14 Mile Highway Project Slated For Eastland County

AUSTIN, June 26 — A new 14-mile stretch of state highway near Cisco (Eastland County) was designated today by the Texas Highway Commission.

Hal Woodward of Coleman, member of the Commission, said the Texas Highway Department has been directed to negotiate right of way for a highway that will extend from U. S. Highway 80 one mile west of Cisco south to Farm to Market Road 569, one mile north of Sabanna Church.

Estimated cost to the state for right of way is \$40,000 and construction is \$340,000, Woodward said.

Advance planning through the schematic stage of more than five miles of Interstate Highway 20 in Eastland County was authorized today, June 26, by the Texas Highway Commission.

The Commission ruling directed State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer to determine the right of way requirements for the section of superhighway from a point one and a half miles east of Ranger to three miles west of the Erath County line.

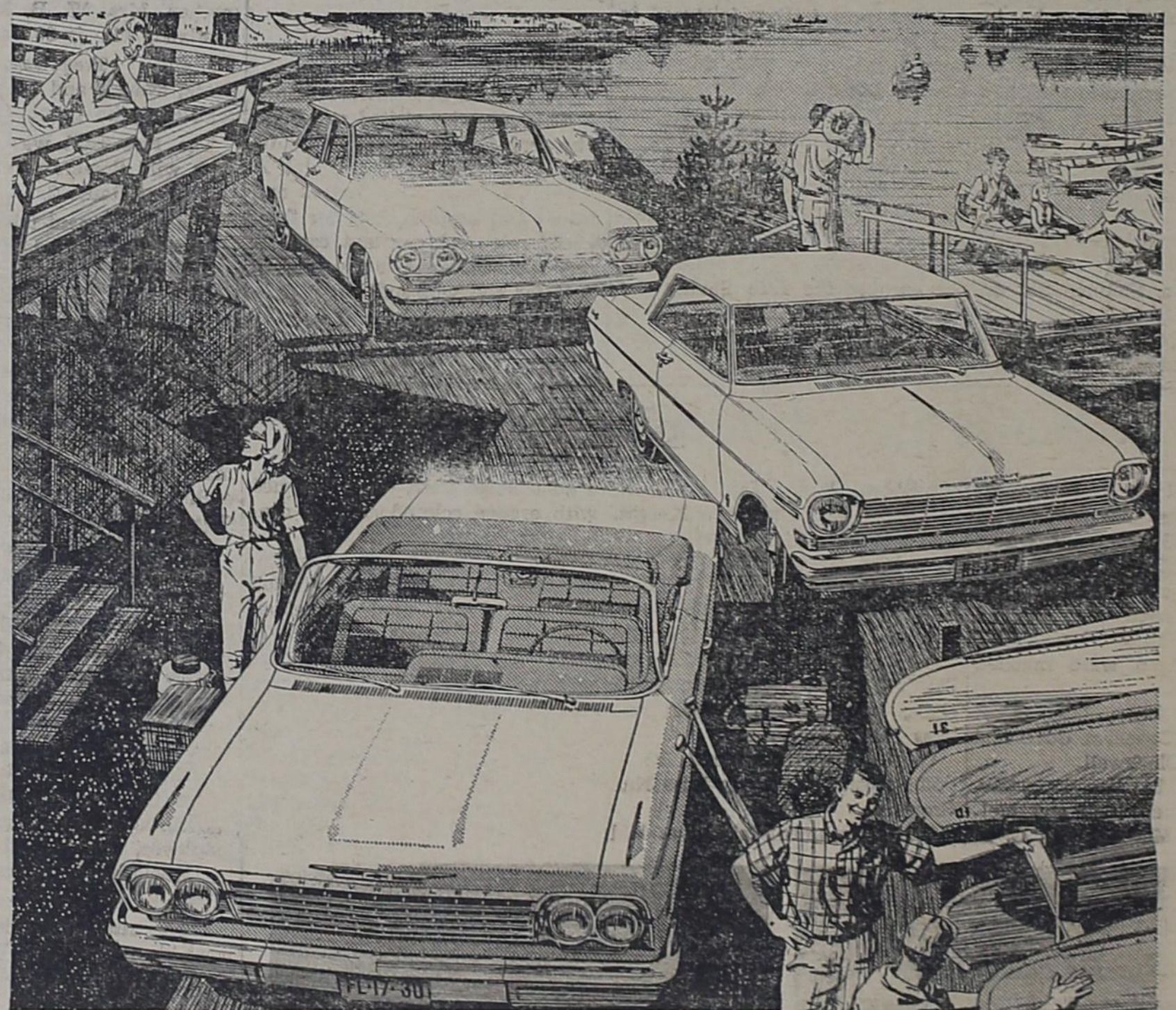

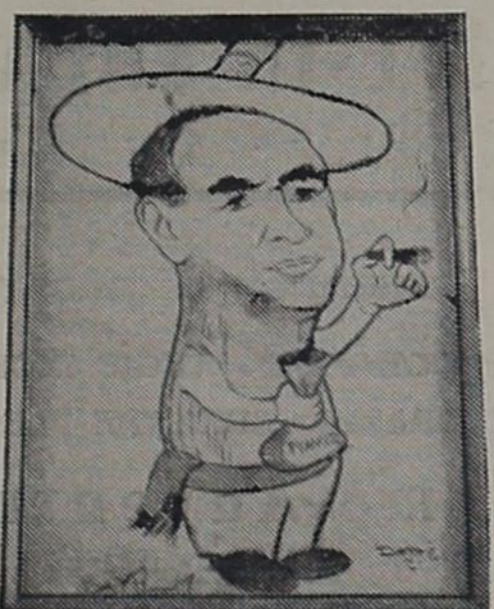

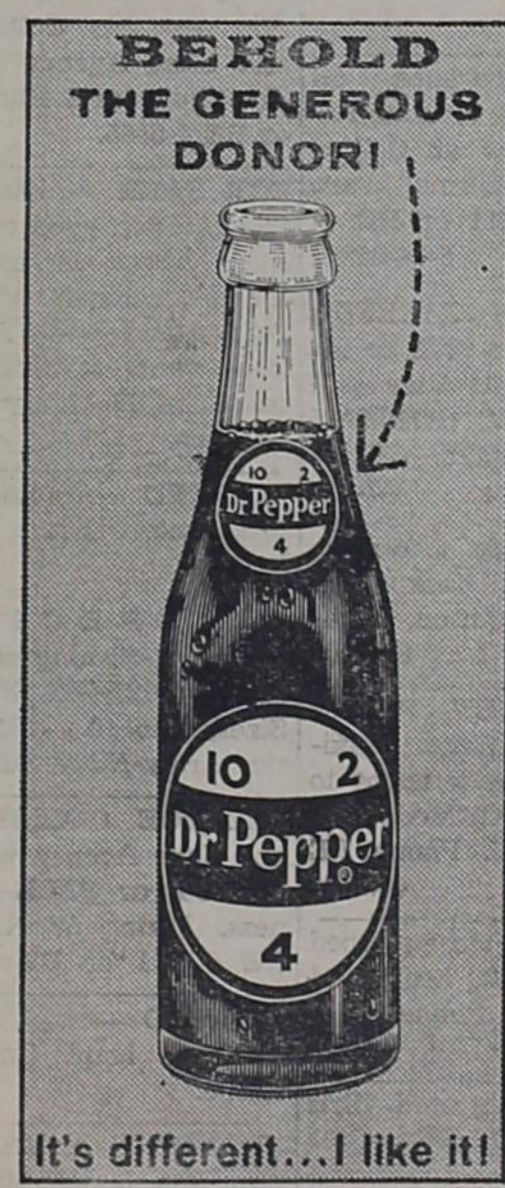

HOUSTON - The election of R. H. Venn as a member of the board of directors of Humble Oil & Refining Company was announced today by C. E. Reistle, Jr., president.



Mr. Venn will transfer to Houston from New Orleans, where he has been a vice president in charge of the company's Southeast Eso Region.

C. G. Herrington, who has been general manager of the Southeast Eso Region, was named to succeed Mr. Venn as vice president in charge of the region, and A. A. Diffey, who has been serving in Houston as executive assistant to the Humble board, will transfer to New Orleans, where he will succeed Mr. Herrington as regional general manager.

The changes are effective August 1, and will bring the Humble board membership to twelve. All three men began their oil industry careers in the early 1930's. Mr. Venn with Humble, Mr. Herrington with The Carter Oil Company, and Mr. Diffey with Esso Standard Oil Company. HAIL HEREFORD BREED DURING TEXAS CLINIC

FORT WORTH — Hereford breeders were told here recently that they've got the finest product man has ever known in their whiteface cattle herds.

Jake Hess of McLean made this statement during concluding activities of the South Central Hereford Progress Clinic at Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum. The meeting attracted 560 Hereford breeders from 19 states and Mexico.

Cautioning the group, Hess said, "We should think very seriously before we begin to tamper with the qualities of today's Herefords."

Hess also stressed the importance of today's stock shows, calling them an important segment of the Hereford industry.

"That's the only way we can keep the breed's high qualities in the public's eye," said Hess.

Earlier, the breeders were urged by Glen Bratcher of Oklahoma State University to strive for an animal which would satisfy the producer, feeder, packer, retailer and consumer.

Stanley Anderson of Texas Tech foretold of a need for steers that can fatten quicker in the feedlots.

"And," continued Anderson, "we still need cattle with the ability to put on natural fleshing."

In the concluding speech, Paul Swaffler of Kansas City, Mo., American Hereford Association secretary, advised the group to take the information they had been furnished during the clinic and put it to use in promoting Herefords.

Swaffler lashed out at attempts being made to mongrelize the Hereford breed.

"We've got to fight this," said Swaffler. "We think too much of the breeders who have been before us to let this happen."

The Fort Worth clinic was one of three being conducted by the American Hereford Association throughout the nation.
