

Parents should check for completeness and correctness, make any needed changes, promptly sign and return the form to the homeroom teacher of the child that brought it home.

A school-age child is one who will be at least six years of age and not over seventeen years of age on September 1, 1964.

Parents of a child who is, or wil be, six years of age by this coming September 1, should be sure that their child is enumerated before the close of this month. If the child has no older brother or sister in school, and if no census enumerator has contacted you by Friday, January 24th., please call or send word to the school superintendent's office.



Do We Need A New Calendar?

Since man first notched a stick, the calendar has caused problems. It has lead to riots and to dissatisfactions that have

caused cleavages in nations. Our own present calendar is misleading and inaccurate. This chart, from Compton's Pictured Encyclopedia, shows the problems that are encountered in determining a date based on either the Julian or the Gregorian Calendar.

The basic problem is that our year actually is 365 days, 6 hours, 9 minutes, 9.5 seconds long. Thus, no calendar to date has given a true measure of our year.

School Census Blanks will be given out to children in school and it is important that this information be given:


- 1. Surname, first name, middle initial, the month, day and year in which each child was born.

Warming up your auto in the driveway before you go to work these wintery mornings can have a harmful - even fatal - effect on nearby evergreen and deciduous shrubs. Exhaust fumes have been known to kill needles and entire branches of evergreens.

Both evergreens and deciduous plants absorb the fumes through the lenticels and breathing pores on their bark. Then, often months later, the shrubs develop what looks like singed leaves and branches.

Secondary effects may cause ne plants to break their winter dormancy. Flower and leaf buds will form and, of course, will be killed by cold winds and low temperatures.


