At the close of the singing on Sunday it was announced that the singings would be disconlinued. After the benediction those present lingered for handshaking and visiting.







This part of his farming operions includes 182 acres, 160 of hich are in cultivation. He purchased the farm about 10 years ago and raises mostly small grain and cotton on the place. He has done some remodeling on the house since he bought it and has terraced all the land and built one large tank on the place. The farm also has a gas well on it that supplies natural gas to the home.





Any adult who is insolvent rupt by having his attorney prepare for him a bankruptcy petition, together with schedules of his assets and liabilities, and then file the same in the proper United States district court.

After the debtor is adjudicated a bankrupt he is required to appear for examination as to his assets in the bankruptcy court, and if he fully accounts for his thereafter receive a discharge of his debts.

If he is granted a discharge of his debts, he has started a new financial life as of the date he filed bankruptcy. The assets which he thereafter acquires cannot be reached to satisfy the old debts, nor will creditors be permitted to sue him on the old debts.

Dishonest debtors sometimes endeavor to gain advantage for themselves not allowed by the bankruptcy laws. In these in-stances, upon objections to discharge by creditors, they not only will be denied a discharge of their debts, but the courts will be prone to deal harshly with the offenders if they have vio-



ody who thinks Dr. Foreman ae doesn't believe in evangelism is really saying that he doesn't care whether there are any new Christians or not. He is saying (though perhaps without realizing it) that what he calls his "faith" is not worth talking about, or recommending to any one else.

Preaching and Bringing-

Our rather technical word "Gospel" means simply "Good News." That is what it is called in the New Testament. Not good advice, or good answers to philosophers' riddles; just good newsabout God, about Jesus, about destiny. Luke gives us some interesting and valuable hints about how this Good News was broadcast in Jesus' own time and by his direction. One is in three words (Luke 8:1): Jesus came "preaching and bringing" the good news of the kingdom of God. The Gospel is not something just for talk. A tape-recorder can give out a sermon; but a tape-recorder cannot be a preacher of the Gospel. A minister who preaches on Sunday and disappears the rest of the week (if such there be) may be preaching the Gospel but he is not bringing it. Jesus lived by what he preached. The good news can be told by a clever tongue; but it can be brought only by a consecrated life. What would he thought of a grocery store

You would think that if we could only get Jesus Christ in person, as he was in Galilee, into our church, we could convert evcrybody. Well, he didn't. No one ever brought or preached the Gospel better than he; but he did not meet with 100% success. He gave a reason for this that any farmer or gardener can understand. Preaching the Gospel is like sowing seed, he said. Sometimes when you look at two fields you may find it hard to believe that the same seed was sown in both; but so it was. The difference is in the soils. In Hutchinson, Kansas, there is a grain elevator with a capacity of ten million bushels of wheat, Every bushel in the hundreds of bins can be traced back to the area where it grew. On the wall in the testing-laboratory of that elevator there is a map of Kansas, county by county; and the kind of wheat each county is producing, this

year, is marked there. The same seed wheat, in different counties or in different parts of the same county, may have different protein content or vary in number of bushels to the acre. So some people are better Gospel-soil than others.


To Preach and to Heal


