"We are inclined to believe," Tuley said, "That there are peo-ple who could receive benefits for 1955 who have so far not taken advantage of their rights, because of misunderstanding or confusion as to the new retirement test in the law."

"In brief, an individual who was past 65 years of age the enhad sufficient covered employment of self-employment to be eligible for benefits for the entire year 1955 if his total earnings for the year do not exceed \$1,200. He can receive partial benefits if his total earnings do not exceed \$2,080, even though he works throughout the entire year."


In the case of a self-employed person, the net profit from the trade or business is what is considered "earnings."

Persons who do not earn over \$2,080 in 1955, and who meet the other conditions for eligibility may secure further information and assistance in filing applica-tion for benefits, by contracting the Social Security Administration at Abilene, Texas.
