
Healing Souls

A word much in use with psychologists, psychiatrists and counselors nowadays is "acceptance." Now Jesus accepted all kinds of persons who were by everyone else rejected-lepers, tax collectors, the "lower classes," foreigners. But while Jesus opened his heart to these people, in the very act of acceptance he changed chameleons that take the color of whatever they lie on. Jesus never changed his own colors. 




