Only a few items of furniture were saved by workmen using hoes and reaching through the windows to drag the items to the window that could be reached safely.

The high winds caused the fire to spread very quickly and hampered firemen's efforts to save any portion of the structure.



Later in the day, much later, the Hansens opened their gailywrapped Christmas presents-and paid host to the good citizens of Grandview.



Make sure your youngster rides a sturdy, well-equipped bike, and teach him how to take care of it.

him on having safe fun on a bike: Know and obey traffic laws. Traffic lights and signs are for

bike riders, too. Ride with the traffic. A good bike-rider always rides on the

right hand edge of the road. before stopping or turning, then take hold of the handle bars

Ride single file. If your friend has a bike and you ride together, ride one in front of the other, with plenty of space between.

When traffic is heavy at a corner get off your bike and push it across, following the crosswalks.

Light up at night. Do all your riding in the daytime if you can. If you must be out at night, be sure you have your white light in front and your red reflector and tail light on the rear, just as automobiles do. Wear clothing that is light colored or that shines in the dark so you can be seen

Use a carrier or basket for books and packages. If you have no basket or carrier, tie your books and packages to the frame.

Ride one to a bike - unless you have a special bicycle - built-for-

One of the most dangerous things a bide rider can do is "hitch a ride" by a moving truck or car. You could easily be thrown down perhaps in front of a car or squeezed against a truck or bus.
