

10 Amendments On **Ballot In November Second Election**

Constitution will be put before the voters on Tuesday, November 2, including proposals to increase the governor's term of office to four years and to increase the terms of state representatives to 10 four years.

Three of the ten amendments 1 relate to state education, three to 4 general welfare, and four to administrative proposals.

Listed as Amendment 1 on the 0 ballot - College Building Fund: 2 (An increase in state ad-valorem | 0 tax from 5c to 10c on the \$100 0 valuation. Five schools to be added to those already benefitting from funds obtained through the ad-valorem tax are: Arlington State College, Midwestern Uni-Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Sikes of versity, University of Houston, Bangs announce the engagement Pan American College and Angelo

Amendment 2 — Veterans Land Fund (Would increase Veterans Land Fund by \$200 Million from sale of bonds if passed. If not passed, the Veterans Land Program will cease on December 1,

Amendment 3 - Medical Care: (If passed would enable the state to continue its cooperation with the Federal Government in providing assistance and medical care to the aged, needy blind, and permanently disabled.

Amendment 4 - Four Year Term For Governor and other statewide officials - (If passed would increase to four years the governor's term as well as all other state-wide officials: lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, treasurer, land commissioner, secretary of state, and commissioner of agriculture.

Amendment 5 - Teacher Retirement Fund.

Amendment 6 — College Student Loan Fund: (The administration of the Texas Teachers Retirement Fund would be clarified by Amendment 5, and Amendment 6 would authorize the sale of as much as \$85 million of general obligation bonds by the state to provide loans to needy college students, which would be repaid with interest.)

Exemption: (Tax exemptions to hospitals which give more than in Dallas. \$1.5 million annually for free hospital and medical care to the inapplies only to Herman Hospital Sam Houston State College in Houston.)

Amendment 8 — Automatic Retirement of Judges (at age 75): (Provides for the retirement of state and district and appeallate judges at between ages 70 and 75.)

Amendment 9 - Salary Increase for Lieutenant Governor and Speaker: (Permit the Legislature To Attend Convention itself to set an annual salary for the speaker and the lieutenant In San Angelo governor, as well as increase per diem allowance to all legislators when in session to \$20 from \$12

Amendment 10 - Four Year Term For State Representatives: members of the State House of Representatives. Members of the 'Classes" so that one-half of the membership would face election every two years, which is the plan now used by the Texas Senate where terms are four years.)
