The Little League game will be played at 8:00 p. m. and the Pony League game will follow under the lights.

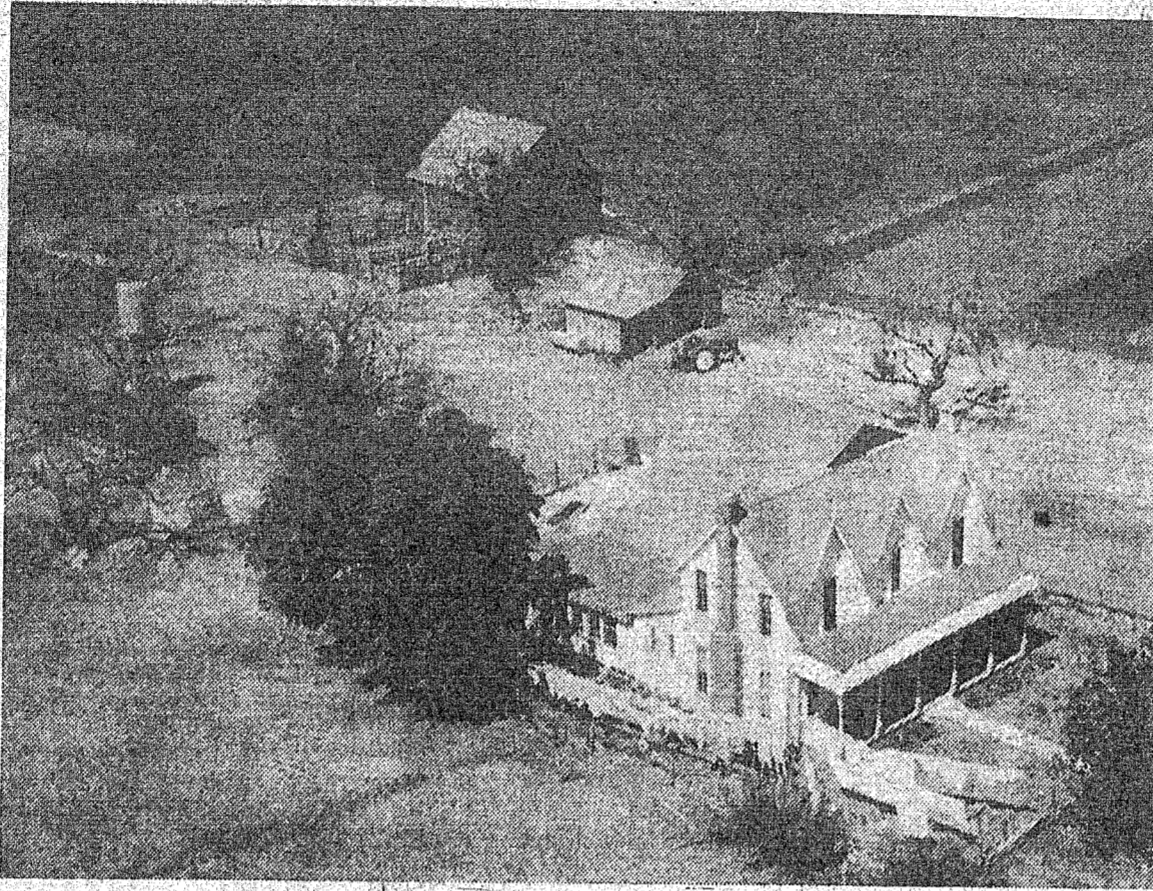

A new Army Reserve program, debated in the House last week, was in effect scuttled by an amendment offered by Negro Congressman Adam Powell of Harlem. The Powell amendment would prohibit segregated units in the National Guard. Under the present procedure, which has always been the rule, the National Guard is a State program under control of the Governors, except when called into Federal service.

Therefore the Powell amendment would virtually have destroyed the National Guard, particularly in the South, and would have destroyed a right that has always been retained by the States. It seemed a bit odd that, although the Eisenhower administration sponsored the new Reserve bill, most of the Republican members of the House voted for the Powell amendment, and thereby contributed directly to the defeat of the President's measure.

I, of course, voted against the Powell amendment. The Army reserve program is at present very confused and ineffective. By having a good reserve plan the standing forces can be gradually reduced and the cost to the taxpayers cut down. But it looks like any improved reserve program during this session is now a dead duck.

In Washington to testify in hearings concerning farm credit — a proposal that would affect the Production Credit Associations — were Jack Canning of Eden, Phil Lane and Ray Willoughby of San Angelo. Appearing before both the Senate and House committees, the PCA spokesmen made strong pleas against the passage of the legislation.

The best news we have heard in a long time came the other day when the radio reported flooding rains at Brady and vicinity. I telephoned L. B. Smith in Brady and got the news confirmed. "Four or five inches all over the County," he beamed. And it spread out over some neighboring counties. That is good news, indeed!

State Capitol NEWS

Austin — It's amazing how quickly pennies can grow into millions of dollars.

But, it is with pennies that Texas is solving its financial problem.

Big discussion of the week has been the proposed two cent increase in gasoline taxes. Right behind that big topic has been the 1c increase in cigarette taxes and the hike to 1c per bottle (\$1.30 per barrel) in beer taxes.

With these topics before them, the Legislators came back almost to where they started — namely Gov. Allan Shivers' original tax recommendations. Tossed out by the Senators, after many hearings on numerous phases of taxation, were virtually all other tax proposals.

When the tax bill bogged down in the Senate, Governor Shivers threw in a surprise strategy move.

By message, he told the House and Senate — now working without pay — that if they wanted to end this session, he would call them back in a special session when they could be paid \$25 a day.

Gov. Ben Ramsey and Speaker Jim Lindsey at once responded that the session could complete the tax chore, unlock the billion and a half dollar appropriation bill, and finish its job.

For the third time during the 1955 Legislative session, a new talkathon mark was established by a member of the usually sedate Senate.

This time the speaker was Sen. Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock who took 28 hours, 25 minutes against a state water project financing plan.

Previous holder of the record was Sen. Wayne Wagonseller of Bowie. Before that it was Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton.

Corbin was opposing a committee report on Sen. Dorsey Hardeman's proposed constitutional amendment to the \$100,000,000 water program. He was objecting to the three-cent ad valorem levy.

Governor Shivers had advocated the plan as a key part of his water conservation legislation. The proposal would set up a six-man board, to be appointed by the Governor. Corbin also contended that the board should be elected, rather than appointed. In objecting to the method of taxation, Corbin said that it would cause dry land farmers to bear the burden of water projects in other districts.

Like the other "billbustlers," it was fruitless. General rains throughout the state stole the spotlight from the Legislators the past week. It was NEWS — BIG news. Even where there were floods, there were smiles of gratitude for the moisture.

As for the capital city, weathermen here report that Austin already has received more rain this year than it did throughout 1954.

Recent almost statewide rains have changed Texas' crop outlook from "dismal failure" to "fairly good" according to Agricultural Commissioner John C. White. Rain came too late to help the wheat and oats, says White, but benefits to pasturelands were rated "excellent". He pointed out the need for a normal amount of moisture the rest of the year.

Lack of information prompted them to approve veterans land deals as a matter of routine. So said two state officials testifying in the Senate phase of the Land Office investigations.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert and State Auditor C. H. Cavness were the witnesses.

Cavness showed a form used by Giles to request funds for loans. Bearing the seal of the land board, the form carried no signature other than Giles'. "Nothing came to us to cause us to have any suspicions," Cavness said, adding that he had assumed the deals had been approved by a majority of the three-member board.

Governor Shivers and Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd recently have made affidavits to the effect that they were absent from board meetings on certain dates when the minutes cited that they were present.

From San Antonio, the district attorney's office announced it was demanding the maximum 10-year prison term for Giles, in his scheduled trial on charges

of accepting a \$30,000 bribe. Also that C. V. Wynn and Arthur McKenzie of San Antonio, charged with offering the bribe, would "turn state's evidence" against Giles.

Week-end discussion of a further postponement of the trial was based on the reported employment of an unnamed member of the Legislature as counsel. This is automatic grounds for continuance until 30 days after adjournment of the Legislature.

Venue in the future income tax trial of George B. Parr, political boss of the Duval County area, has been transferred to Austin.

Sen. William H. Moore of Bryan has pending in the Senate a resolution to investigate Southwest Conference athletic recruiting, following accusations against A & M College.

A Senate committee struck from the House-passed "unfair sales" bill authority for a trade association to sue a merchant for selling goods below cost. Sponsors said they wanted that proviso because an individual merchant might hesitate to sue — and give housewives the idea he was trying to keep them from buying as cheaply as possible.

Cuts in allowable oil production, made by the Railroad Commission, whittled the State's prospective revenue from oil. June allowable was cut 64,820 barrels daily and July 67,219.

The Senate joined the House in passing Rep. Dolph Briscoe's stringent bill regulating veterans' land sales and outlawing block deals. Briscoe's constitutional amendment replaces the Governor and Attorney General as Veterans Land Board members. Two appointive members would serve with the land commissioner.

Midland Man Heads Texas USO Campaign

Dallas — Mr. John Butler, First National Bank, Midland, Texas, has been named chairman of Region No. 4 in Texas' forthcoming campaign for the USO. Announcement of this appointment was made jointly today by Ben H. Wooten, chairman of the Texas United Defense Fund Committee, and Watrous H. Irons, state campaign chairman of the Texas United Defense Fund Committee.

Mr. Butler said, "It is most important that each of us do everything possible to maintain the ties of home with these boys and girls in service so that their morale may be kept high while they are away, that their hopes of decent future may be assured, and that they may return to us as good and useful citizens."

"The USO, which performed so magnificently in World War II and the recent Korean conflict is still providing a 'home away from home' for our young men and women in uniform and will continue to do so as long as our freedoms are threatened.

"As President Eisenhower has pointed out, 'More than just a Camp Show or a chance for an hour's diversion, more than just relaxation or warm hospitality, the USO means to the men and women in the Armed Services that they have a host of friends in the homes of America. No matter what part of the country a serviceman comes from, he wants to feel confident that what he is doing is important to other human beings, and that they are grateful for it."

"Such assurance fortifies spirit and morale, strengthens the ties in heart and mind which unite the individual serviceman with his fellow citizens, which make him feel that he is part of America! He must have such assurance, if he is willingly and able to perform the vitally important duties which our times and our nation's good demand of him."

The Texas United Defense Fund campaign goal this year is \$840,000.

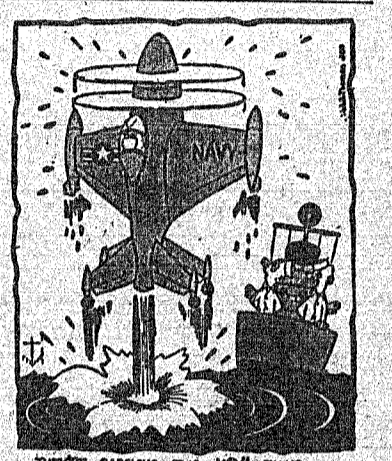

# LOUIS NEWMAN OWNS MYSTERY FARM NO. 6

Louis Newman, well-known farmer of the Shields community, is the owner and operator of Mystery Farm No. 6, which appeared in The Santa Anna News last week. The farm home is located 1/2 mile south of the Shields Community. Mr. Newman gets his mail on Gouldsbush Route One. He purchased this farm in January, 1947 from Hardy Stewardson, and he and Mrs. Newman moved there immediately. Previous to this time the Newmans had lived south-east of Santa Anna for about 30 years. In the fall of 1947 Mr. Newman sold his home place.

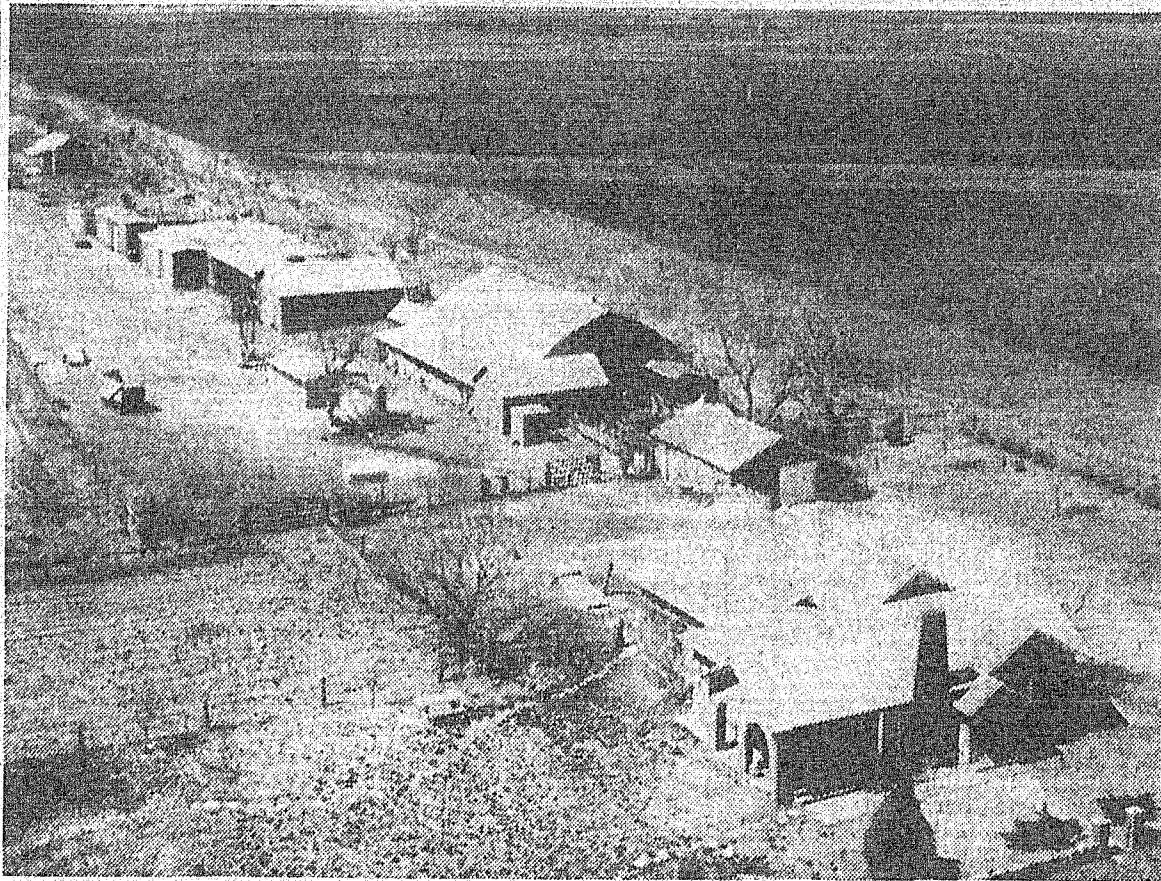
During the eight years he has lived on his present farm, Mr. Newman has built a lot of new fences, pump house and pump for pressure water in the home, tractor shed and has terraced the entire place. He has not built any tanks on the place, but when the general area receives any amount of rainfall, he has plenty of stockwater and drinking water.

He said he would guess the farm was put under plow about 40 years ago, being one of the first in that immediate vicinity. There is 200 acres in his farm, 65 of which is in pasture land. He is also working some other land, making a total of 375 acres he works.

Mr. Newman does all his farming by tractor and raises row crops and small grains. He also does stock farming, running at the present time about 200 head of ewes. Being short on pasture land, he plants a lot of his cultivated land for grazing and attempts to keep good grazing for his sheep the year round. He feeds lambs for market and raises a few cattle, but they don't amount to much according to him.

Last year he had most of his maize crop made into a 20 per-

cent supplement for feeding, but says that, was too expensive and this year he plans to feed his maize in a different way. He does not use any commercial fertilizer, but makes good use of barn-yard fertilizer. He said soil conservation is of primary importance to every farmer and rancher.

Louis Newman and Lillie McClure were married in 1914 at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. McClure, five miles south of Santa Anna on the Whon road. About three years later moved to his farm where they lived for 30 years, before purchasing and moving to the present home. One daughter, Ora Alice, was born to this union. Ora Alice is teaching in the public schools at San Angelo and has been there for several years. Mrs. Newman died sud-

denly Saturday, May 7, 1955, and since that time Mr. Newman has been visiting most of the time with his daughter.

He is a member of the First Baptist Church of Santa Anna, the Masonic Lodge and the Coleman County Farm Bureau. He said Mrs. Newman always said that his hobby was reading, and that he likes to read.

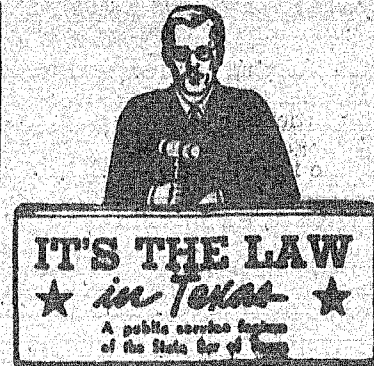
Mr. Newman has been a Sunday School teacher in the Baptist Church for about 25 years, and was the song leader for 28 years. He said it was kinda funny about the song leader's job. Back 28 years ago, Lonnie Gayle, who was the song leader at that time, moved from Santa Anna and the church asked him to take the job. He said he would until they could get someone else to take it. Twenty-eight years later, (which

was only a few weeks ago), the church employed Randell Purvis, a student at Howard Payne College, as the music director.

Mr. and Mrs. Newman were always active in church work and contributed largely of their time to it. Your editor would guess they have as many close friends as any other couple in this area.

Recently Mr. Newman and his brother, Walter, purchased their original home place, which contains 178 acres and joins the Walter Ferguson place on the south. Walter is living there at the present time and Louis is working it. Louis said his future plans include plans to increase the number of ewes he is running, but he could not say just when that would be.

## STATE MAY WIN ESTATE IN ABSENCE OF WILL

Made your will? If not, the State of Texas may wind up as owner of your estate upon your death. Under our statutes, the estates of persons having no heirs who die intestate revert, or "escheat", to the State.

Such provisions have been carried over from the English common law. There, under such circumstances, the estate escheated to the British crown. The theory of the process is that the sovereign (or State), having been the original owner of all lands before they were parceled out to individuals, is entitled to a return of such lands when the possibilities of legal inheritance have been exhausted.

This idea has been expanded to include personal property as well as real estate. It also applies in the cases of a person absent for a term of several years and not known to exist who leaves no heirs and no will.

Presumably, there is hardly a person who does not have some individual or charity that he would prefer to have his estate, rather than have it go to the State by default, so to speak. Yet, surprisingly, estates worth many thousands of dollars do escheat to the various states from time to time.

Now, before you shrug the matter off with the idea that these statutory provisions could not possibly apply to you, better think a minute. Suppose you and your spouse have no heirs besides each other and your children. Many people do fall into

this category.

In event of a catastrophe resulting in death for you and your entire immediate family, no legal heirs would remain. Therefore if you had no will, your property would go to the State. In preparing a will, it is possible to provide for such an eventuality.

In this hypothetical case, you would probably want to designate some friend as executor, to take care of all necessary arrangements and then distribute the estate according to your wishes.

On the other hand, if you have plenty of possible heirs, a will could be used to designate which of them shall participate in the division of the estate. And even if you wish your property to be distributed entirely in accordance with our statutes of descent and distribution as explained in previous columns, a will can perform useful functions. Among other uses, a will could provide for an orderly and economical partition of your property, preventing any waste of the assets by heirs impatient for a settlement.

What happens to property which escheats to the State? Following certain required legal formalities and court proceedings, all escheated lands are set apart to the Permanent Free School Fund of the State, and may be leased and sold by the Land Commissioner under certain regulations. Escheated personal property is sold by the local sheriff under a court writ and the money received therefrom paid into the State Treasury.

A CRIPPLED American carrier after the battle of Leyte was zig-zagging its way to what looked like certain death. Faster Japanese craft were after it, their shots were coming closer. The only hope any one on board could have was that by shifting course and speeding again and again, they might be able to put off the inevitable end. Finally in mid-afternoon, just when drowning seemed closer than ever, for some reason the Americans never understood, the enemy ships gave up the chase and pulled away. The chaplain gathered the men on deck and there read the 124th Psalm (our devotional reading for the week) as if it had been written for the occasion: "If it had not been the Lord who was on our side, when men rose up against us, then they would have swallowed us up quick... then the waters had overwhelmed us."

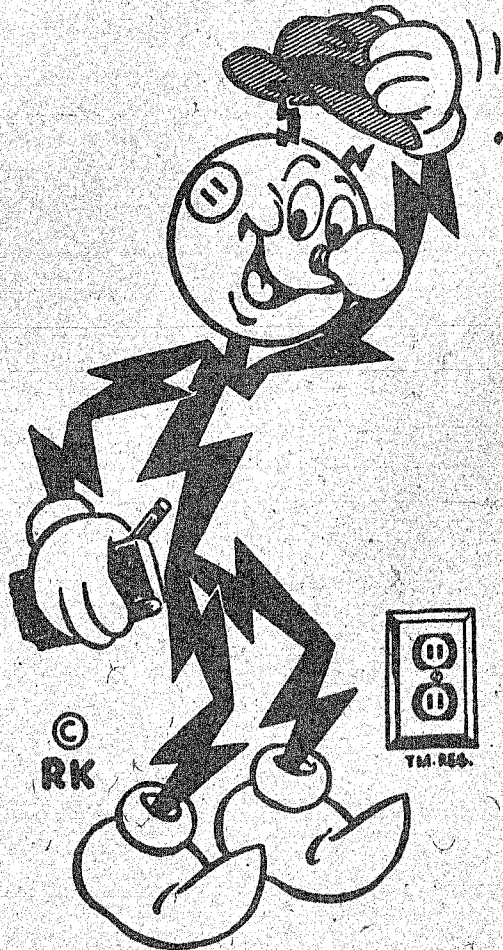
**The Resources of God**  
God (said Napoleon) is on the side with the largest battalions. Napoleon was not acquainted with God or he would hardly have said that. There have been to many occasions when the biggest battalions, the best military material (etc), the ablest generalship, did not turn the trick. God has sometimes appeared to be on the side of very small battalions. Sometimes it's a kind of mystery how it's done. But history carries the record. There was the time when the Hebrew slaves left Egypt in spite of the best army in the world. There was the time described in the Bible reading this week, when the God-fearing King Hezekiah and his people, — a much smaller little country than many another that had fallen to defeat by mighty Assyria, — was saved by a miracle. There was the time later in

Hebrew history (between the Old and the New Testaments) when the little army of the Maccabees stood off the great armies of the Seleucid kings; the astonishing day when the "invincible" Armada, the enormous naval expedition of Spain, which could never have been beaten by English arms at that time, was smashed by a hurricane on the rocky coasts of the islands the Spaniards intended to enslave. Say what you please, some victories cannot be explained unless you can see "God within the shadows, keeping watch above his own."

**Victories of the Spirit**  
There have been victories of the spirit, too, which can hardly be explained unless you can see God in the picture. When John Woolman was born, slavery was taken for granted everywhere in the civilized world. You would not have thought Mr. Woolman could make a dent in so well-established a custom. He had no money, no prestige, not much education. But the Lord laid on his soul a burden, and he went from one Quaker meeting to another, sharing his burden of concern for slaves; and out of his one-man crusade came the Quaker opposition to slavery and the gradual awakening of the Christian conscience everywhere. So, nearer our times, when Walter Rauschenbusch was a boy, religion was generally supposed to have to do only with a man's soul, not with his business or his politics or anything outside his church and home. Rauschenbusch became a new sort of prophet — attacked, of course, as prophets are; but what seemed to be heresy in his day is preached today in all churches, that the Christian religion is concerned with every side and every interest and relationship of life, public and private too.

**Not the Lazy**  
It is a serious mistake to suppose that God always rewards the weak, or that he will do for us what we are expected to do ourselves. The story of Hezekiah brings this out. He felt, and the whole country felt, that God had saved them in their time of need; and this was true. But it should be noted that Hezekiah, faced with invasion, took intelligent (and expensive) measures for defense. He secured a reliable water supply for use in case of siege, he diverted water away from the places where the besieging army was sure to be. He built up the army, he manufactured new equipment. If he had radar screens he would have used them.

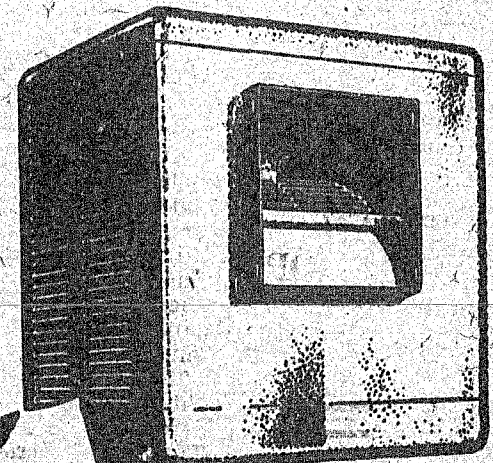

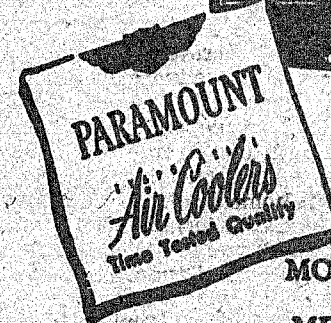

## MEMORIAL DAY

MAY 30, 1955

Three years had passed since the last shot had been fired. In the beginning it had not been easy for fighting men to learn again the ways of peace—to sleep without having an ear cocked for the crack of a picket's rifle, to get up by one's own will rather than at the call of drum or bugle, to work at a steady job instead of doing only what some officer ordered. For awhile even the beds had been too soft, and the food too rich for stomachs that had made their peace with hard-tack or grits and bacon.

But by the spring of 1868 most of the veterans, North and South, had taken up their old lives or made new ones. The war was fast slipping into the past, and men were coming to remember only its comradeships and victories, and to forget its horrors.

And perhaps to forget, too, the graves that marked every battlefield, even every hamlet. It was then that General John A. Logan, Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued his celebrated general order designating May 30 as a day for strewing with flowers the graves of the men who had given their lives for their country. A few weeks later, solemn processions everywhere moved with slow step to the resting places of the dead.

Even before 1868 a number of Southern communities had decorated the graves of Confederate soldiers. As in the North, the custom spread and became permanent, although some Southern states still honor their dead on dates other than May 30.

While the war remained an unhealed wound, it was natural that the people of each section should glorify the valor of their armies at the same time that they did homage to the fallen. But with each year bitterness diminished, and ever-larger numbers saw that grief has no respect for geography. Thus Memorial Day came to embrace all Americans and the dead of all our country's wars.

We can do little more than set aside a day of recognition for those who never came back. But there are thousands who have come back—ill, maimed, burdened with hurts from which they will never recover. For these, the disabled, we can show that we mean our annual tribute. We can, if we will, make an effort to understand their problems, and offer them every opportunity to earn decent livings and lead normal lives. If we fail in this small obligation, we strip Memorial Day of its meaning.
