### New Law Permits **Monthly Payments Formerly Denied**

Did the breadwinner of your family die after June 30, 1940, and before September 1950?

R. R. Tuley, Jr., Manager of the Abilence District Office of the Social Security Administration, states that the 1954 Amendments now provide monthly payments to many people who previously were not eligible to receive Social Security Insurance benefits, if the deceased worker had at least 6 quarters of coverage (11/2 years of work covered by the law).

This new insurance provision applies only in " death cases, where the worker or a World War II veteran died before September 1950 and did not have sufficient social security credits under the law at that time for payments to be made to his survivors at the time of death. Tuley believes there are several hundred such families in the area the Abilene office services who do not know of this change.

If the breadwinner of your tamily died before September 1950 and you are not receiving 13, 1955, at 5:15 a. m., weighing monthly social security benefits, 6 lbs. and 10 ozs. you should contact your Social Security Office immediately if you are:

age of 18, or 3 A child under the age of 18 unmarried, or

News From The State **Health Department** 

Austin - Mental disorders today represent a major public health problem. Nearly fifty per cent of all hospital beds are oc-cupied by patients with mental illness, declares Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. But it is estimated that in addition to these, at least one in ten in the general population is

suffering from an emotional illness sufficiently disabling to interfere with work and family life. Both severe and minor mental illness appear to stem from organic causes, psychological causes, or a combination of the two.

Much progress has been made in reducing the amount of mental illness due to organic disorders. At one time, 10% of mental hospital beds in the south were occupied by patients whose mental illness was due to pellagra. Today, with improved understanding of nutrition, such cases are almost unknown.

Fifteen- years ago, a large number of mental hospital patients suffered from "general paresis," or central nervous system syphilis." Today, due to strides made in control and prevention of syphilis, less than 2% of mental hospital admissions are patients with general pare-

Only since World War II have extensive efforts been made in prevention of mental illness due primarily to psychological fac-tors. Much additional research is needed here, as well as with organic factors.


