Students who desire more information about the program and who wish to apply for a National Defense Student Loan Program are asked to see Jack Allen, Business Manager of Ranger Junior College.

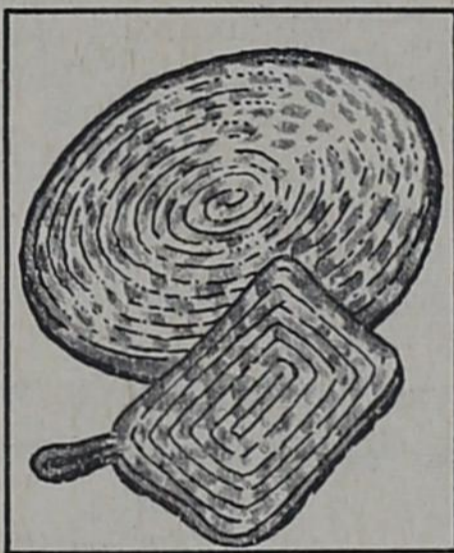

ROBERT KIRK RECEIVES PROMOTION TO CAPTAIN

Captain and Mrs. Robert Kirk, Lee and Elizabeth, are visiting his mother, Mrs. R. L. Kirk. They are enroute from Boston, Mass. to San Diego, Calif. where they will embark for an assignment in Japan. Bob became a midshipman at the United States Naval Academy, class of 1945, July, 1941, after having attended Tarleton State College for one year. On graduation in 1945, Ensign Kirk was assigned to the USS Boston, which operated with the 3rd. and 5th. Fleets against Japan. The Boston remained in Japan until February 1946 as part of the occupation forces. After inactivation of the Boston Lt. jg. Kirk served on the USS Tucson, again in the Pacific Fleet. Included in this tour of duty was a deployment to China, operating out of the parts of Shanghai and Tsingtao. During this period he was married to Carrol Ann Page-ler of Portland, Oregon and San Diego, California. In 1949 Kirk commenced a three year course of Naval Post Graduate training. He received a BS degree in Engineering Electronics from the U. S. Naval Post Graduate School and a MS degree in Physics from the University of California at Los Angeles. This course was followed in 1952 by almost four years in Key West, Florida where Lt. Kirk planned

evacuations and evaluated new sonars and underwater sound system for Commander, Operational Test and Evaluation Force. Joining the USS DeHaven in the Pacific Fleet as Executive Officer and Navigator in 1956, LCDR Kirk saw two deployments to the Western Pacific, participating in the Operation Handtack series of nuclear weapons test in Eniwitok, operations in connection with the Bureau of Ordnance Technical evaluation of a rocket-launched anti-submarine torpedo (RAT) and the rescue of four merchant seaman in the mid-Pacific. From DeHaven, LCDR Kirk went to the Armed Forces Staff College in Norfolk, Va. This was followed in 1959 with a tour of duty in the office of the Chief of Naval Operations. CDR Kirk took command of the USS Jonas Ingram in July, 1961, after going aboard at Cape of Good Hope, Africa, and participating with four other ships in an extensive people to people program as part of Solant Amity II. This was followed by a NATO Exercise in Northern European waters, then a seven months Mediterranean deployment, serving as Flagship. Kirk has been doing Naval Research at Cambridge University for the past two years.

Brucellosis Retesting Of Eastland County Cattle To Begin Soon

Restesting of 20% of the cattle herds of Eastland County for Brucellosis will begin in the next few days according to Dr. J. B. Henderson, Coleman, area veterinarian for the Texas Animal Health Commission. Buddy Henderson, Stephenville, will be in charge of this re-testing work, Dr. Henderson said. Herds that had reactor animals when the cattle herds over the entire county was tested for this dread animal disease two years ago will be retested as well as enough other herds to equal at least 20% of the herds over the county. This testing is necessary in order to comply with the regulations and to be eligible for re-certification as a clean county. Nearby counties have, for the most part, been re-certified. Owners of animals that would like to have them tested are asked to contact the County Agents office in the courthouse in Eastland.
