Relocation of Hwy. 6 In Eastland OK

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Sept. 25 — The Texas Highway Commission today agreed to join with the City of Eastland and Eastland County in a relocation of 2.3 miles of State Highway 6.

The relocation will take place extending from the present State Highway 6 near the south city limit of Eastland, north along Walnut Street, to present State Highway 6 north of Eastland. It will include a grade separation at the T&P Railroad.

The Highway Department will participate in the purchase of right of way to the extent of \$25,000 and will construct the new highway location and the railroad grade separation at an additional cost of \$280,000.

The City and County of Eastland will provide the necessary right of way for the project with the Highway Department participating in the cost.

The project is to be submitted to the Highway Commission for financing in the next available highway program.

Eastland And Comanche Group Plans Research

Officials of the Eastland and Comanche Farm Bureau and Farmers Union and interested producers held a meeting in the office of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association at Gorman on October 8 to discuss the possibility of carrying on a peanut research program in the two counties.

The group discussed a plan of collection centered around a community-by-community drive in the two counties to enlist the cooperation of peanut producers in the program. Volunteer workers would go from farm to farm seeking to have each grower sign a bank authorization form permitting a deduction from his account of a standard deduction per acre based on the total peanut acres the producer is farming. This deduction was discussed in the range of 20 to 30 cents per acre.

The group discussed setting a goal of total collections for the two counties and agreed that if this goal, whatever amount is decided upon, cannot be reached, each grower's contribution would be refunded to him. This plan will prevent the costs of the program being carried by a small percentage of the growers in the two counties.

Many research needs are evident in the two counties whose problems are very much in common due to the similarity in soil, rainfall, and methods of farming. One idea suggested was that a small plot of land be purchased near the line between the two counties and that the Texas Experiment Station be contracted with for experimental projects which the growers deem important.

Another meeting is planned later in the fall to formulate definite goals and discuss specific research projects.

Psychiatry Is On Advance States Dr. Stubblefield

Dr. R. L. Stubblefield, who was named Saturday as one of the psychiatrists to examine former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker, feels that his profession is moving out of its old climate of pessimism into the new sunshine of "therapeutic optimism."

The 42-year-old head of the psychiatry department at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School was named in the court order releasing Walker.

Under Dr. Stubblefield's direction the psychiatric services and staff of the school and of Woodlawn and Parkland Hospitals, have been enlarged and expanded.

Dr. Stubblefield, Born Jan. 17, 1920, at Carbon, is a graduate of Gorman High School, John Tarleton College, the University of Texas and the UT Medical Branch at Galveston.

He is the son of Dr. and Mrs. M. L. Stubblefield, former residents of Gorman.

Olen B. Rone, of Gorman, has been appointed as a member of the three-man Eastland County Farmers Home Administration Committee, the agency's County Supervisor, Homer P. Cole, announced this week. The appointment is for three years and begins on July 1.

Mr. Rone succeeds Frank H. Park whose 3-year term expired this year. The other two members serving with Mr. Rone are James D. Alexander of Rising Star and Clarence L. Snider of Gorman.

The local Farmers Home Administration county committee's reviews applications by farmers and other rural families for six different types of agricultural, housing and water loans made in Eastland County. In addition, the committee advises with the county supervisor regarding the adapting of national loan policies to local conditions.

During the past fiscal year ended June 30, a total of \$343,305.00 in Farmers Home Administration loans were made through the agency's local county office. Each loan is accompanied to the extent necessary by technical farm and financial management assistance.

Mr. Rone has spent his lifetime in farming and is currently the owner and operator of a 345 acre peanut and ranch land farm.

County Supervisor Homer P. Cole says that Mr. Rone's practical farming experience will enable him to make a real contribution to the county committee's actions when they review loan applications.

RECORD ENROLLMENT OF 1512 AT TARLETON STATE

STEPHENVILLE, Sept. 28 — Enrollment at Tarleton State College reached 1512 Thursday to set a new all-time record. The previous record enrollment of 1435 students was established 17 years ago when World War II veterans returned to the campus in 1946. The present enrollment exceeds last year's total of 1389 by more than nine percent.

College Registrar Stuart Chilton reported a breakdown of 963 freshmen, 369 sophomores, 120 juniors and 60 seniors for the 1962-63 school year.

The 60 seniors constitute the first graduating class since TSC was granted senior college status by the Fifty-Sixth Legislature of Texas in 1959. Originally established at John Tarleton College in 1899, the school remained a degree granting institution only briefly due to lack of funds. As a junior college and academy Tarleton was donated to the state of Texas by the citizens of Stephenville and became a part of the Texas A&M College System in 1917.







THERE IS A STORY GOING AROUND of the Russian agricultural commissar who was checking on a satellite country's farm production. He asked one farm manager, "How is potato production?" To which the manager replied, "The piles of potatoes reach almost to Heaven." The commissar angrily commented, "You know there is no Heaven," to which the farm manager responded, "Yes, I

know, and there are no potatoes."

RECENTLY THERE HAS BEEN CONSIDERABLE publicity regarding the increase in the number of Federal employees. 




