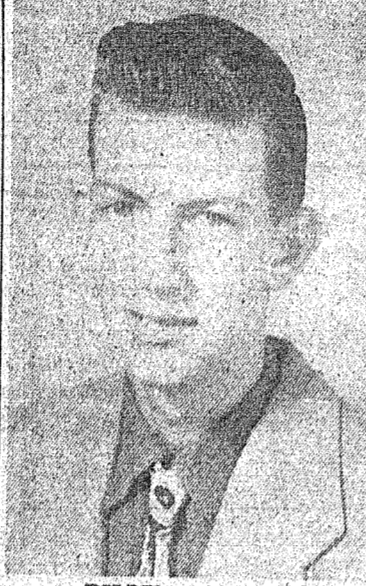

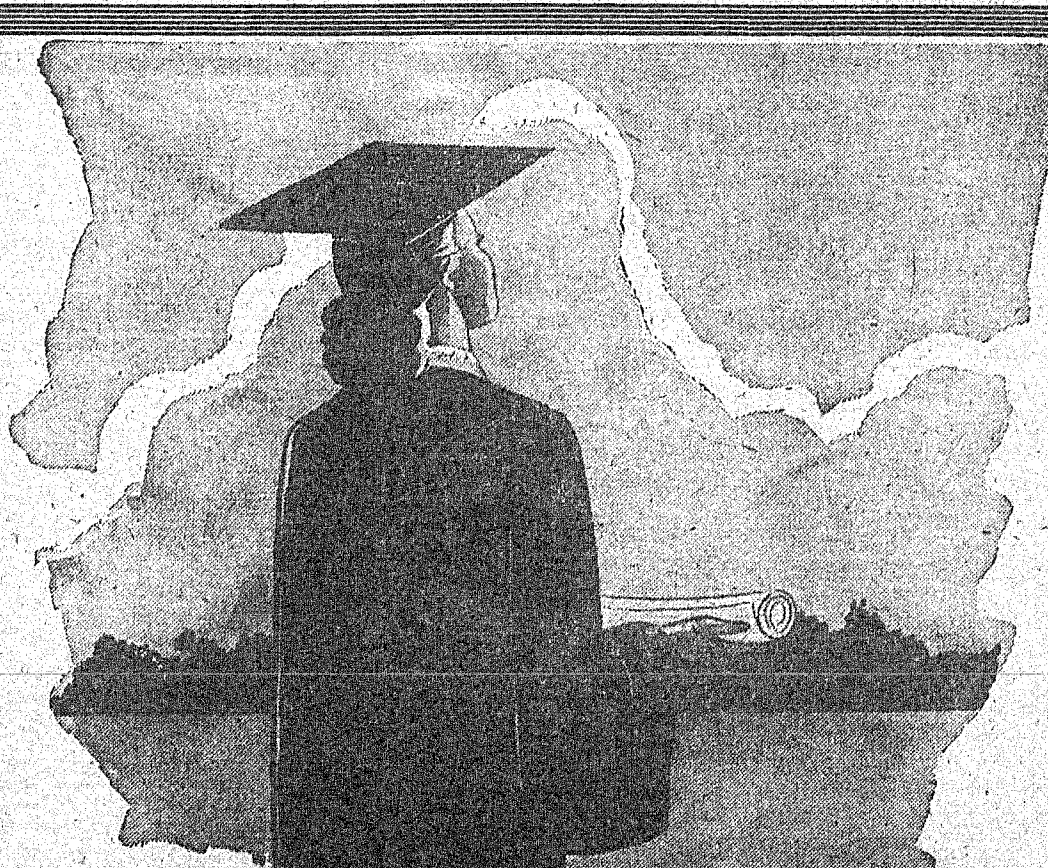

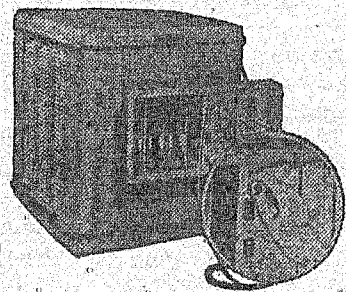
20th Century Club Has All-Day Meeting

Prophecy Of The Senior Class, 1955

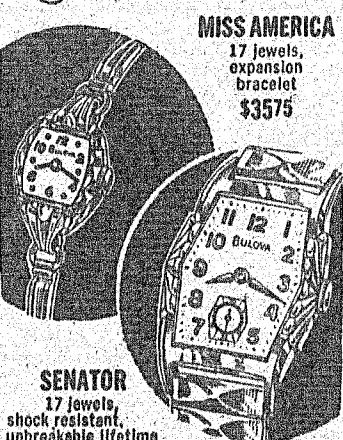

J. E. Hickman Dies At Bangs, Buried In Oklahoma Friday

J. E. Hickman, who organized the first High School in Santa Anna, died at 6:30 Thursday morning, at the home of Mrs. John Wofford in Bangs, after an illness of several months. Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church, in Coleman, at 3:00 p. m., on Friday, May 13th, with Rev. R. E. Streetman, church pastor, and Rev. W. B. Broadway, Bangs pastor, jointly officiating. Mr. Hickman was a member of

the Baptist Church and Masonic Lodge. He was born at Reagan, Texas. He was 82 years old when death claimed him. After attending the National Normal University, at Lebanon, Ohio, he came to Santa Anna in 1894, where he was Superintendent of schools until 1897. That year he was married.

Leaving Santa Anna, he went to Nashville, Tennessee, where he gained a Masters degree at Peabody University. In 1902 he and wife moved to Coleman where he was Superintendent of schools until 1917. After leaving Coleman he was with the schools at Ada and Cushing, Okla., and later was with the agriculture department at Stillwater.

After the death of his wife he returned to Coleman County to live with his nephew, John Wofford, and wife, southeast of Santa Anna. After Mr. Wofford's death, he continued to live in the home of Mrs. Wofford. After he became ill, she bought a home in Bangs and they moved there.

Santa Anna friends are glad to know Mr. Hickman was able to attend both of the Home Comings of the Santa Anna Ex-Students' Association. At the one held last October, he was honored with a tea, which was largely attended. He made an interesting talk.

Final rites for Mr. Hickman were held Saturday at 3:00 p. m. at Stillwater, Okla., and burial was in a cemetery there.

He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Curran Pieratt, of Santa Anna, and a number of nieces and nephews.

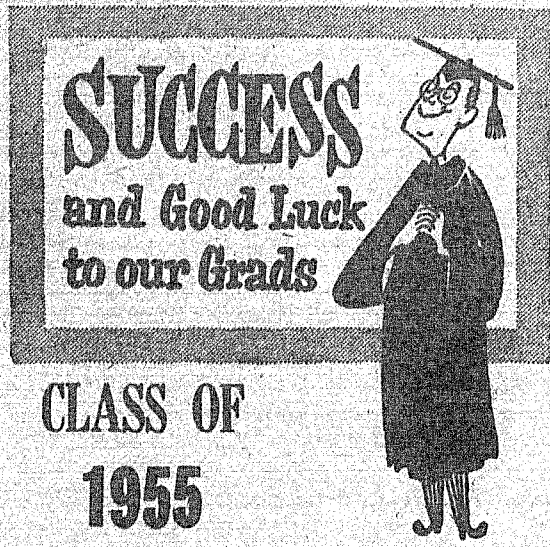

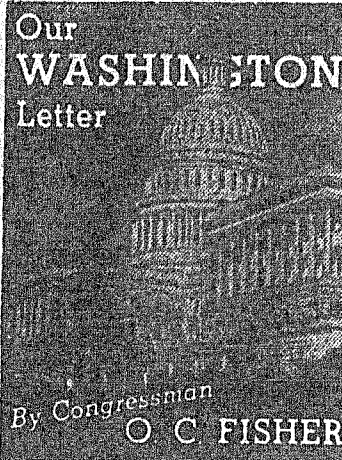

GO TO CHURCH SUNDAY



The House turned on the
steam last week and took action
on several important measures,
including the Postal Pay Bill, the
military appropriation bill, and
the proposal to admit Hawaii
and Alaska to statehood.

The military bill assures a con-
tinued powerful defense estab-
lishment costing \$31 billion
plus carry-over of funds pre-
viously appropriated. The same
bill included what is called a
"sleeper" or rider which would
keep the Government in busi-
ness operations which can and
should be contracted out to pri-
vate industry. I voted against
the rider, though it was retained.
It will probably be knocked out
by the Senate, since untold mil-
lions can be saved by allowing
such contracting to take place
as is desired by the Defense De-
partment.

That Statehood bill, which
this time included both Hawaii
and Alaska in the same package,
was decisively defeated by a
majority of 48 votes. I voted
against statehood. Alaska is sim-
ply not yet financially able to
afford the cost of maintaining a
state government, and Hawaii
needs to do some house cleaning.
While most Hawaiians are good

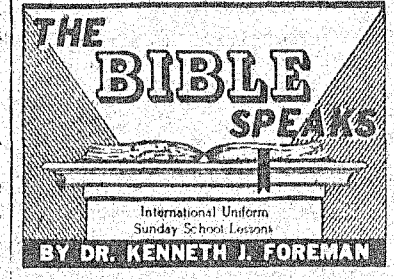
patriotic people, it is a fact that
Harry Bridges' labor union, com-
pletely communist-dominated,
maintains a strangle-hold over
the Territory's economy, and,
according to former Governor
Stainback of Honolulu, now
Supreme Court Judge out there,
says it would be dangerous to
our national security to admit
that group of Pacific Islands,
and grant statehood status.

There are two or three alter-
natives to meet the charge,
which has some validity, of
"taxation without representa-
tion." One is to give the islands,
when and if they clean house, a
commonwealth status — com-
parable to Canada's relationship
to the British Isles (with our
military bases retained), or let

Hawaii become a part of the
State of California.

Last week the House Agricul-
ture Committee turned thumbs
down on bills to allow a little
extra cotton acreage to counties
which have two successive crop
failures because of the drouth.
This would have upped the na-
tional allotment by less than
one-half of one percent and
would have done justice to a
group who have certainly added
nothing in recent years to the
cotton surplus. But despite the
efforts of several of us, the Com-
mittee decided against any in-
crease at this stage.

Odd isn't it, that a feller can
reach a greater height if he has
more depth.

Reconciliation

Lesson for May 22, 1955

THERE are only three possi-
bilities when two persons or
groups are lined up on opposite
sides of a fence. It may be a
family quarrel, a national crisis,
a split in a church, a community
fight. . . . Whatever be the cause,
whatever the "fence" may be,
there are really only three ways
the two factions can be related
to each other. One is the way of
hostility. They can cut off all com-
munication; they can refuse to
hear any good of each other; they
can harp on past wrongs; they can
open a shooting war. Another way
is that of compromise. They can
each agree to something neither of
them wants, in order to keep the
other one from getting what he
does want. One side can yield to
the other not because of any
friendliness but only because of
fear.

Reconciliation
The trouble with both these
ways is that either one of them
leaves the two parties just where
they were. Hostilities (cold or
hot) harm both sides. Compromise
for selfish reasons actually brings
the parties no closer together; they
will stay together only so long as
selfishness dictates, and they will
split apart at the next opportunity.
There is a better way: the way of
reconciliation. Apart from religion,
it is doubtful whether true recon-
ciliation ever takes place; for it can
be fully done only in the spirit of
repentance first of all, and is
strengthened only through the
joining of hearts in worship. This,
by the way, is why Christian mar-
riages hold together far better
than marriages between people of
little or no religion. Quarrels oc-
cur in most marriages sooner or
later. Christian or not. The battle

of the sexes is one from which no
family is free. But in a couple
without religion, little quarrels
grow to big ones, husband and
wife either become enemies and
go separate ways, or stay together
only for the sake of appearances,
or the money, — not because of
love. Without religion repentance
is rare. It is only in the family
with a common faith that recon-
ciliation is possible. When the
day's end comes and it is time
for prayers.

It Has Worked

Reconciliation is not a theory;
it is a fact. It has actually worked.
The Hebrew Book of Chronicle
tells of King Hezekiah's experience
with his neighbors to the north
of him. They had been citizens of
a seceding group, no doubt in-
heriting much of the bitterness
that always underlies secession at
any time or place in history. To
their inherited prejudices against
the Kingdom of Judah from
which their forefathers had re-
volted, there was added the sting
of poverty and defeat; for the
seceding kingdom of Israel had
finally gone down in weakness to
a final smash-up. The left-behind
citizens must have been an em-
bittered lot. But King Hezekiah
sent invitations to all these peo-
ple, recently his enemies, to come
up to the Temple and join in the
great Passover festival. Men once
enemies were drawn together in
a common confession of sin, and
in a united worship of their one
God. In this spirit broken churches
have come together again, in this
spirit broken homes have been
mended, northerners and south-
erners in the United States have
forgotten their grandfathers' quar-
rels. It was in this spirit that in
1948, coming out of nations that
only three short years before had
been at violent war, Christian
churches around the world came
together for the first time in the
World Council of Churches, — born
of repentance, cradled in worship.

Never 100 Per Cent

It never works 100%. There were
unreconciled Israelites who did
not come to the Passover; there
are Irishmen today who have
never forgotten Cromwell, south-
erners who cannot forget Sher-
man, bitterly proud churchmen
who refuse to be reconciled with
any church but their own. When
we attempt reconciliation with
others, we may not always suc-
ceed. But which is better, to try
God's way — for reconciliation is
the way he has shown us — even
if we do not always succeed, or
not to try at all, and end in a
dark wilderness of bitter isolation?

Chleo James Identifies Mystery Farm No. 5

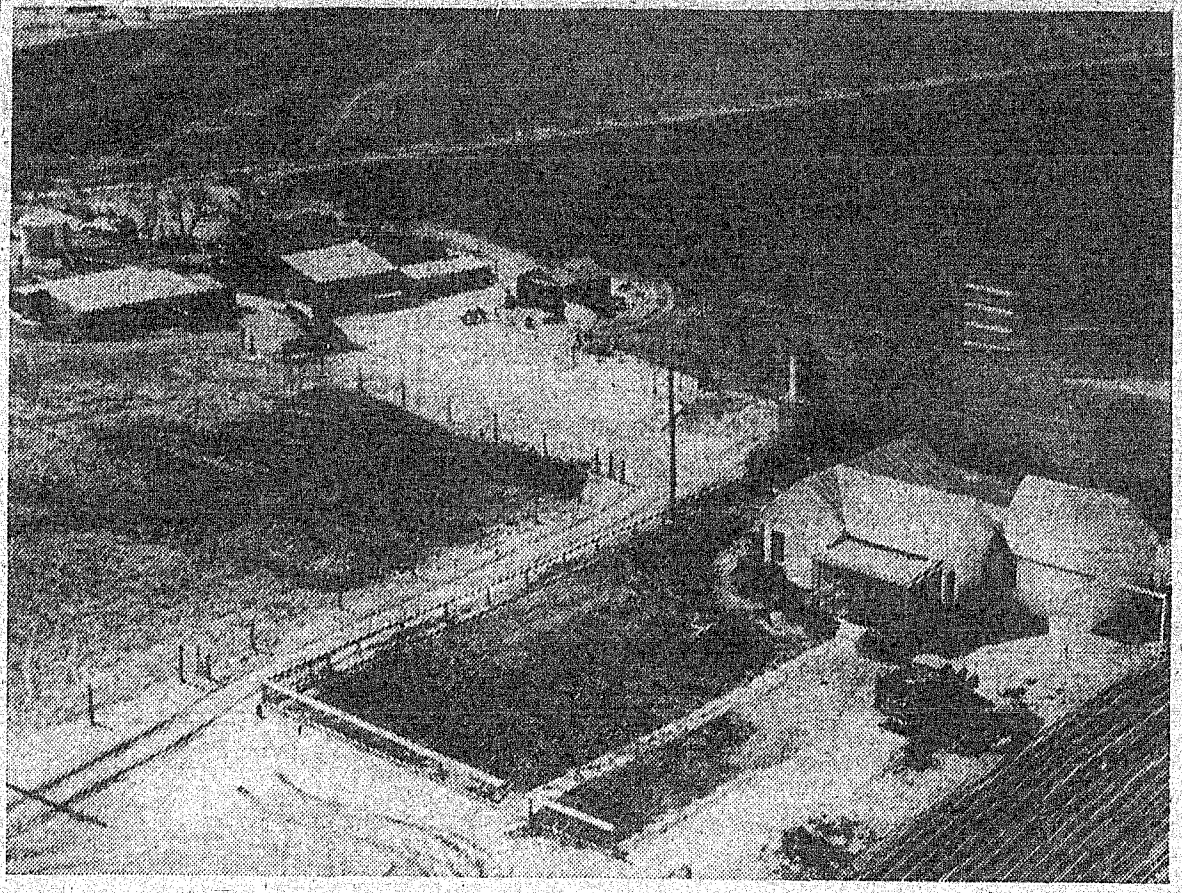

THE HOME OF MR. AND MRS. CHLEO JAMES



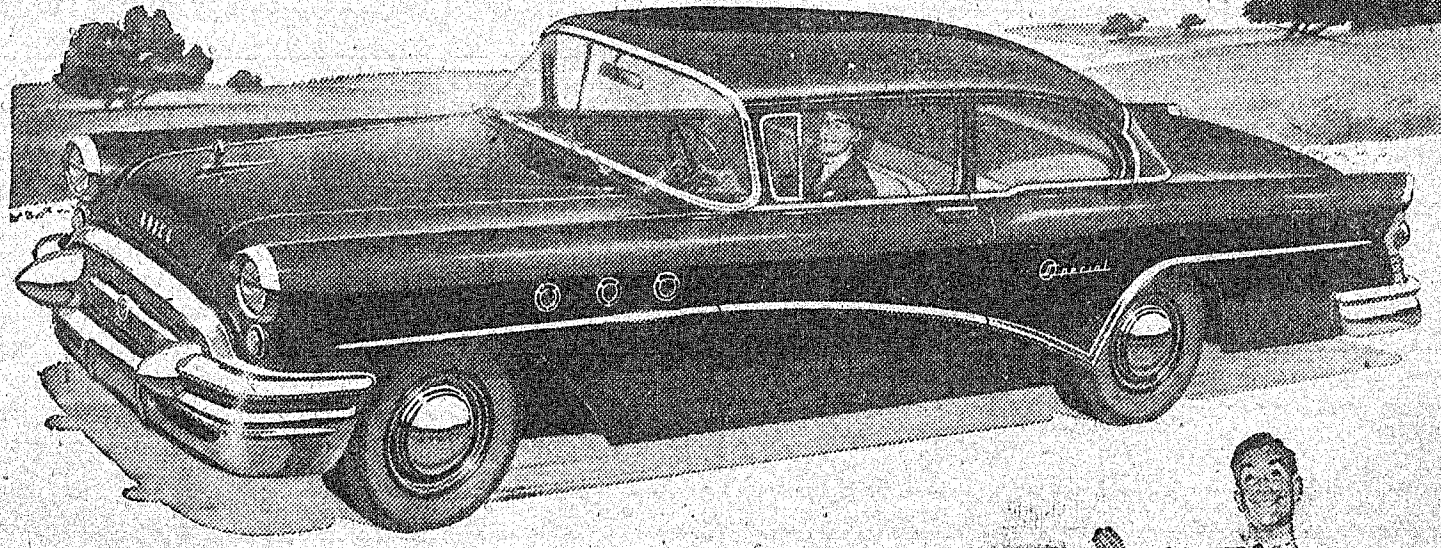

The March Of Progress

The Rockwood Elementary school closed out the last day of the last week of the last year as a school, Tuesday, May 17.

We welcome progress in most things but it is with regret that we go down this lane of memories at the final day of our school, which seems to tie the community together.

A one-room house, made of elm logs, stood where Mr. M. D. Bryan lives, recalls Mr. Bob Steward, when he came here in the middle '30's. Later a one-room building was erected near site of present school. Two buildings burned on this site and the present brick building was erected in 1925.

Grammar School Honor Roll: Douglas Estes, Ralph D. Sanderson, Carmon Woods, Minta Jane Hall, Theda Wood, A. W. Box, Douglas Snider, Heathal King, Nancy Lee McCreary, Lawrence Brusenhann, Jr., James Blackwell, Mary Tom Bryan, Vernon Estes, and Margaret Ashmore.

The Little League game will begin at 6:00 p. m. and the Pony League game will be played under the lights. No admission will be charged at these games, but voluntary contributions will be taken.



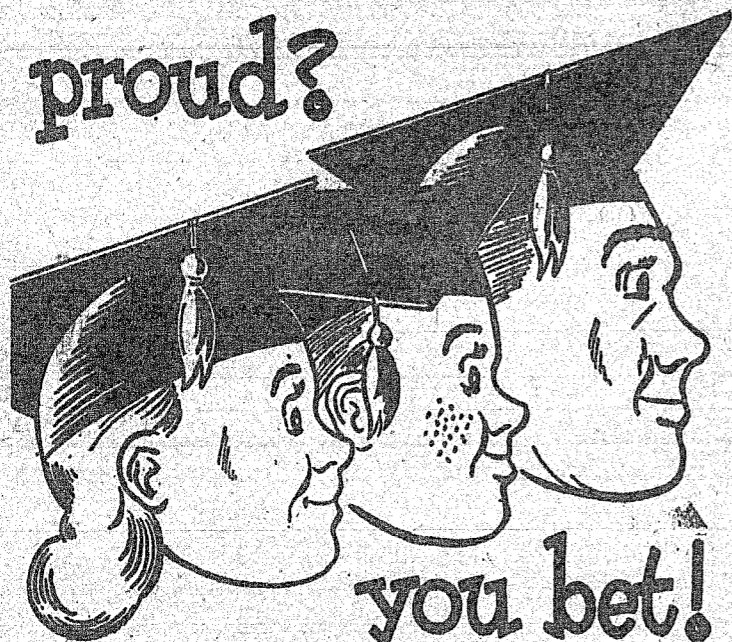
While a student in Santa Anna
