Polio Vaccine **Accepted**; Shots To Be Given Soon

The widely discussed Salk Polio Vaccine was accepted Tuesday as successful, announced Dr. Thomas Francis of the University of Michigan. The vaccine was administered to 1,800,000 children last spring and results show it to be 80 to 90 percent effective, which is about as effective as any vaccine.

Dr. Salk said the vaccine is safe and that no vaccine has ever been 100 percent effective. He pointed out that the vaccine seems to be more effective in children six years of age and older. He said only two shots were needed instead of three as previously announced. The two shots are to be followed in seven months by a booster shot, which Dr. Salk believes will give pro-tection for years, possibly life.

The vaccine will be administered to all students of the first and second grades free of charge, provided the parents authorize it. Cards have been sent to all the local parents and Mr. Green, Superintendent of Schools, requests parents to please get the cards back to the teachers as soon as possible. At the present time, it is not known exactly when the shots will be given, but it is expected to be in the very near future.
