First Methodist Receives Church of The Year Award

Rev. Robert Sanders, pastor of Gorman First Methodist Church, accepted the Church Award of The Year for the church during the Thursday morning session, June 4, of the Central Texas Annual Conference, held at the First Methodist Church in Fort Worth.

Summary of the church accomplishments reads: Building the Kingdom at home and around the world, describes the works of the First Methodist Church, Gorman, Texas.

This church of less than 250 total members and 180 resident members now has property valued at approximately \$130,000 and all built within the last seven years. This congregation is ahead three and one-half years on repayment of the church building debt while continuing full giving to world and national missions and as well other Methodist causes. A portion of the building debt has been made possible through participation in the Lord's Acre Plan which was started by Rev. Robert Haynes, now Chairman of the Town and Country Commission. The members of the church are proud of their per capita giving for the past seven years has averaged \$98 and are determined it will even be higher during the coming years. This is being made possible through a strong program in stewardship education, using the Roy Farrow Plan and the Town and Country presentation, "Our Church at Work Today".

A beautiful new three bedroom red brick parsonage, complete with air conditioning and fire place, containing over 2,000 square feet of living area, is located next door to the high-steeped, colonial style church plant in this town of 1,100, known as the peanut capitol of the World.

Three years ago, when this conference began to promote the idea of a larger parish in order to give our full time ministers a larger opportunity, Gorman church readily adopted Desdemona Methodist Church as an Extended Ministry. Both churches have worked in harmony and a better ministry is found here than ever before.

Under the able leadership of Rev. Robert Sanders, a full time, trained minister, the parish has gone forward in every phase if it's work, even though the population of the area has shown a decline during the past ten years, many new members have been added to the church rolls and the average Sunday School and Worship Services have shown a steady increase during the past two years. Thirty-four new members have been won to the Gorman church and 13 new members have been won to the Desdemona Church during the past two years that Rev. Sanders has been pastor.

Rev. Sanders received his BA Degree from Texas Wesleyan College, his BD Degree from Perkins School of Theology, and an STM from Boston University.

It is with great pleasure and pride that the conference recognizes the Gorman Methodist Church Parish and its pastor, the Rev. Robert Sanders, for the outstanding achievement during this conference year.
