As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — DEMOCRATS AND REPUBLICANS are trying to see which one can outdo the other on the matter called Civil Rights. Organizations particularly interested in this issue are vying with one another for the forefront, and seemingly the one which can produce the most sensational action has the headlines. Moderation and reason are pushed in the background, which means more the radical on both sides emerge as the champion. As much as the President and the Attorney General have done in their official capacities, they are under criticism from many of these organizations which think they have not done enough.

IN LAW, A PERSON'S ILLEGAL ACTIONS OR HIS FAILURE TO ACT LEGALLY can result in his conviction and punishment. A new twist to this historic and basic concept of law was recently demonstrated in Berkeley, California, when the people of that community came very near voting away a part of their vital liberty.

IT SEEMS THE OFFICIALS OF BERKELEY first passed an ordinance which made it unlawful for a landlord to refuse to rent property to any person for reason of race, color, religion or national origin. A referendum forced the matter to a vote. The proposal was barely defeated.

THE QUESTION WAS NOT ON WHETHER THERE should be an ordinance against a transaction of this sort by reason of race, color, religion or national origin, but rather it placed authority in the hands of a Board to determine the intent of the owner of the property when he refused to rent to certain individuals.

IN OTHER WORDS, UNDER THE PURPOSED LAW, the act of turning someone away was either legal or illegal, depending on what the motives were. It would be legal to refuse to rent to someone because he was a bad risk or a moral delinquent; it would be illegal to refuse to rent to the same person for reasons of race, color, religion or national origin. But who is to say with certainty what a man's motives are?

THE FRAMERS OF THE ORDINANCE were well aware of the legal difficulties involved. To circumvent this they resorted to an ingenious device. They simply provided that "any person who shall in any manner willfully violate any order of compliance made by the Board shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500 or by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or both."

THUS, THE ACT OF REFUSING TO RENT OR SELL to someone for reasons set out in the ordinance was not itself punishable, but the failure to comply with an order of the Board was punishable. It follows that, under these terms, the only matter a Court would have to decide was whether the landlord had complied with the Board's order, regardless of what the order was. Under this arrangement the Board would have the power to investigate and hold hearings, not in accordance with any fixed and recognized legal procedure, but under rules promulgated by themselves. The Board could only act against landlords and would be exclusively empowered to decide whether a landlord has violated the ordinance.

THERE ARE A GREAT MANY INSTANCES in history which show that people have voted away their own liberty. The incentive may be for greater benefits from a government or it may be inspired by a sympathetic emotionalism. Whatever the cause, liberty and freedom are not easy to recapture once relinquished.

Important Notice To Postal Patrons

Our five-digit ZIP Code is 76454, Postmaster Baze announced today.

Everyone in Gorman will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail.

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1, 1963.

Postmaster Baze stressed the importance of all citizens of Gorman and delivery area learning this city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. "In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used."

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing," Mr. Baze said. "It should follow the city and state in addresses."
He cited this example of the proper use of ZIP Code:

John Doe
Box or Route
Gorman, Texas 76454

The new ZIP Code plan, Mr. Baze said, for the first time, will permit the Post Office Dept. to short-cut repeated address reading.

"The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination," Baze said. "Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error."

"With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery."

Mr. Baze stated "that when ZIP Code is in full swing, the United States will have the most modern system of mail distribution and delivery in existence."

The play school for pre-school age children held June 10th. thru the 14th. was well attended with an enrollment of 22 and an average daily attendance of 17.

The girls in Homemaking I were in charge of the school under the direction of Mrs. Nell Rainey, homemaking teacher.

Each girl had assigned duties which rotated daily, this permitted everyone to know the day before what was expected of her the following day in order to make necessary preparations.

The following is a schedule of a days program held each day during the four-day school:

1. Opening exercises, a devotional song and prayer.
 2. Songs - motion or action songs. Examples - "The Rain Comes Down," "I'm a Little Tea Pot."
 3. Stories - suitable for children.
 4. Supervised outside play, each girl responsible for five games.
 5. Refreshments - prepared and served by three girls.
 6. Entertainment inside after refreshments, consisting of hand work.
- Play school participation offers a realistic way of teaching home and family living and helps youth to learn more quickly about children, personality development, child behavior and how to get along with others.
