The maximum loan is \$7,000 and total indebtedness cannot exceed \$10,000.

Before a loan is made a complete farm and home plan is prepared by the farm family with the assistance of the agency's local supervisor. The plan shows how the farm will be operated, estimated yields and income, and a budget for farm and home expenses. Provision is made in the! budget for household expenditures and medical care.



The soil bank is not the complete answer to our farm dilemma. But is is a well- remembered friend of all our farmers who mourned its death under the name of soil conservation three years ago.


NUMEROUS SPACES AVAILABLE IN ARMY MEDICAL SERVICE

In an effect to build up the reserve forces to nearly three million men (2.9 to be exact) Congress passed the Reserve Forces Act of 1955. It was signed into law by President Eisennower last August.

Under one program of this law, high school students 17 to 181/2 years of age, may enlist in a Reserve unit, serve six months active duty after graduating from high school, then go to college or enter into the business world with draft deferred status.

Other provisions of the Act make the U.S. Army Reserve attractive to older youths who have had no military service,

aready have served two or more years active duty.





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

Status of Dependent Earning \$600 Or More Explained

The many inquiries received indicates that there is a misunderstanding regarding the tax-payer status of dependent children earning \$600 or more, Jim Cheatham of Internal Revenue Service in Brownwood announced today.

"A child earning \$600 or more qualifies as a taxpayer and must file a return and pay any tax due. This is true whether the parent claims the child as a deyoungsters in their first public pendent or not. Parents are responsible for the tax due from minors," Mr. Cheatham said.

"Parents may claim the dependency deduction for a child earning \$600 or more under certain conditions. The parent must furnish more than half the support of the child to qualify the child as a dependent. The child must be under 19 years of age, or if 19 or over must meet the qualifications of a student. A student must attend a full-time school during at least five months of the calendar year. Such schools include only in-stitutions with a regular faculty and a student body and do not include correspondence schools, night schools and employer training schools.



Effective Praying

Lesson for February 12, 1956

WHEN most people think of prayer they think of only one though there are several The word "prayer" suggests askbught to singest thankfulness, confession of sm. aspiration, trust. But leaving all these other kinds of prayer out of account, what a wonderful thing prayer, is! If I could go to a mil-

lionaire once a year and ask him for anything I wanted: or if I could have an interview with the most famous person in the world' of asking one favor,-how dizzy I Dr. Foreman would be at the pleasure of the prospect! Yet God has more treasure than a millionaire, and the fame of the most renowned men is nothing compared to his glory. It is such a God to whom I can take my desires and requests, every day, every night of the year. It is only because prayer is so

free that we take it for granted

and fail to appreciate it. We might

value the opportunity more if we

had to pay well for it. The Price of Prayer

In a way, prayer does have a price. That is to say, if prayer is to be effective, certain conditions have to be met. Jesus told some stories which bring out what these conditions are. One is the tale of two men who went into the same temple to pray. One was an old hand at it,—if there was a "praying class" of Jews (corresponding to a working class, or a professional class) in those days, he was a prominent member of it. The other man had perhaps very seldom prayed. The first man was a regular contributor to his ! church; the other man-if he was like the average in his profession seldom darkened the door of a place of worship. But in Jesus' story these two men found themselves side by side in the same

temple, and only one was "justified," that is to say, only one got favorable attention from God. And that one was the man who had nothing to say but "God, be merciful to me a sinner." To ask God for this and for that, as if we deserved it, as if it were our right to demand gifts from God,—this is no way to pray. Effective prayer begins with confession and re-

Not to the Proud

Let us make a short list of some differences between wrong prayer and right prayer. Wrong prayer one we want to impress. Right prayer is addressed to God alone. Wrong prayer is proud; right prayer is humble. Wrong prayer ing for something; though it pride away and comes to God without a claim. In wrong prayer, I come to God asking him to do something for me which will give me a better reason than I now have for being proud of myself. In right prayer, I come to God asking him to cleanse me of the pride which makes me feel that God himself is hardly necessary, In wrong prayer, the one. who prays rises from his knees just as he was, for he has no wish to be changed; in right prayer, the one who prays rises a better man, for he asked God to forgive and change him.

Keeping at It

Jesus seldom if ever tried to put all the truth into one parable. He was generally content with setting out one truth at a time. So the parable of the bothersome widow, the woman who finally wore out a stubborn and selfish judge just by keeping after him,-that parable does not say everything about prayer. But it does teach one thing: Keep at it! Jesus is careful not to say that God is anything like that judge. What he does mean is that if even a bad character like that judge can be moved to do the right thing by a persistent woman, surely God our Father in heaven, who is neither lazy nor stubborn nor ill-willed, will listen to persistent prayer. We must be careful not to read into this parable more than Jesus said. There is no promise here that God counts the number of times we pray for a thing, and that if we only pray enough times he will be sure to answer. There is no guarantee that God will answer any prayer we can think of if we say it often enough. What Jesus promises is that God will bring justice at last . . . if we keep on wanting it. 



It's The Public's Money!

For many years the Texas Press Association — of which this newspaper, along with a vast majority of all Texas newspapers, is a member — has suggested laws that would require governing bodies of the state, various districts, and municipalities, to open their records to the public.

In many instances, publication of minutes would be required, and in the case of agencies handling public funds, publication of a financial statement would be mandatory.

Some progress has been made in these efforts, but not nearly as much as the importance of the project justifies. There never has been a great deal of opposition to the TPA proposals. But they have been shunted aside for other matters.

Apathy - not opposition - has kept them off the statute books.

Now all Texas is concerned over the numerous, unsavory circumstances that have come to light the past few years. There have been the Duval County revelations; the veterans land investigations; the U.S. Trust and other insurance debacles; to say nothing of smaller local instances of corruption and abuse of public trust of which there have been many.

Men who are in a position to know - such as the Attorney General of Texas — say that none of these things could have gone on for long had there been adequate laws governing PUBLIC NOTICE. It is doubtful that any of them would have been attempted, had there been requirements that official actions be made public.

Proper public notice laws will prevent such things in the future. Such laws automatically lead to good government.

This is an election year. If you think public business should be made public, ask each candidate for the legislature how he feels about secrecy in government affairs. 
