



Small Business Loans Available In Disaster Counties in State

O. C. Jones, Acting Regional Director of the Small Business Administration for the Southwest area, today announced that SPA is now prepared to make drought disaster business loans in officially designated drought

Under the law enacted by the last session of Congress, the Small Business Administration is given authority to make drought disaster business loans at 3 percent interest to firms. able to show they have actually suffered economic injury attri-

butable to the drought. Mr. Jones said 498 counties in the Dallas region have peen officially declared as drought areas by the Secretary of Agriculture. They include all counties in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas; 49 counties in Louisiana; 27 counties in the lower half of Mississippi and 3 counties in Alabama.

Business firms in these areas are eligible to apply for a drought disaster business loan, if they can show that their business has been injured because of drought conditions. Such presentation may be in the form of comparative operating statements, excessively large accounts receivable, a decline in sales volume because of the drought, or similar information. Farmers Have Two **Questions Concerning** Social Security

"Judging from our mail and personal inquiries, most farmers of this area have two questions to ask about the new social security coverage," says Ralph T. Fisher, Asst. Mgr., of the Abilene Social Security Office.

He answered the quiery on possible employer-employee relationship between the landowner and the tenant, as follows:

"The tenant is self-employed if he agrees to produce a crop or live-stock on the land of another, with the crop or its proceeds to be divided and with the amount going to each decrop. It does not matter whether the tenant or the farm owner harvesting the crop. Seed, feed, bank accounts, holding out as partners, etc.,"

The question on employeremployee relationship between the farm operator and harvesting or other crews, is answered this way:

"Employees are often made available to farmers by a 'labor contractor; or 'crew leader'. Some are the employee agents of the farmer; others are acting on their own and thus self-em ployed in their own right. "If the farmer has the right

to control and direct the crew leader in his work, then the crew leader and members of the crew are employees of the farmer.

"Where the crew leader agrees to perform an entire farming operation such as harvesting

Copies of the manual will be distributed to volunteer 4-H leaders through

County Extension Offices.

In addition, GM provides incentives in the National 4-H Safety Awards program which is arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. Medals are made available to four county win-ners; an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago is given to the state winner; and \$300 college scholarships are presented to eight national winners.

Jesus himself gave a reason for being baptized. The trouble is, he did not explain what he He said he did it "to fulfill all righteousness." (Matthew meant he would not be doing right if he were not baptized. But just what does 'fulfilling all righteousness" mean? The explanation most widely accepted in the church is that being baptized was part of the Jewish law at the time, and that Jesus as a loyal Jew observed this as he observed other laws of his religion. There are two weak spots in this theory. One is that there is little or no evidence that baptizing or being baptized was a regular religious observance among the Jews, and the other is that Jesus did not feel obligated to keep strictly all the laws, otherwise he would hardly have had the attitude toward the Sabbath which we know he had.

Friend of Sinners

Still another explanation which is impressing a large number of Christians today, is that Christ, by insisting on being baptized, over John's protests that he did not need it, in a dramatic way was taking the side of sinners. We think of Jesus taking our part and representing us on the Cross. But, it is asked, when did Jesus first identify himself with sinners? Not until his last Friday morning? On the contrary, the suggestion is that Christ there at the Jordan had the opportunity to take his place, publicly and for all to see, either with those who despised sinners and made it hard for them and were proud of themselves, or with those who by being baptized were honest enough to confess their sins and to express their deep desire to be rid of them. So Jesus identifies himself once and for all with the repentant,-not that he himself needed to repent, but to show that the repentant are his people. First to last, he was the Friend of Signers.


