A pasture short course for adult farmers will be held October 12th. through the 15th. under the sponsorship of Gorman High School Agriculture Department, according to Mr. W. R. Taylor, Superintendent, and Mr. E. C. Bramlett, teacher of vocational agriculture.



Mr. Phillip Nix, pasture specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M.

Mr. Nix holds a BS degree in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M University, and has completed work at A&M toward an MS degree. He has also done work in Agronomy. He has had nineteen years of field experience as a county agricultural agent, where much of the emphasis was on pasture production.

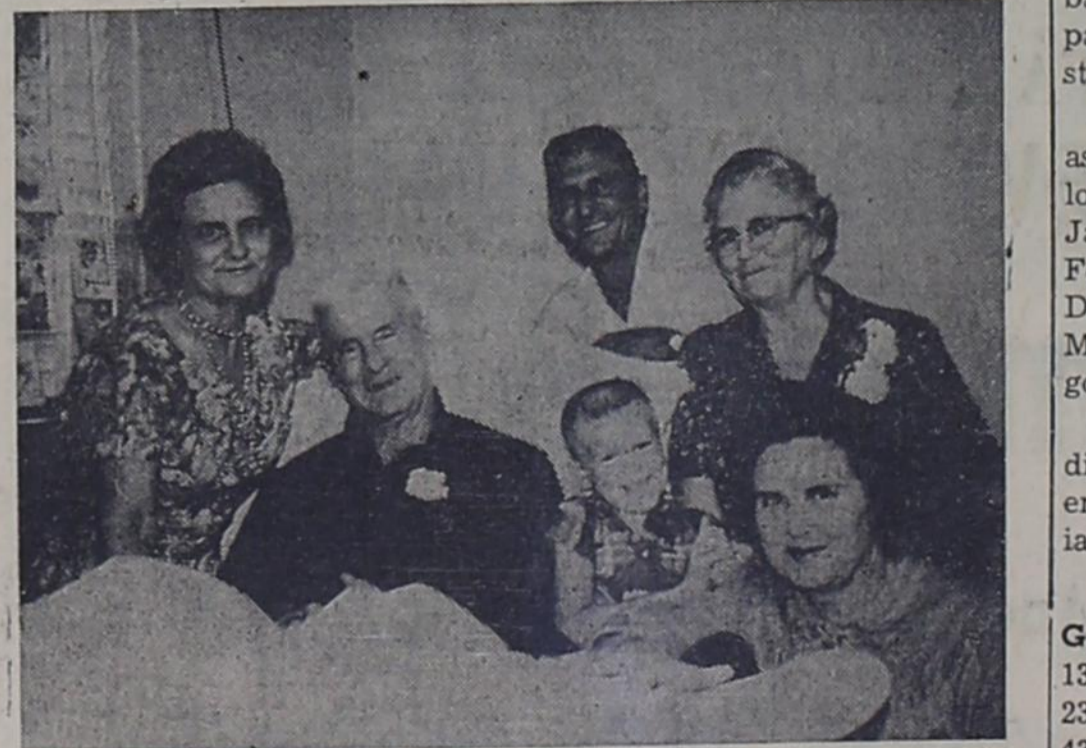

Eastland County Peanut Tour Slated For October 15th.

Three irrigated and three dry-land crops will be inspected during the all-day Eastland County Peanut Tour on Thursday, October 15th, it was announced today from the County Agent's office. The tour is being sponsored by the crops division of the County Program Building Committee.

All of the farms to be visited on the tour will be in the southeastern part of the county in the Gorman area it was said.

Irrigated Spanish type peanuts will be seen on the Bill Andry, Claude Fuller and the Wayne Eaves farms. On the latter farm a patch of the Virginia Runner peanuts, a popular variety in the old South, particularly in Alabama and Georgia, will be observed.

A field of the Starr variety of Spanish peanuts, named in honor of W. B. Starr, one of the first growers of peanuts in the county who lives near Scanton, will be inspected on the Mitchell Campbell farm. The peanuts on this farm are being grown for seed certification.

Other dryland peanut crops will be inspected on the D. B. Warren farm and the Vernon Files place. A demonstration on nematode control on peanuts will be seen also on the Warren farm. This is being conducted through the cooperation of officials of the Dow Chemical Co., manufacturers of the soil fumigant, Tellone.

The group will leave from the Brown Jug Cafe in Gorman at 9 a. m. and will return there for lunch at noon. During the noon break Ross Wilson, Manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, will discuss the Aflatoxin problem.

B. C. Langley, Stephenville Agricultural Experiment Station Superintendent and developer of the Starr variety of peanuts, has accepted an invitation to attend.

County Road Status Is Studied

EASTLAND (RNS) — The special meeting of the Eastland County Commissioner's Court, held at 10 a. m. Monday in the Commissioner's Courtroom, heard testimony from over the county concerning rural road maintenance.

County Judge Scott Bailey appointed Commissioners Glenn Justice of the Gorman precinct and Tip Arthur of the Eastland-Ranger precinct to check into the legal status of the roads under discussion.

These roads are new in the county and are access roads to the shoreline of Lake Leon. Generally, the north short of the lake is in the Eastland-Ranger precinct and the south shore in the Gorman precinct.

The county has been grading these new roads around the lake since the lake was built in the middle 50's. However, following the 1963 opinion handed down by Eastland County's 91st. District Court forbidding use of county road equipment on city or private property, there have been continued questions as to the legality of county work on the lake access roads.

The Eastland County Water Board, which controls the lake, has secured deeds for the lake road acreage from the owners to the county. However, questions have arisen over this procedure. Judge Bailey said the Commis-
