





Suppose a person who has come down to that wretched conclusion sees on out through the curtain of death into the beyond,-facing the prospect of endless existence, still seeing nothing but the contemptible within and without? What worse hell could be needed than that? So in the New Testament, immortality, as such, the mere prospect of personal surviwal after death, -is never held out something to be desired in Axed. Eternal life, life that endures beyond death, is desirable maly when the person who looks Exeward to it already possesses eternal life, as a changed and mew life.
