J Panther fans were stunned on Friday night when one of the Panthers was injured during the Glen Rose game. Tod Anderson received spinal injuries while playing on defense at linebacker. He was taken to the Blackwell Lospital, then rushed to the Mendrick Medical Center at Abilene. Report say he has injuries to his sixth and seventh vertebraes. He has been taken out of intensive care and is now in a private room. His room number is 7711 and his family reported on Wednesday morning that he is doing well and is in good spirits. Progress reports on Tod will be given as time goes on.

It was on the same day 11 years that we had to report the same news on Bill Clark. It was on September 26, 1969 that Bill was injured. We are all praying that Tod will recover completely.

A fund has been started by friends and concerned folks here to help with the expenses of the family. Most stores in town have containers for donations, or they can be sent to the First National Bank or to the Gormann Progress and we will see that the money is deposited in the fund. There is not a lot folks can do at this time except to show the family our love and concern, and that is exactly what the folks here feel for the Anderson family.

NUMBER THIRTY-THREE PANTHERS HOST BULL IN HOMECOMING GAME

The Panthers really got it all together on Friday night when they hosted the Glen Rose Tigers and held the Tigers scoreless while amassing 36 points. However, fans were not celebrating due to the fact that one of the Panther players, Tod Anderson, linebacker and fullback, was injured during the second quarter and was taken from the field in the ambulance to Blackwell Hospital, then later transferred to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene with spinal injuries. Strangely enough, this injury to Tod happened on the same date as the injury to Bill Clark (also spinal injury) 11 years ago, on September 26. At last report Tod was off the critical list and was expected to be moved from intensive care to a private room. The injury was reported as the number 6 and 7 vertebra. There will be a more complete report of his injuries elsewhere in this issue.

The Big Red got on the scoreboard the first time they got their hands on the ball going 81 yards in 13 plays featuring a 37 yard scamper by Jimmy Johnson. Johnson got the touchdown on an 11 yard run with 3:28 left in the first quarter. Johnson also ran for the two pointer to make the score 8-0. The two teams traded possessions before the Panthers scored again, taking the ball on the Tiger 31 and scoring in 5 plays with Mark Swanner getting the TD on a 21 yard pass from Dane Gressett with 4:01 letf in the second quarter. The run for points failed and the score read 14-0.

The Panthers added another score before half time with Jimmy Johnson scoring on a 4 yard pass play with just 4 seconds left. The touchdown had been set up by a beautiful 61 yard run by Steve Spivey. Jacky Johnson ran for the two points and the Big Red led 22 to 0 at half time.

The Panthers got on the scoreboard again with 9:52 left in the third period when Jimmy Johnson broke into the open and raced 50 yards for the TD on the first play

following his recovery of a Tiger fumble on the 50. Spivey added the two pointer on a run and the score was 30-0.

The final Panther tally came on a 7 yard run by Spivey with 2:12 left in the third period. The drive covered 69 yards in 10 plays and featured a 19 yard run by Johnson and a beautiful 30 yard pass to Ted Underwood. The run for points failed and the final score read 36 to 0.

Jimmy Johnson was the leading ground gainer with 168 yards on 18 carries.

Spivey got 76 on just 5 tries. David Pettit had 21 on 9 tries. Greg Skiles had 10 on 5, Tod Anderson got 6 on 2 and Gressett had 3 on 2 keepers.




