Arrangements must be made for a site, engineering and plans will have to be completed and then, of course, will come actual construction of the pool.

The major problem at this time is that of raising the additional cash needed to begin construction. About \$4,000 was raised in October during the Miss Gorman Days activities. It is felt that \$10,000 cash will be necessary prior to construction. Therefore, the committee is urging everyone and each business who pledged to pay first year pledges now. You may merely deposit your pledge in the Swimming Pool Fund at the bank or give it to Charles Duran, Ross Wilson, Bernice Jeffs or leave your check or money at the City Office. The Committee would like to have all first year pledges not later than February 1. If the pool is to be constructed for use this year, plans and construction contracts need to be completed shortly after this date.

## Pint-Sized Fleet Does A Big Job

The following newspaper clipping was brought in for publication by Mrs. Verlie B. Turner.

CHU LAI, Vietnam — One of the smallest but busiest fleets in the U. S. Navy operates here around the clock within a five-mile radius and only with a crew of 10 sailors.

The fleet consists of two pusher boats and a landing craft mechanized (Mike) boat.

The crews live on the boats with a steady diet of C-rations and sleep in a shelter they built on the stern of the Mike boat with cardboard, driftwood and slats from orange crates.

The fleet's home port is adjacent to Chu Lai's landing ship tank sand ramp near the mouth of the Vung An Hoa River. Their mission ranges from pushing landing ship tanks through treacherous surf over a tricky sand bar to shuttling vehicles across the river.

Boatswain Mate 2C Verlie B. Turner of Gorman, Texas, is senior man in the 10-sailor group. He skips pusher boat FA-23 with the assistance of fireman Jerry L. Deboer of Ripon, Cal., and Noah L. Lewis of Baton Rouge, La.

**Ordinance**

An ordinance declaring and making it a nuisance for any owner or his agent to permit weeds or grass to grow beyond designated height during designated period of the year on premises, and declaring same to be unlawful; making it the duty of the owner, his agent or occupant of such premises to control weeds and grass thereon; authorizing the Director of Public Works to control said weeds and grass if the owner, occupant or his agent should fail to do so, and charging the actual expense thereof against the owner and certify same to the City Commission, providing notice to such owner of such charges; and providing for a hearing thereon providing for such charges if found to be reasonable and the actual cost thereof to be assessed against the owner, and said lot, tract or parcel of land upon which said nuisance existing and provided that such assessment shall constitute a lien against said premises and a personal charge against the owner; directing the tax collector to collect same as other taxes are collected on such land, providing a penalty for violation of this ordinance, containing a severance clause and declaring an emergency. 2-1-27c

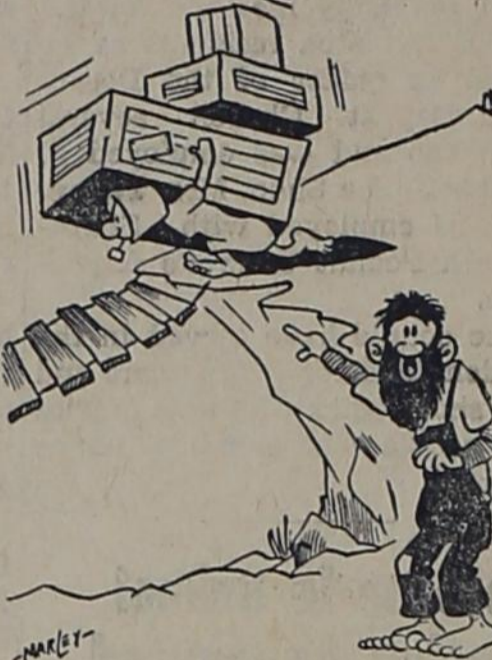
**Banquet Guests Express Appreciation**

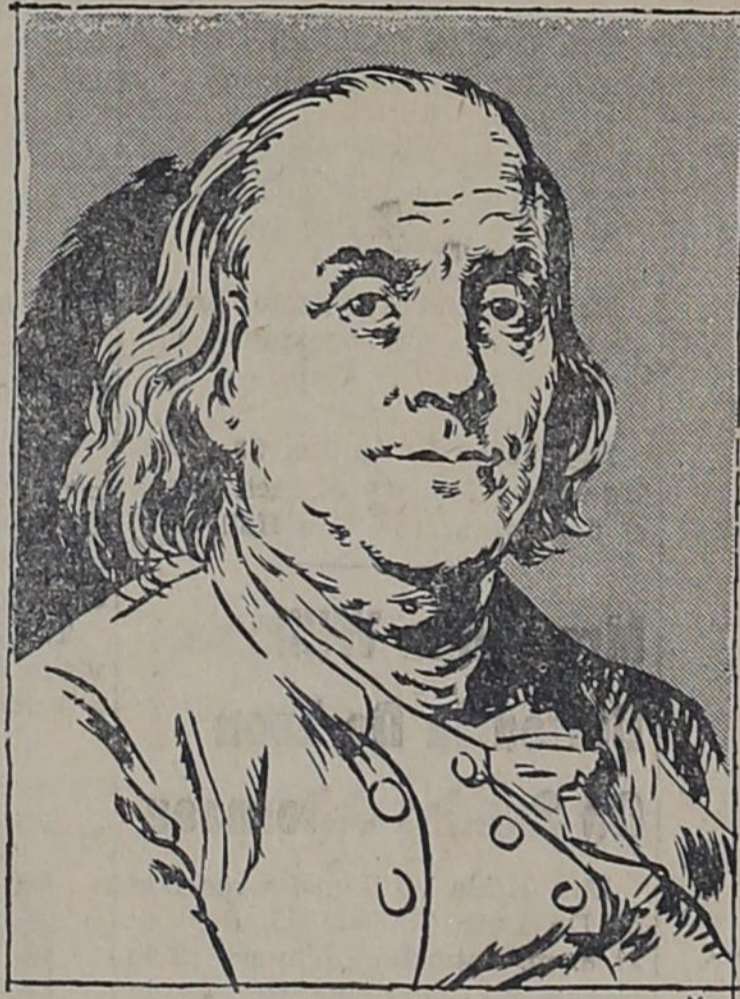

**Conservation Is Topic  
Of Study On Tuesday  
For Excelsior Club**

The Excelsior Club enjoyed a study of "Conservation" Tuesday afternoon when they met at the Brown Jug Cafe Dining Room.

During the brief business session, conducted by the president, Mrs. Ed Wyatt, two charter members, Mrs. E. C. Sutton and Mrs. J. E. Foster, and Mrs. John Kirk were named as outstanding members of the GFWC who will be honored at a Diamond Jubilee Celebration to be held in March.

Mrs. Lawrence Eison gave a report on Federation.

The program was in charge of Mrs. Kirk.

A paper on Wild Animal Life and Its Slaughter as pursued by hunters in Africa for thrills or even a pittance of money was given by Mrs. Nell Rainey. She cited the human reason for a program of conservation and also because of the potential of the animals becoming extinct.

A symposium on the Conservation of Our Natural Resources was conducted by Mrs. Milton Fairbetter with other members of the panel, Mrs. Wyatt and Mrs. Dona Moorman.

The discussion covered a goodly number of the various phases of conservation which are practiced by individuals and groups, many of which are promoted or sponsored by the Federal and

State governments. Health check-ups, visits to the dentist and eye examinations are among the individual practicing, although not commonly termed as conservation.

The care and preservation of forests was probably the country's first move toward conservation of natural resources. Then the flagrant slaughter of animals on the plains and of the fur-bearing animals called for legislation against the kill with restrictions or penalties for same.

Water came under the conservation program in the 1890's and the early 1900's and continues to be one of the Nation's big problems. However, according to the study and conclusion of Wolfgang Langeweische there is no "Shortage of Water," but merely the problem of properly storing water. (Jan. Reader's Digest 1966).

The need for soil conservation was slow to be recognized, but the 1930 programs and the present rest programs are reclaiming and preserving the land.

The Highway Beautification Program, presently the pet project of Mrs. Lyndon Johnson, and the Texas Beautification of Highways and Preservation of Native Floral which was instituted in 1936, the year of the State's Celebration of 100 years of Independence from foreign rule.

**As It Looks  
From Here**

WASHINGTON, D. C. — UNTIL THE VIET NAM SITUATION IS PUT INTO PERSPECTIVE, other legislative matters cannot be properly calculated.

**THE PRESIDENT HAS NOW SUBMITTED A REQUEST** for a supplemental military appropriation of \$12.3 billion, plus \$415 million earmarked to support our efforts in Viet Nam.

**THE FOREIGN AFFAIRS COMMITTEE OF WHICH I AM A MEMBER** will begin a study and hearings on the request in the next few days. There is little doubt but what the entire amount will be approved by the Committee and soon thereafter by the Congress.

**ALTHOUGH REQUESTS FOR MILITARY FUNDS** must be the first order of business and funds must be supplied for every need in the Viet Nam conflict, the Congress is entitled to question certain assumptions of policy.

**THE FIRST ASSUMPTION IS THAT ANY RESPONSE BY THE COMMUNISTS** in North Viet Nam to the peace offensive now being waged would indicate an interest by them in an early negotiated settlement of the war. A part of the peace feelers has been the cessation of bombing of North Viet Nam. The Reds recognize the possibility that when and if the bombing is resumed, it will be at an increased level. If signs of interest, without even negotiating, can keep the United States peace efforts alive, the Communists military build-up and a resupply can be accomplished without interference by air strikes by U. S. planes.

**ANOTHER ASSUMPTION WHICH NEEDS TO BE RE-examined** is whether Hanoi and Red China would agree to a settlement even if the United States withdrew from South Viet Nam. The other side of the coin in this instance could be a desire on the part of the Reds to see the United States become embroiled in a long and endless ground war, which would dissipate our resources.

**THE OTHER ASSUMPTION HIGH IN CONSIDERATION** in

the past has been that Soviet Russia would like a settlement in order to expand her own influence in Southeast Asia and to permit greater attention to containing Red China.

**ON THIS LATTER ASSUMPTION, IT IS CLEAR** that the great preponderance of the hardware and other resources on which North Viet Nam depends is furnished by the Soviet Union and her Eastern European Satellites. There is now a steady stream of ships plying the 7500-mile water route between Odesa, Russia, and Haiphong, North Viet Nam, carrying everything from machine tools to railroad ties, from dump trucks to missiles, from marine motors to petroleum. The Soviets make no secret of their assistance, it having been reported recently in Pravda that the U.S.S.R. does its utmost for the deliveries of Soviet military material, arms, engineering facilities, and the necessary ammunition according to schedule. If Russia cut off all supplies, Hanoi would be forced to negotiate or soon be defeated militarily.

**FOR THIS REASON, IT IS OUR DUTY** to examine proposals for stepped-up trade between the United States and the Communist nations of Eastern Europe. The Congress should examine with penetrating depth the action of the British and other nations friendly to us in furnishing supplies to the North Vietnamese. A step further in the examination of policy is why we are helping the British pull their chestnuts out of the fire in Rhodesia. An answer not yet made publicly clear is why the United States taxpayers should pay for ferrying oil by air into Tanzania and Zambia, Rhodesia's neighbors who must depend on their supply from Rhodesia's pipelines, unless ferried in from outside sources. After all, the United States at one time had a little trouble with England over independence, and a comparable situation exists in Rhodesia today. It is proper to question why we should join in sanctions against Rhodesia while the British supply Castro's Cuba with military buses and supplies to North Viet Nam.
