Coleman Features Industrial Week

Most of the manufacturing concerns of Coleman County will have displays in the show room of the Jobe Buick Company, in Coleman on Tuesday and Friday of this week. Each of the displays will feature products manufactured in the county, in cooperation with Industrial Week.

School Board Employs New Head Coach

Joe Van Breeman, head coach of the Strawn High School for the past three years, was employed as the head coach for the Santa Anna High School, at a meeting of the Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees on Tuesday night.

Van Breeman, 29, is married and has one son, 2½ years of age. All his coaching experience has been at Strawn, where he won one game his first year, six his second year and nine his third year. The only game he lost last year was when his quarterback was out because of an injury.

He is a graduate of the Port Neches High School and attended Lamar Tech at Beaumont. He received his degree from North Texas State College at Denton. He has a BA Degree with a major in Physical Education and a minor in Industrial Arts.

Van Breeman will replace D. W. Behrens, who has accepted the head coaching position with the Coahoma Schools. He plans to move in the summer.

Very Light Vote In Both Elections

A very light turnout was noted in both the School Election on Saturday and in the City Election on Tuesday.

In the School Election D. S. Baugh and Jesse K. Barton were elected to the local Board of Trustees and W. F. Barnes was re-elected to the County Board from Precinct Two.

In the City Election on Tuesday, Dr. Charles M. Henner was re-elected as Mayor and Hardy Blue, Tom Hays, Robert L. Markland and Ben W. Yarborough were re-elected to the City Council. Claude L. Hodges was elected to the City Council.

Fifty-four votes were cast and Yarborough received the most, 53 votes. Markland and Hays each received 51 votes, Henner 50 votes, Blue 49 votes and Hodges 44 votes. Preston Bailey, not seeking re-election to the Council, received nine write-in votes and 14 person received one write-in vote each.

School Board To Present Polio Vaccine to Parents

The Santa Anna School Board voted Tuesday night to authorize the vaccination of all students of the First and Second Grades, provided the new vaccine is recognized by the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis.

Cards will be sent to all the parents of students in the two grades, for them to give their consent for the vaccination. Only on the parents consent will this be done. The report from the National Foundation is due about the 12th of April.

Dr. Charles M. Henner, president of the Coleman County Medical Association said the vaccinations would be given either at the hospital or the school, whichever is more convenient for the school. Dr. Henner said the vaccination must be administered by a doctor.

He said all persons between the ages of 6 months and 30 years should have the vaccination. The cost will be \$3.00 per shot or \$9.00 for the series. Anyone desiring these shots should notify their doctors several days in advance because the supply is rather short at the present time.

The vaccinations will be given the students of the First and Second grades free of charge, with the serum being furnished by the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis.

Senior Class To Do Days Work For Benny Jack Garrett

The Senior Class of the Santa Anna High School will sponsor a "You Name It, We Do It" day for Benny Jack Garrett on Saturday, April 23rd. Proceeds derived on this day will be contributed to the purchase of a special built wheel chair for Benny Jack, who has been a polio patient since last August and he plans to return to Santa Anna to graduate with his class.

Plans call for anyone in this community who wants to employ a boy or a girl for an hour or all day, to telephone the school, telephone number 12, on Thursday or Friday, April 21 and 22, and let them know what you want done and on Friday afternoon the class will have a meeting and assign members to jobs they will do on Saturday. Those who will need the workers to furnish any equipment to work with are requested to be sure and notify the class before hand, otherwise the workers will expect you to furnish all the needed equipment.

The class is not setting any price on their labor. You just pay them what you feel they are entitled to, knowing all the money will go toward the purchase of the special wheel chair which is expected to cost more than \$400.

Mr. Garrett is doing the finishing on the room now and it is expected to be completed in the near future. The inside of the room is being finished in knotty pine and will be very beautiful. 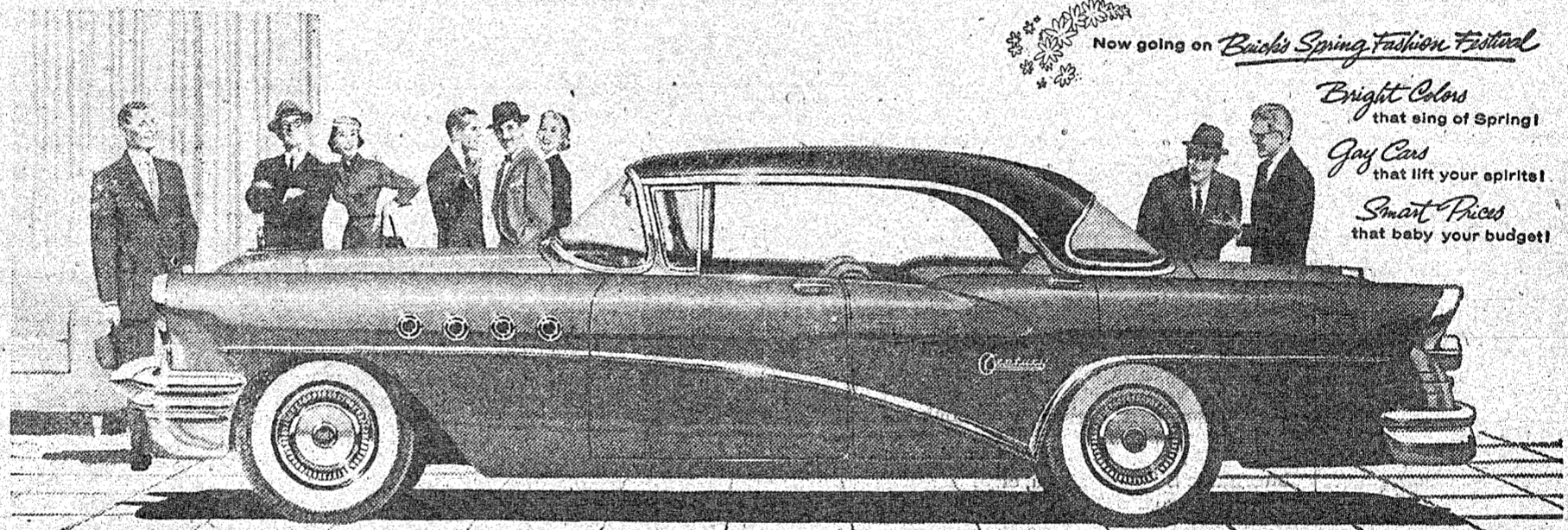

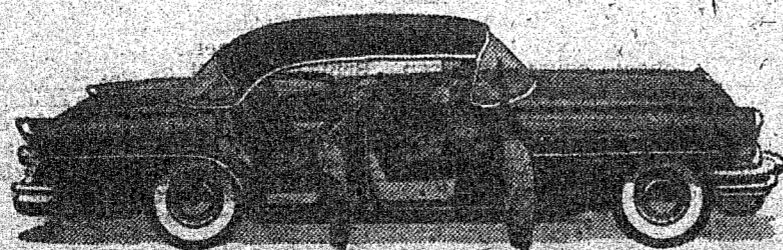

There are two scenes we may look at and see ourselves in a religious sense. The first scene is an upper room on the night after Calvary; a little group of men are gathered behind bolted doors. Dazed and bewildered they muse in silence, too heart-

broken to speak, to benumbed in soul to pray. The world has almost come to its end. Fate has beaten them, defeat encompassed them. Do you see yourself here? Has the drought, dust and the world situation encompassed you? Have you gathered your little possessions around you and bolted the doors in fear that you have just about reached the end of your rope? Do you find yourself dazed and bewildered that you can not speak a word of

kindness? Is your soul too benumbed to pray any more?

Look at the other scene; it dates a few weeks later. The same group of men composes it. But they are not sulking behind closed doors now! They are abroad in the streets! Their words ring like trumpets. They shout a message to which the world must listen! They are now fearless and triumphant. They are resolved on the conquest of the earth! The misery of blasted hopes is opposed to the valor of the saints; a fumbling, futile remnant, to a marching, militant Church. Why this great transformation in the brief span of time?

Because between the two scenes there was another to interpret the contrast: CHRIST HAD RISEN.

Christ is alive today! And if you will allow Him to enter into your bolted door of faith the windows of Heaven will be opened and God will pour out a blessing that you can not contain. Easter can make a difference in your life. When that difference comes you will go as did Mary and say to others, "Come with me, I have seen the Master." Let Jesus come into your heart, just now, reject Him no more. Easter is the difference between death

Social Security April Schedule Visits Announced

Several changes in the pattern of bringing the services of the Social Security office to the people in the sixteen counties in the Abilene district were announced this week by R. R. Tuley, Jr., Manager.

"We have attempted to set up a schedule that will serve the people in this area economically and yet as frequently as possible. At the same time, we hope by these changes to make the flow of new claims through the district office more uniform and thereby insure that each case gets prompt attention and action," Tuley added.

"Were it not for the voluntary cooperation and aid given by the County Commissioners in providing us with free space to meet the Brown county residents," he went on, "it would probably be necessary for many of them to make a trip to Abilene to transact their business with us. Most people are now directly affected by the Old-Age and Survivors

and the Resurrection. Which scene are you in now? Easter can change the scene of your life.

Insurance provisions of the Social Security law, as the 1954 Amendments are estimated to have put nine out of every ten workers and self-employed persons with this system of Federal insurance."

"We are particularly anxious that claims be filed for children or by aged-65 widows of persons who died before September 1, 1950, whose claims were denied under the law then in effect because of not enough time in Social Security employment. The Amendments will now permit payment if the deceased had at least six quarters of coverage to his credit."

Ralph T. Fisher, Asst. District Manager of the Abilene office will be at the Commissioners Court Room in Brownwood at 1:00 o'clock on April 13, and again on April 27th.

Electricity Can't Think — But You Can

A rattlesnake warns his intended victim of danger by a loud rattling of his tail coils. Unfortunately, power lines can't voice their peril. But those slender wires that blend so well into the background hold a death warrant for farm drivers who don't know — or don't watch the danger signs.

What are the signs? And what are the hazards? First of all, most overhead lines are built so that they will clear the average load. Telephone and power companies, however, cannot be expected to provide clearance for the remarkably high loads that are sometimes moved down our rural roads.

A driver whose load just touches the wire is right in the middle of a ton of dynamite! He may not know it, but his entire load and truck itself are charged with high voltage electricity — which can't go anywhere be-

cause the rubber tires are good insulators. The minute he opens the door and steps out, however, and any part of him still has contact with the truck, the voltage is grounded — thru his body. He's learned his lesson — but too late.

A second hazard involves a rider on top of a high load. The breeze feels good and the ride is exciting — and chances are he isn't watching, nor even aware that his life is in danger. If he's lucky enough to escape being killed as the wire jerks him off the load, you may be sure that he'll have plenty of time to think about what he "should have done" — during a long recovery.

Or consider a sagging wire. Many different things can cause an energized wire to sag dangerously low. Perhaps a pole has broken or leaned over. Perhaps the wire has broken some distance away, causing unusual slack. Perhaps a tree limb has fallen and pulled the wires down dangerously low. Such incidents

not only create the hazard of physical obstruction, but a deadly electrical hazard as well, when the low-hanging wires remain energized.

What must be done — after the sagging wire is spotted? The first move, of course, must be to report it immediately to the proper authorities. Keep away from it yourself and if you must leave, place someone on guard to warn others. Some people have the dangerous idea that if they touch only one wire at a time they'll be safe. This isn't true — especially of high voltage wires.

If a high load must be moved, get an accurate measurement of the height and then check your plans with the local electric system and telephone company. Above all, make certain that no one rides on top of the load.

Whether you're a truck driver, a motorist, a Sunday stroller — low-hanging power lines offer a potential danger. Electricity can't think — but you can!

Hollywood's Davy Crockett and cherry blossoms tied for top interest in Washington last week, and it looked to me like Davy came out on top.

Sparkling in brilliant sunlight, Washington's famous Japanese cherry blossoms came into their own at the Tidal Basin as the annual Easter festival got under way.

But such attractions did not dim the fervor of the thousands who eagerly sought a glimpse of Walt Disney's version of the legendary frontiersman, who in real life is Fess Parker. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Fess Parker, Sr., of Brownwood and reared in San Angelo, Hollywood's newest star spent three busy days in the Capitol City, a guest of the National Rifleman's Association.

"Loaned" for the occasion by Walt Disney whose studio in Hollywood is soon to complete the movie "Davy Crockett—King of the Wild Frontier," the 6-foot 5 Texan — handsome, stalwart and modest — came in on American Airlines' "Davy Crockett Special."

Thousands of children swarmed around their idol. The next day as he strode through the capitol corridors — where ex-Congressman Davy Crockett once walked — tourists' cameras clicked and buzzed. In fringed buckskin, power horn and a long rifle made in the 1840s, Parker was a hit all the way.

His only recording in song thus far, "The Ballad of Davy Crockett," produced by Disneyland's TV show, has already sold a million. His rise to fame has exceeded anything seen in movieland in modern times.

Fess told me the movie in which he portrays the immortal Crockett will be released in June, and the premiere will be in San Antonio, home of the Alamo. Parker will be there in person for the event.

I went to the hotel to see Parker shortly after his arrival. Having known him well since his early childhood, I, of course, took great pride in joining in the tumultuous welcome which he received here.

On Thursday he was honored at a luncheon at the House of Representatives, attended mostly by Texas and Tennessee Members. Following the luncheon there was a scramble for joint TV and radio appearances with the modern prototype of the Tennessee frontiersman: Senator Kefauver, Gore and Price Daniel all got in a few minutes each, and I wangled a 15-minute radio interview for my weekly radio

program that goes to five stations in our district. Rugged, yet self-effaced, Parker emits inspiration everywhere he goes. It is clear that his great fame has not "gone to his head". He will instill into the hearts of millions that spark of character and sincerity which symbolizes the life of the great hero he so well portrays.

Funeral services were held here Tuesday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock in the First Baptist Church, for John Frank Brown, who was found dead Sunday at noon next to a fence he had been repairing. "WATER EVAPORATION STUDIES IN TEXAS" TITLE OF NEW PUBLICATION

College Station — A complete tabulation of information available on rainfall and water evaporation in Texas is given in a recent joint publication of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The 83-page bulletin, "Water Evaporation Studies in Texas," also contains information on proper installation and operation of evaporation stations, and discuss procedures and coefficients to use in converting pan evaporation losses to natural or reservoir losses.

Studies of evaporation show that over long periods storage reservoirs may yield for useful purposes as little as 50 percent of total water impounded — the rest is lost to evaporation, says the publication.
