Those who should register are

these:
1. All persons who are totally unemployed, able to work and want work. Included in this group are the following: (a) Persons who have worked for pay, who are to work and still want work; (b) Persons who formerly had their own business, farm, or professional practice, and no longer work at it, who are able to work and want work; (c) Persons now looking for their first jobs.

2. All persons who are partly employed, able to do more work, and want more work. Included in this group are the following: (a) Persons working part-time at regular jobs, who are able to (including casual workers) who want more work.

3. 


