## Committeeman Appointed

Mr. Everett E. Evans, Tulpa, Texas, is the new member of the County Committee for the Farmers Home Administration. His appointment became effective July 1, 1955, the agency's county supervisor, announced.

Mr. Evans succeeds Mr. Emzy L. Brown of Santa Anna, Texas, whose term on the 3-member committee expired this year.

The other two members of the committee are Mr. Ozro Eubank, Route 1, Santa Anna, Texas, and Mr. Oscar L. Cheaney, Santa Anna, Texas.

There is a Farmers Home Administration county committee in every agricultural county in the country. The committee determines the eligibility of applicants and helps the county supervisor adapt the agency's loan policies and services to local conditions. Each member is named for a 3-year term, and one appointment expires each year. A member completing his 3-year term cannot succeed himself. At least two of the members must be farmers.

The Farmers Home Administration makes loans to farmers to buy, improve, enlarge, or operate efficient family-type farms. It also lends money to farmers or their nonprofit associations to establish and carry on approved soil and water conservation practices. Purposes include establishing and improving permanent pastures, terracing, soil erosion practices, and many other conservation measures, as well as irrigation and farmstead water improvements. Most of the soil and water conservation loans and loans to buy, improve, or enlarge farms are made from funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency.

The agency makes emergency loans, but only in areas designated by the Secretary of Agriculture as being in need of emergency loans due to some calamity. Coleman County is designated for emergency loans because of the continued drought.

Before the agency can make any loan, the applicant must have the approval of the county committee. In the case of a farm ownership loan, the farm to be purchased, enlarged or improved must also be approved by the committee, Mr. John H. Curry, County Supervisor, explained.

The agency does not make a loan of any type to an applicant whose credit needs can be handled by other credit sources.

Coach Joe Van Breeman reports most of the boys coming out for football beginning to get in good physical condition, with the exception of a few injuries. There is still about 30 boys reporting for practice at each of the two daily sessions.

Injuries reported thus far include: Kenneth Henderson, ankle injury and will be out for at least 6 weeks; William Bradley, back injury and will be out for undetermined length of time; Gary Floyd, pulled muscles in back and should be back in practice before too long. There are a few other minor injuries but most of these are expected to be worked out in a few days.

A scrimmage session is scheduled with Clyde on the local field Thursday afternoon, beginning at 5:00 p. m. Every one is invited out to watch the boys in action. The first regular game of the season will be held on the local field Friday night, September 9, at 8:00 p. m. with Junction.

## 4 Youths Injured In Car Wreck Near Brownwood Friday

An auto-pickup truck collision late Friday afternoon near Brownwood on U. S. Highway 133 hospitalized four young people from Santa Anna for a brief time.

The two vehicles were headed north about a mile beyond the overpass on the Cisco (U.S. 183) highway when the accident occurred.

Investigating highway patrolmen and sheriff's officers said Leon Duffer, driver of the 1946 Ford pickup, was making a left turn into his private driveway as the 1951 Ford, driven by Odie Clyde Windham, 18, of Santa Anna, started to pass the pickup, resulting in a collision.

The driver and three Santa Anna girls, Shirley Simmons, 18, Ann Autrey, 17, and Sharon Hoke, 18, were injured.

The injured were taken to Memorial Hospital. The girls were dismissed Friday night following emergency treatment for abrasions and bruises. Miss Hoke suffered a laceration of the nose. Windham was released from the hospital Saturday following observation and treatment for bruises and abrasions. Duffer escaped injury. Damage to the left rear portion of his pickup was estimated at \$75.

Damage to the sedan, which was crushed at the front, was estimated at \$300.

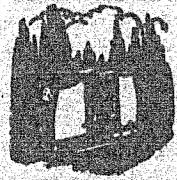

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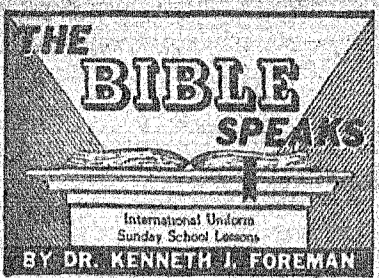

**A Nation's Worship**

Lesson for September 4, 1955

IT WOULD be very nice to wake up some Sunday morning and find that everybody in America had decided to join our church. Suppose that up to now you had belonged to the First Universal Church of All Angels, and there was only one congregation of that denomination in your town, along with maybe six or eight other denominations. But suppose that on this Sunday morning as you walked to church you would find the Uni-

versal Church of All Angels sign on every church building you passed. Suppose you learned by the morning paper that this was because the President of the United States (himself a prominent member of your denomination) had issued a Directive ordering all churches to come over into this one—or be abolished entirely. Well, you would know that was a dream . . . because this is free America, and there is not and constitutionally can never be an official, government-supported, national, established religion.

**The Nucleus**  
So when we talk of "a nation's worship" in America we can't mean what we would mean in a country where everybody is dragged into one single kind of church, a country where to be born into the nation is to be born into the church at the same time. Still, there is sense in talking about the nation at worship, for take us by and large, we do worship; the church is too prominent an object in every landscape to be overlooked. And even in free America where church and state are separate, we can learn something from the ancient Hebrews who combined church and state in one. The first thing we learn is not to be discouraged by the fact that many people don't go to

church at all. The whole story of Ezra and Nehemiah, the prophecies of Haggai and of Zechariah, show us that there were great masses of indifferent people in Judea after the "Return" and the restoration of the worship at the high altar in Jerusalem. There were the same difficulties with a building program that we have; preaching fell on many a deaf ear, just like now. Worship is now, and has always been, carried on, in the true sense, not by the masses but by a nucleus of devoted men and women.

**The Opposition**

The Jews who returned to Palestine to get their religion organized, and under way again, with public services and all, found out another thing which we Americans might as well learn,—indeed, we have learned it. That is, not only is there indifference to religion, but it has many enemies. There are in America, as there are everywhere, people who are "plain mean." There are businesses that injured people, businesses that contribute to crime, indeed some businesses that even a not-too-moral police force labels as crime. Those who live by the profits of these enterprises just hate the church; let's face it.

**Can Government Help?**

Now in ancient Palestine, say Zechariah's time, not to mention earlier times, church and state helped and supported each other. King and high priest might even be related. Especially after the Exile, church and state became practically one. In our free America—and we would not wish it un-free, for a moment—can the government do anything to help the church? Readers who belong to Sunday school classes can start a very interesting discussion by asking that question. How can Government help the church? Ought Government to try to help us? One way, surely, by which the State can aid the church, is by laws which will keep the Lord's Day free, so far as possible, from work-day necessities. Another way is by setting an example. When leaders in government set an example of sharing in the public and private worship of God, the nation is all the better for it.

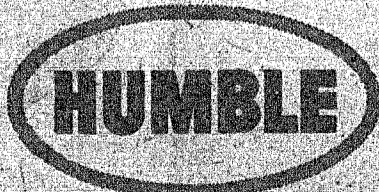

The Hendersons live about 10 miles south of Santa Anna on the Trickham road. His house is located a short distance off the highway.

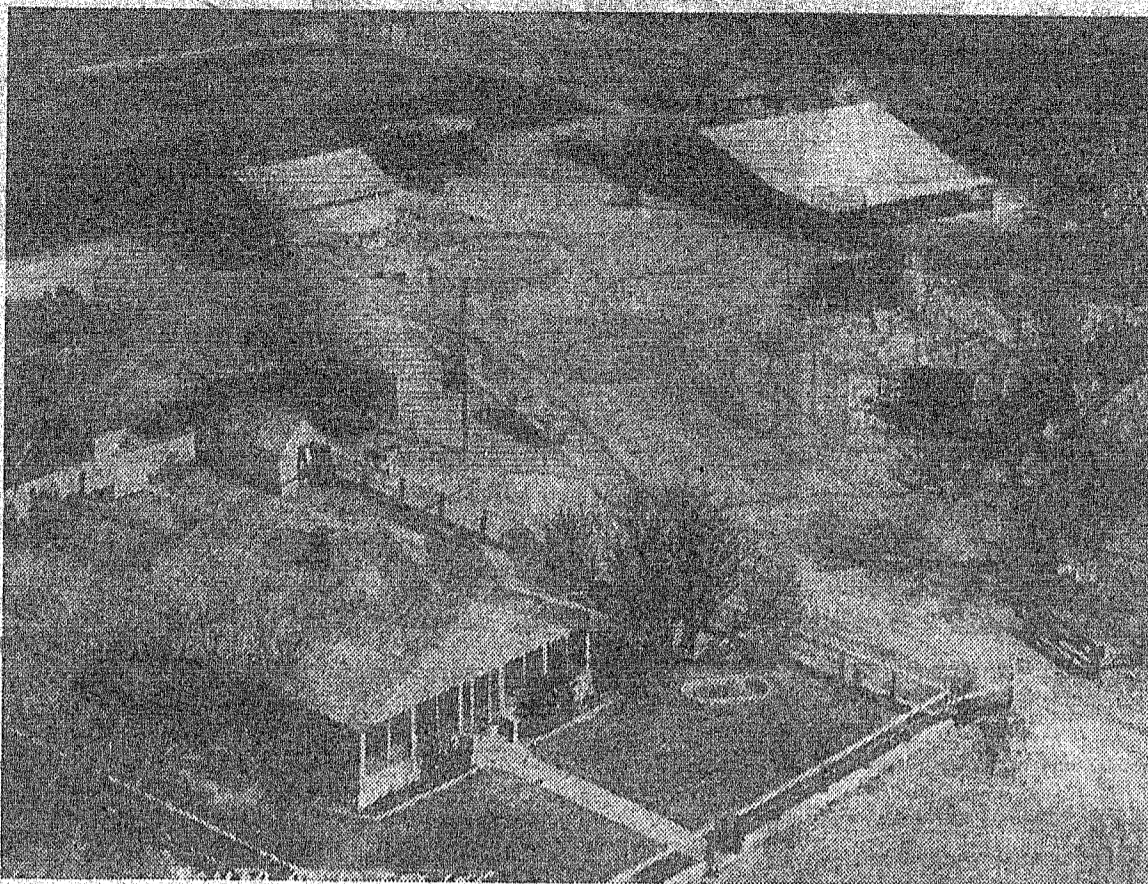
Mr. Henderson purchased the farm from Louis Newman in 1947 and he and family have lived there since that time. Mr. Newman owned the 285 acre farm for 30 years before moving to the Shields community.

Mr. Henderson said he had made some additions to the barn, built several spreader dams and one large stock tank during the eight years he has lived on the farm. His future plans call for remodeling the house, but he said that would have to wait until farming conditions improve, such as getting enough rainfall to make some crops with.

On December 8, 1940 Mr. Henderson and Miss Leona McClatchey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tal McClatchey of Trickham, were married. They have two children, Naomi, age 13, and Donnie, age 11. Mr. Henderson is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Markham Henderson.

Soon after they moved to their present home, Mr. Henderson purchased 10 Hereford cows, and by the end of the year he had lost four of them. However, he continued in the Hereford business and increased his herd for several years, using his father-in-law's bulls. Recently he has decreased his herd to 18 cows and raises bulls to sell large Hereford breeders and some market stock. He said he had three good yearling bulls for sale now. He has about 100 acres in pasture land and has been leas-

ing some grazing land during the years he has been there.

His favorite crop is small grain. At the beginning of the year he had most of his cultivated land in small grain, lost the greater part of it and reseeded the entire place and then was not able to harvest any grain at all. He said he got very little grazing from this land. He has one place leased in Brown County and on the two places he has 46 acres of cotton. Most of his cotton was destroyed by the severe dirt storm we had during the spring and he had to replant most of it. The late cotton is suffering for lack of moisture pretty bad, but the old cotton seems to be doing very well. He had poisoned for boll worms four times and says they can be controlled if a person will poison as recommended. Most of his other cultivated land is in row crops, but he does not have any maize.

Mr. Henderson said he had received about 18 inches rainfall this year, but his pastures did not have any cover crops on them and most of the water run off. His pastures are in pretty bad shape.

He attempts to raise all the feed possible each year, and has used a considerable amount of fertilizer, but most the time he failed to get enough water to help the fertilizer do much good. He said using fertilizer was

worth the money when enough moisture is received and he intends using more of it when the seasons seem right.

Asked about quoting him on some subject, Mr. Henderson said, "Just say I'm looking for someone to sell a bull to."

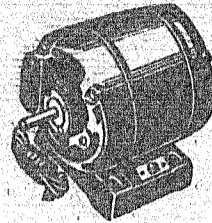

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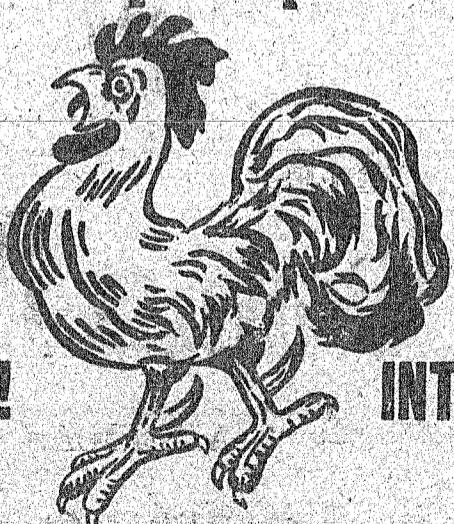
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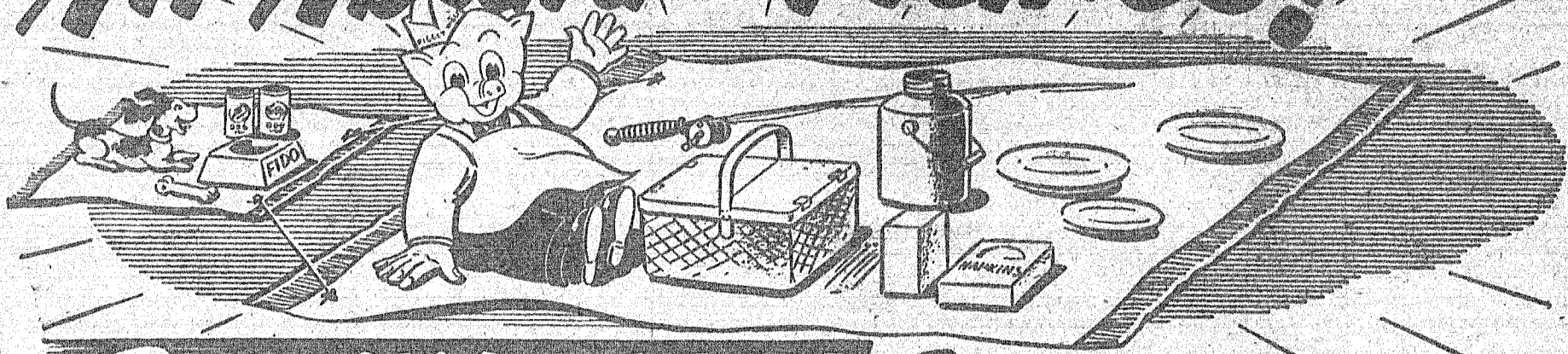
