

## VOLUNTEER FIREMEN DEMONSTRATIONS GIVEN DURING FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Fire drills at Gorman Schools Tuesday were more realistic than usual, the reason being the flames coming from atop the Grade School building, all of which was a part of the Gorman Volunteer Fire Department's 30 minute demonstration to the students and townspeople in observance of Fire Prevention Week.

Grade School used three exits and evacuated the building in one and one-half minute. High School was evacuated in 50 seconds.

Fire Chief Vardie Huff narrated demonstrations on evacuating people from a second story building and how one man can remove an unconscious person from a second story or taller building.

The entire squad of Cubs did an outstanding job against the Hico team and really had a fine team effort, which, of course, is what it takes to win ball games.

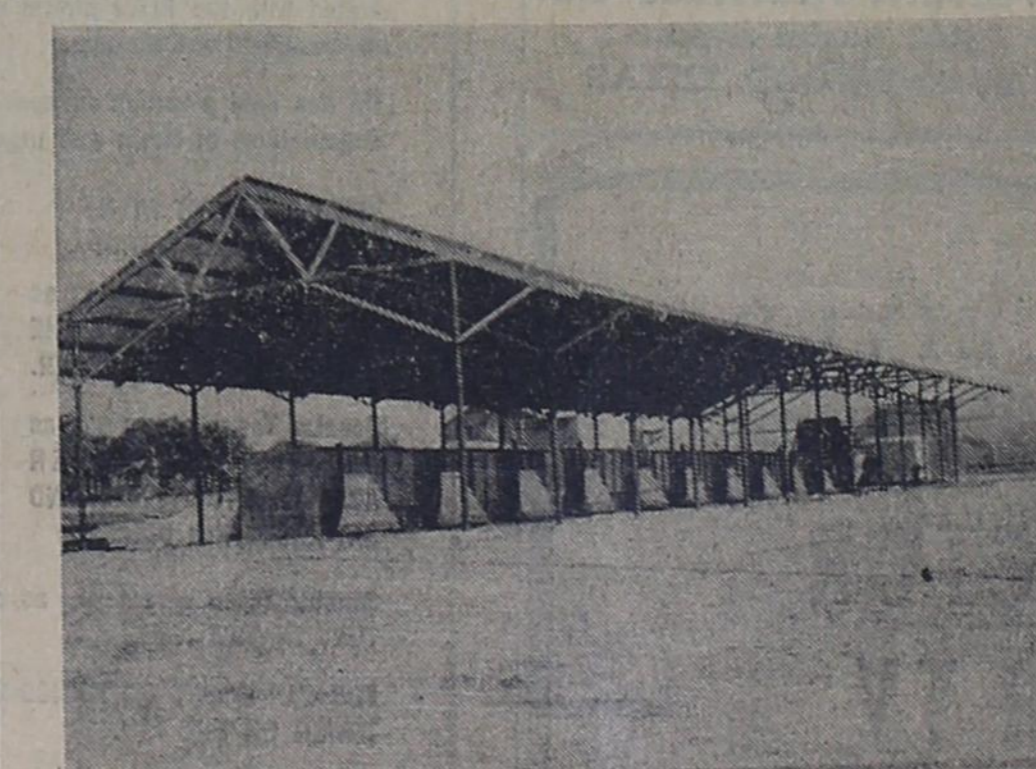
The next game for the Cubs will be on Thursday night, October 27 when they journey to Albany.

He supported soil and water conservation projects so necessary to the future of agriculture in Texas.

He sponsored six key bills on water resources, conversion of brackish water, desalinization, and rural water systems. Five of these already have become law and are benefitting Texas agriculture.

He took action against suspension of the investment tax credit which would amount to a \$100 million tax increase on American agriculture.

He flatly rejected the contentions of some federal bureaucrats that farmers and ranchers are somehow responsible for the inflation which is really basically caused by federal deficit spending. He has fought hard too against restricting or freezing prices.

He has supported the REA's position in working to maintain status independent of Federal Power Commission control. He also cooperated with the REA's efforts in supporting federal loans for rural community water systems.
