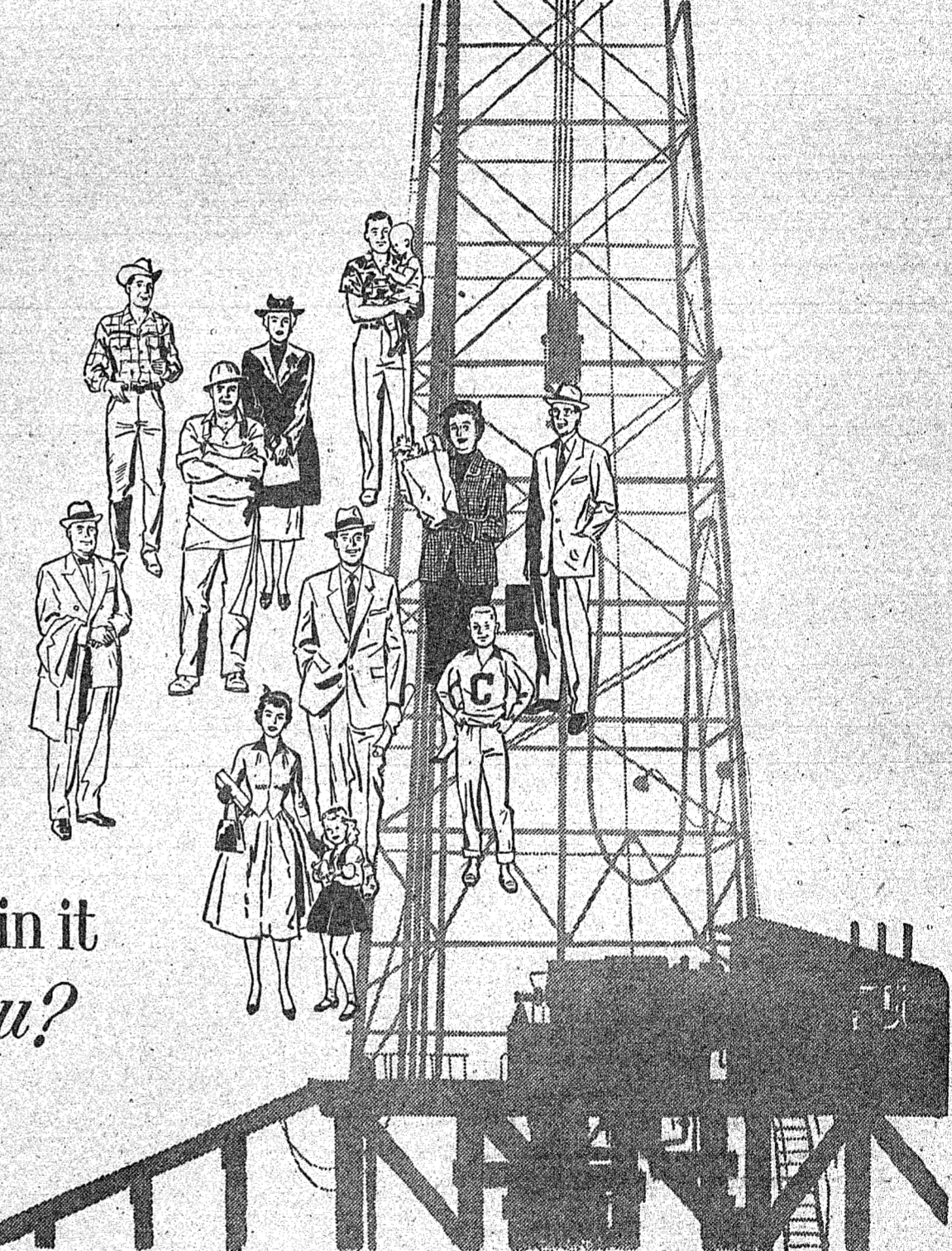

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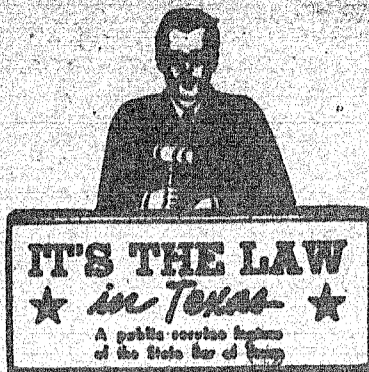

**STATUTORY COPYRIGHT LAW EXPLAINED**

Copyrights are of two types: Common Law and Statutory. In general, the common law copyright protects unpublished works and the statutory copyright protects published works. The following discussion applies to published works and the statutory copyright.

The United States copyright statutes give to authors, composers, and artists the exclusive right to their published works for a period of twenty-eight years. During that time others are prohibited from copying or reprinting such works without permission of the copyright owner. Statutory copyrights are renewable once for a second twenty-eight years.

Works that may be protected under our copyright laws include books (not only bound volumes, but also pamphlets, leaflets and even single sheets); periodicals (newspapers, magazines, reviews, bulletins, proceedings of societies, serial publications, etc., which appear at regular intervals of less than a year); contributions of periodicals, lectures, sermons or addresses prepared for oral delivery, musical compositions and dramatic or dramatic-musical compositions.

Also maps; works of art, models or designs for works of art; published three dimensional works of art; reproductions of works of art; drawings or plastic works of scientific or technical character; photographs; prints and pictorial illustrations including prints (advertisements) or labels used for articles of merchandise; motion picture photoplays; and pictures other than photoplays.

The principal steps to be taken in securing a statutory copyright include (1) properly marking the work with a notice of copyright, (2) publishing the work, and then (3) filing with the Register of Copyrights in Washington an application for registration of the copyright. A relatively small fee and a specified number of copies of the work must accompany the application.

It should be noted that the marking must precede publication, and that both of these steps must precede the filing of the application.

Failure to incorporate the notice of copyright before publication or to set it up in proper form or to place it in the proper place on the works will result in abandonment to the public of the claimant's rights. He will lose his copyright. Requirements vary in respect to the form of

the notice, and the place on the works at which it should appear—depending on the nature of the works, whether they are published or unpublished, and other factors.

On some works it is mandatory that the notice contain the word "Copyright" or the abbreviation "Copr.": on certain other works, the letter "C" enclosed within a circle may be used instead. On some marks the notice must include the year in which the work was first published.

In every notice the copyright claimant must be identified. In some cases the full name of the claimant is required; in others the initials or monogram, or an identifying mark or symbol, is sufficient. The name or mark may be that of the creator of the work, or of one to whom the copyright has been assigned.

Here is an example to show the effect of a copyright: A copyright on a map of Texas does not preclude another from publishing a map of Texas, provided he gets his information from original sources. The copyright does preclude another from copying the map protected by copyright. Further, the copyright law does not normally protect titles as such, nor abstract ideas, but rather the copyright grants the right to preclude others from copying an expression of an abstract idea.
