So, I thanked the youngsters, and since that time have done the work myself. I was probably violating several labor laws by even letting the boys come in the shop.

I know this sounds old-fashioned, but much of our so-called juvenile delinquency is caused by youngsters not being allowed to work. I notice Governor Connally is somewhat opposed to paying students the minimum wage scale

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

Omar Burleson Urges DESDEMONA **Cut Of Oil Imports**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24 - Rep. Omar Burleson (D.-Tex.) said today that something must be done about the increasing outflow of dollars due to oil imports if the chronic deficit in the Nation's balance of payments is to be "successfully attacked."

Pointing out that the value of oil imports exceed oil exports by \$1 billion a year, he said tanker transportation costs paid to foreigners and U.S. military purchases of foreign oil bring the Nation's deficit due to petroleum to \$1.5 billion yearly.

The Texas Congressman said the adverse baalnce of trade in petroleum has ranged from a low of 27 percent to a high of 40 percent of the total U.S. payments deficit six years, 1958 through 1963.




