## WOLVERINES WIN OVER MULLIN-TO HOST ROCHELLE THURSDAY

The Carbon Wolverines kicked off their 1966 football season on Saturday night under their new head coach Larry Allen and assistant coaches, Charles Bryant and Jimmy Hughes.

The Wolverines returned to the old form with an overwhelming 50 to 24 victory over the Bulldogs of Mullin at Bulldog Stadium.

Offensive starters for the Wolverines were Larry Bryant, Jimmy Nelson, Alvie Allison, Ray Kanady, Ronnie Hughes, and Herbert Casey. Defensive starters were Bryant, Nelson, Ray Kanady, Hughes, Casey and Rickie Pack.

Mullin scored first on a twenty yard pass from Larry Smith to Larry Minica about midway of the first period. The extra point try failed.

Minutes later Ronnie Hughes bulled his way on a 45 yard touchdown run. Ray Kanady's attempt to run extra point failed. The score at the end of the first quarter stood at 6-6.

The Bulldogs were forced to kick on fourth down in the second stanza and Ronnie Hughes, grabbing the ball going to the left, returned the ball 60 yards for the Wolverines on an electrifying gallop. Again the run for point failed.

Midway of the second period the Bulldogs were on the Carbon 5 yard line when Hughes, Bryant and Nelson caused Carl Hohertz to fumble and spohomore Rickie Pack recovered the ball in the end zone to save a possible Mullin tally.

The Wolverines took the ball and marched 80 yards for their third marker with Hughes going the final 35 yards around right end for the score. The point try failed again. Carbon led at half-time by a score of 18 to 6.

In the third period Carbon

forced Mullin to punt. Hughes gathered in the ball on the Carbon 30 yard line and with an excellent return, raced 50 yards for the fourth Wolverine tally. The point try failed.

Minutes later Hughes scored again from 15 yards out. The try for point failed.

Mullin scored their second TD on a 10 yard pass from Larry Smith to Carl Hohertz. The extra point try failed.

Still in the third quarter Ronnie Hughes scored his third 6-pointer on a 1 yard plunge. The point try failed.

As the fourth period opened Larry Smith scored for the Bulldogs on a 30 yard dash. The try for point failed.

Only minutes later Alvie Allison, Wolverine quarterback, hit tall Herbert Casey on a 12-yard touchdown toss. This made the score read 42 to 18.

Mullin came back with another score when Larry Smith raced 10 yards for the tally.

In the closing minutes Ronnie Hughes added misery to the pain of the Bulldogs when he scored his seventh touchdown of the game on a 5 yard run. Alvie Allison kicked the extra points and the final score read Carbon 50 and Mullin 24.

Hard work has been the order of the day in each workout this week as the Wolverines prepare to meet the Rochelle Hornets, a team which until this year has been an eleven-man team. Both Rochelle and Carbon have been rated first in pre-season listings. So, this should be one of the top six-man tilts in the state.

Game time is slated for 8 p. m. at Wolverine Field in Carbon. Admission is \$1.00 for adults and 25c for school students.

Gorman football fans are urged to attend this game as it should be a dandy battle.

## IMPORTANT PEANUT MEETING SET HERE FOR SEPTEMBER 20

An important meeting of special interest to irrigated peanut producers will be held in the Gorman High School Auditorium at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, September 20. Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association has arranged for Mr. Wayne Keese, Agricultural Engineer, Texas A&M University, to discuss with growers problems relating to peanut irrigation which have arisen during the growing of this year's crop. Mr. Keese conducted a short course in Gorman and De Leon last winter on irrigating peanuts which was well attended by farmers.

The specific purpose of this meeting is for Keese to answer growers' questions regarding watering practices and related problems.

Mr. B. C. Langley, superintendent, West Cross Timbers Experiment Station, Stephenville, will also be on hand to assist in answering growers' questions.

## Gorman Chamber Of Commerce Supports Watershed Project

The board of directors of the Gorman Chamber of Commerce, in its September 8 meeting, voted unanimously to support the watershed flood control conservation project along the Sabana River. The Sabana heads in Calahan County in the Baird area and flows through Eastland and Comanche Counties into Proctor Lake near Comanche. The Gorman Chamber will sponsor a meeting in Gorman on September 26 to organize watershed residents into a watershed association provided the interest warrants the organization. It is presumed that the association would then make application to the Soil Conservation Service for approval of the project.

If the application is approved, plans would be made to construct dams and reservoirs along the river in order to control flooding, soil erosion and other forms of damage to the adjacent land. Other possible advantages to the area include water for supplemental irrigation, sources for municipal water and recreation.

Gorman Chamber of Commerce officials have pledge all-out support to the project provided land owners organize and make application for the project.

The Panthers then made 3 and 5 yards respectively on two runs before Robert Reeves rammed it over from the 1 yard out with 4 minutes and 50 second gone in the second period. The try for points failed and the scoreboard read Gorman 12, Evant 0.

The two teams then exchanged the ball on two possessions. Then the Panthers got on the scoreboard in a hurry. The Big Reds got the ball on their own 38. Daryl Hirst faded back and with some fine protection from the offensive line tossed a perfect strike to Robert (Bobo) Hunt for 62 yards for the third Panther marker.

Hunt caught the ball on about the Elk 40 yard line and raced the remaining distance with only 30 second left in the first half. Again the try for points failed and the half-time score stood at 18 to 0.

The Panther defensive held the Elks on two possessions in the first half of the third quarter. On the second possession by the Elk the Panthers forced them to punt and took over the ball on the Elk 30 yard line. On the first play the Panthers made 3 yards on a ground play, then lost three on another. On the third play in a third and ten situation Hirst faded back behind fine protection from the offensive line and tossed a beautiful aerial to James Jay who took the pass on the Elk 10 and worked his way across the goal line for the fourth Gorman score 6 minutes deep in the third period. David Guthery rammed over for the two point conversion.

The two teams again played on even terms until 8 minutes and 50 second deep in the fourth period when the Panthers took over the pigskin on their own 10 yard stripe. From there quarterback Daryl Hirst brought the entire stands to their feet when he took the ball on a keeper play to the right, cut back to his left on about the 15, broke open at the Gorman 20 yard line and raced untouched into the ole' promise land. Robert Reeves plunged over for the two extra points and the score took at 34 to 0.

The teams played on even terms for the remainder of the game with the Panthers using substitutes on both offense and defense the rest of the game. The Panthers threatened again in the closing minute of the game but failed to score.

We felt the Panthers did a very fine job on both offense and defense against Evant. The outstanding offensive players for Gorman were Daryl Hirst who got 137 yards on ten carries; Jackie Harrison who got 70 yards on 7 trips (besides the long run that got called back on the penalty); and Robert Hunt who caught two passes for 89 yards and one score. We feel that the Panther offensive line did a superb job in opening holes for the runners and also giving fine protection for the quarterback on passes.

The stellar men on defense for the night would certainly have to be center linebacker Robert Hunt, left corner back Robert Reeves, left guard Jim Tom Garrett, and left end Dwayne Snider who also blocked the Elk punt.

We feel the Panthers won the game on a complete team effort. This Friday night the Panthers are on the road again when they journey to Rising Star to take on a tough Wildcat eleven who had a fine defensive game with Wylie last Friday night. The Wildcats won it when the Wylie punter stepped on the end zone line when he backed up to punt, giving Rising Star a 2 point safety.

If the Panthers show the same spirit and determination which they displayed last week they should do well at Rising Star in the game set at 8 p. m.

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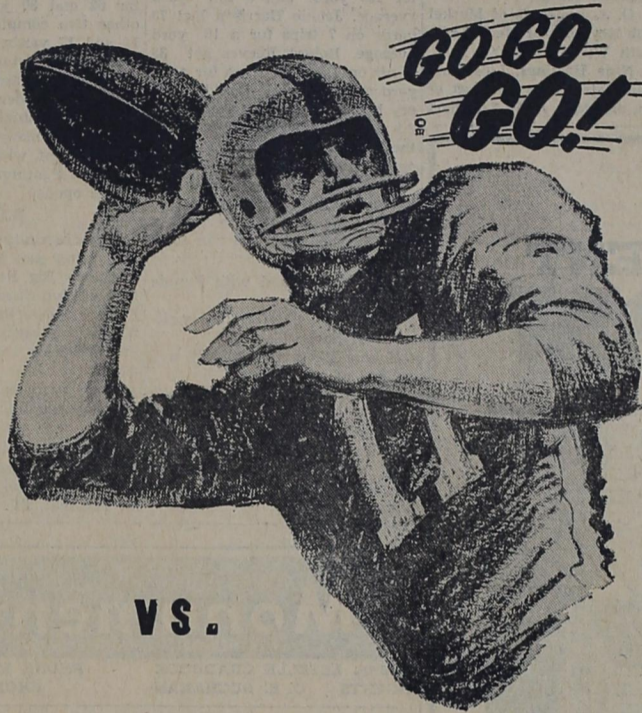

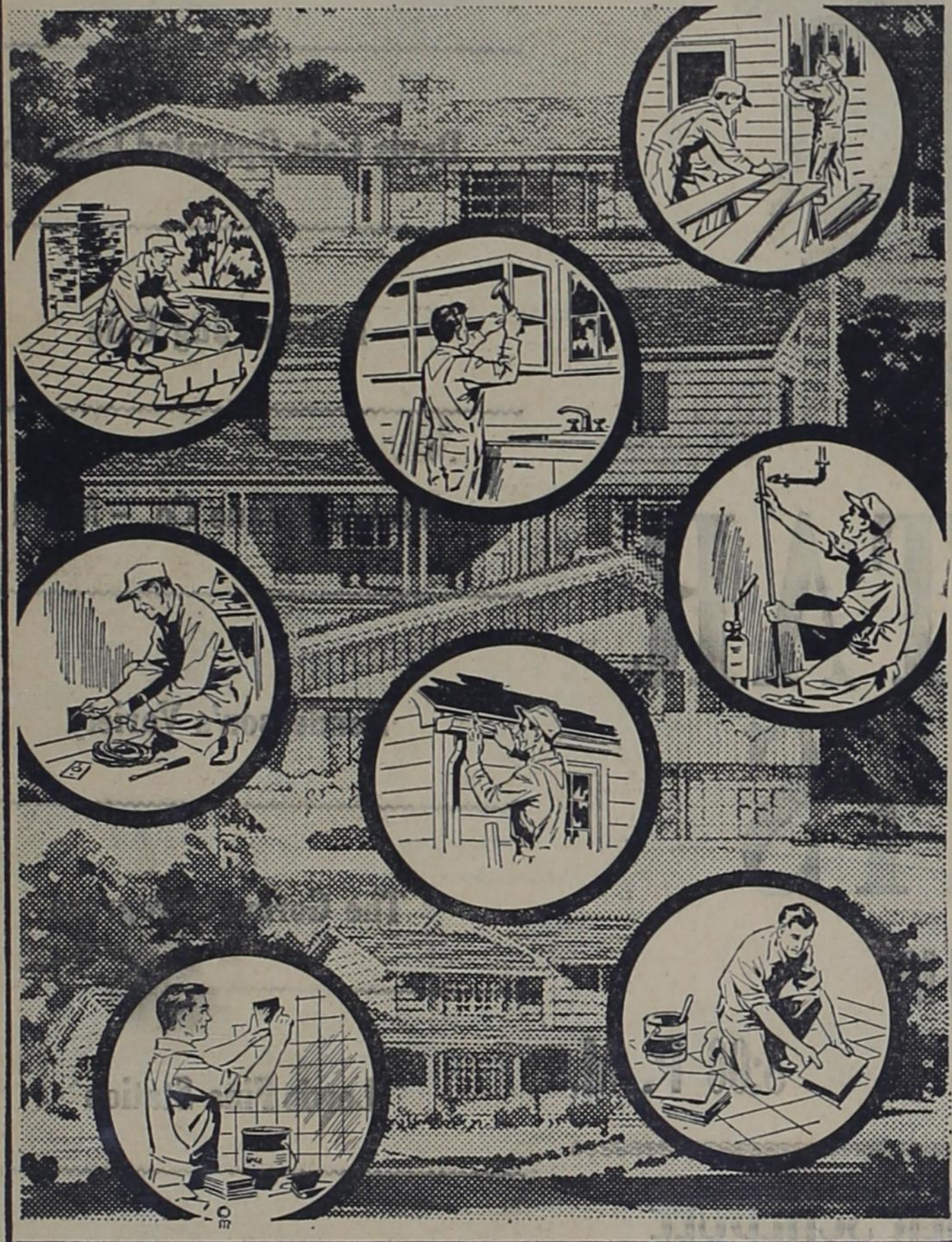

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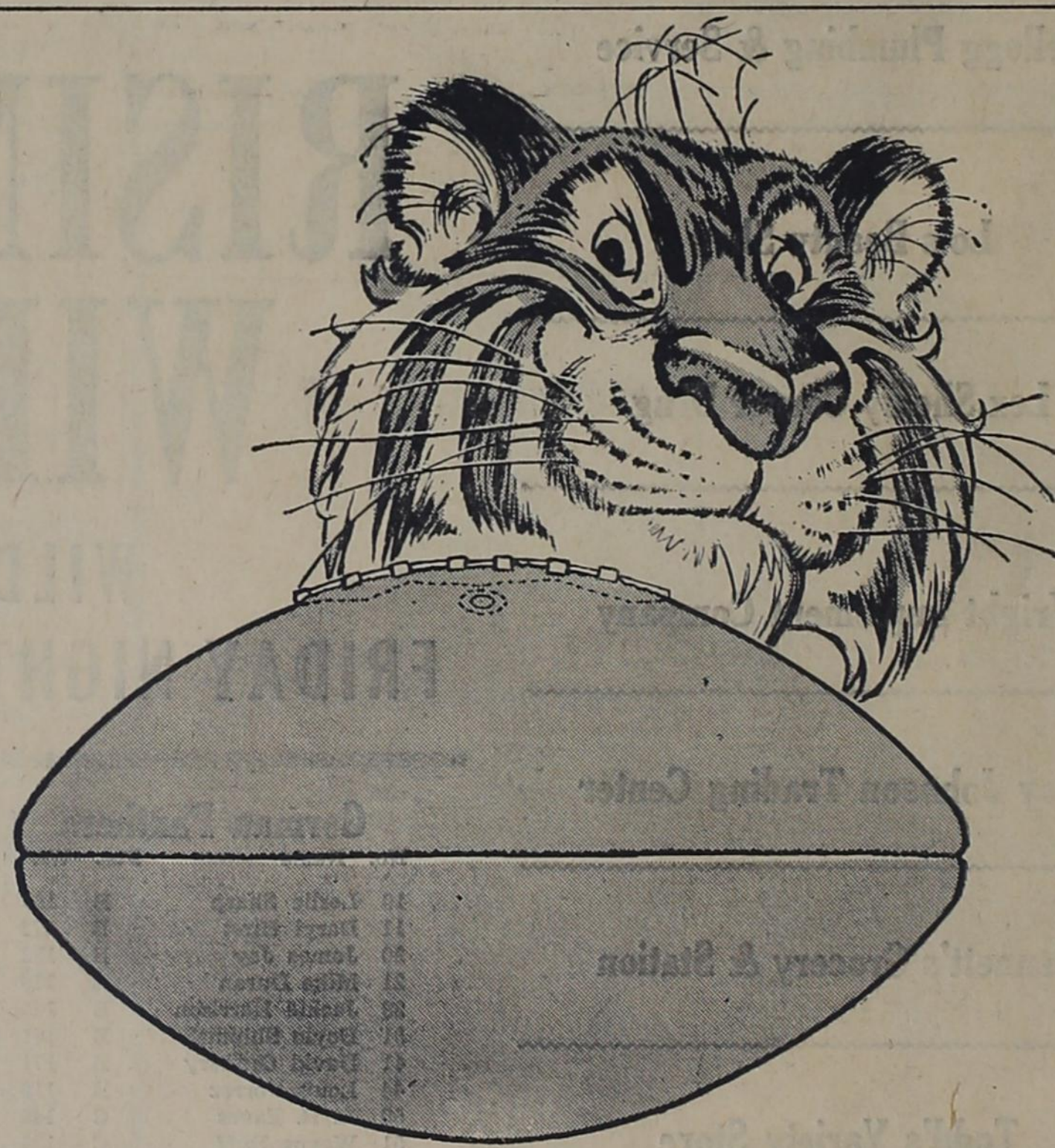

On the itinerary of the Fall tour of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association Friday, September 16 will be five orchards, according to A. D. Ellington, Cisco, chairman of the group.

All pecan growers in the county and those of neighboring counties are invited and urged to participate, he said.

The tour group will assemble at the El Rancho Cafe in Ranger at 9 a. m. to begin the all-day event.

First stop will be the orchard of Ellis Cooper, northeast of Ranger. Second stop will be to look over the 56-acre orchard of B. B. Freeman in the Cheaney Community, 10 miles northeast of Gorman.

The young orchard of Ray Burns, northeast of Gorman will be the third and last stop before pausing for lunch at the Brown Jug Cafe.

A business session of the group will be held during the lunch stop, it was explained.

Towns or organizations that would like to have the pecan show in December are urged to present their invitations during this business session. Members vote upon the selection of the show site. Rules prevent the show from being held in the same town two years in succession.

The afternoon stops on the tour will include the orchard of Les Wallace, next to the Brown Jug in Gorman, and the Earl Walker orchard, south of Cisco.

The group, besides inspecting the current crop, will also check the foliage, the current season growth of the limbs, presence of insects, the indication of scab, rosette, leaf spot, aphid infestation and the general condition of the orchards. All orchards on the tour route this year will be cultivated and will be set trees.

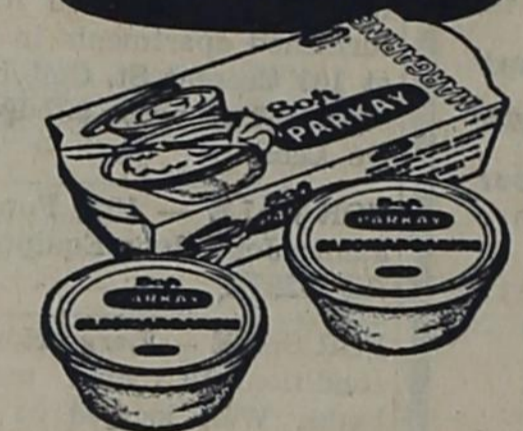

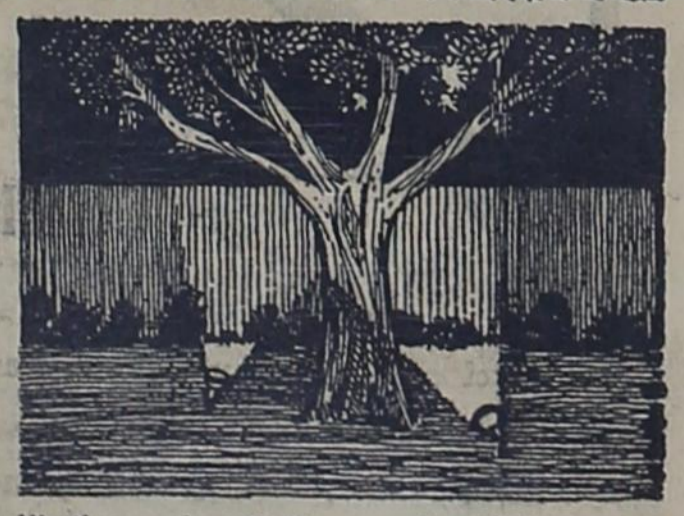
