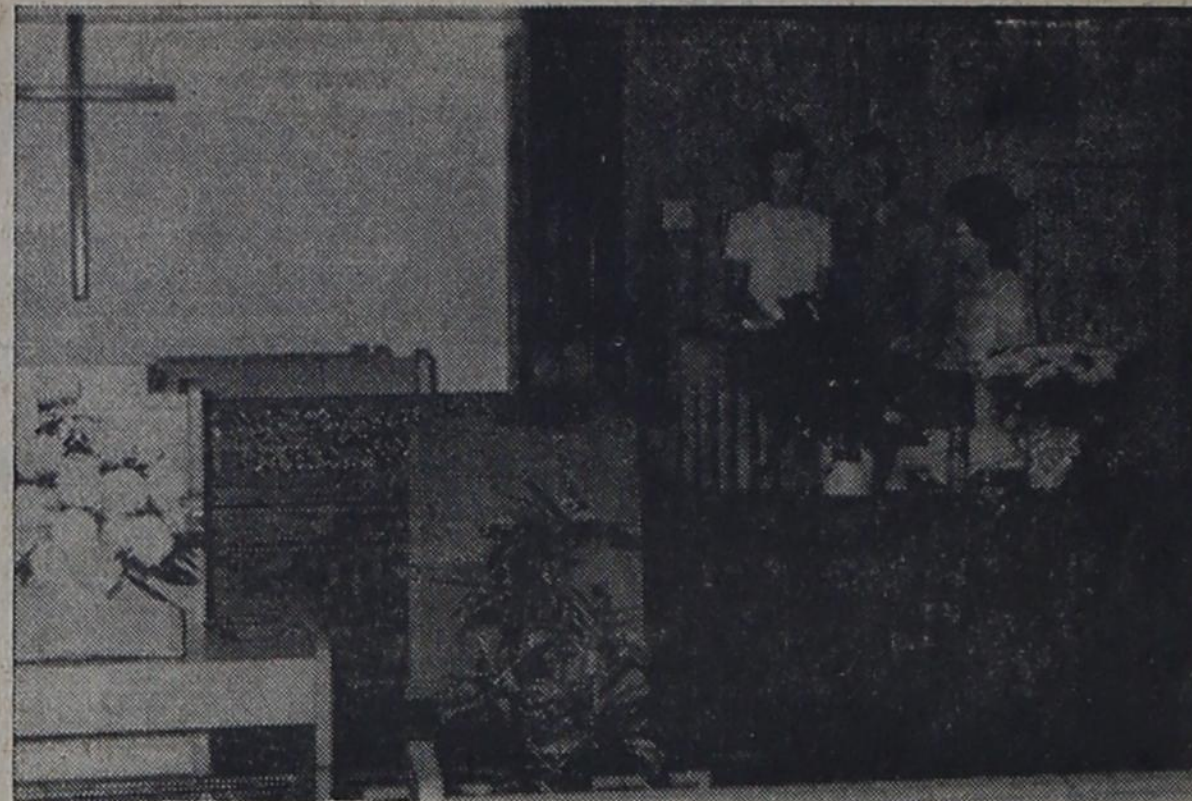

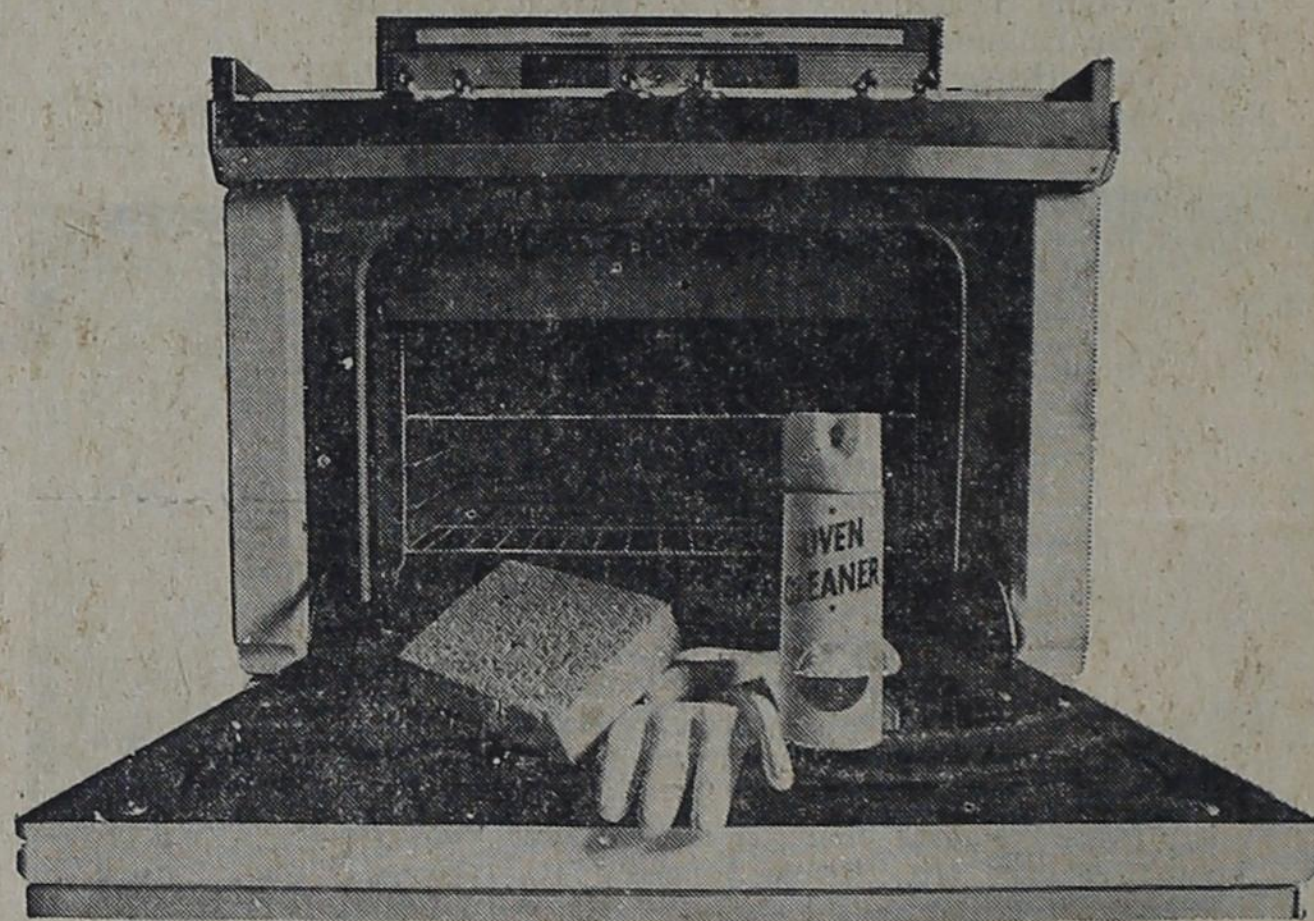

MH-MR Report

To observe National Mental Health Month in Texas, the Mental Health-Mental Retardation in Brownwood has prepared a series of articles which hopefully will be helpful to people in this area.

The Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center for Central Texas, located at 100 Melwood in Brownwood, continues to serve approximately 195-200 clients a month. The center serves a seven county area including Mills, San Saba, Comanche, Coleman, McCulloch, Brown and Eastland.

Professional staff is on hand 24 hours a day to assist the residents of these seven counties in treatment for emotional and/or behavioral problems. Individual or group settings are utilized in treatment under the supervision of the center's clinical director, Dr. Joe H. Oliver, psychiatrist.

Parental counseling is available for parents who are experiencing problems with their children, whatever they may be.

The center is for people with problems in living, such as difficulties in adjusting to school or job; problems in dealing with other people; unhappy family relationships; temper outbursts or uncontrollable behavior; and excessive worry, anxiety or prolonged depressed feelings.

The center is neither a welfare agency nor a charitable organization; professional treatment is available to persons of all economic levels. Fees are discussed during the first contact with the center; consideration is given to family size and income.

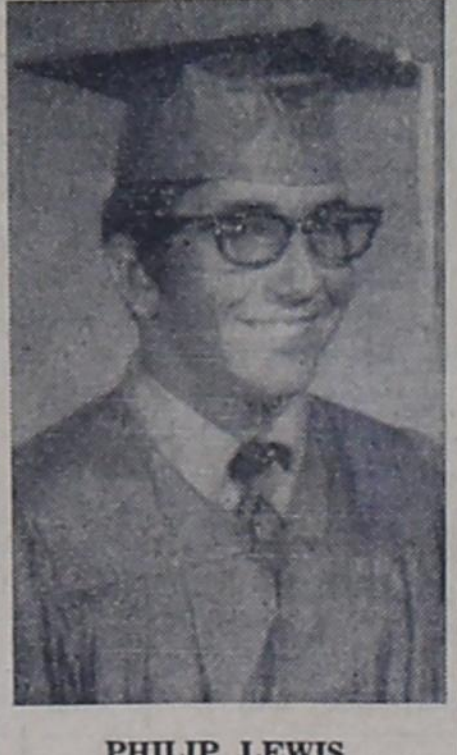

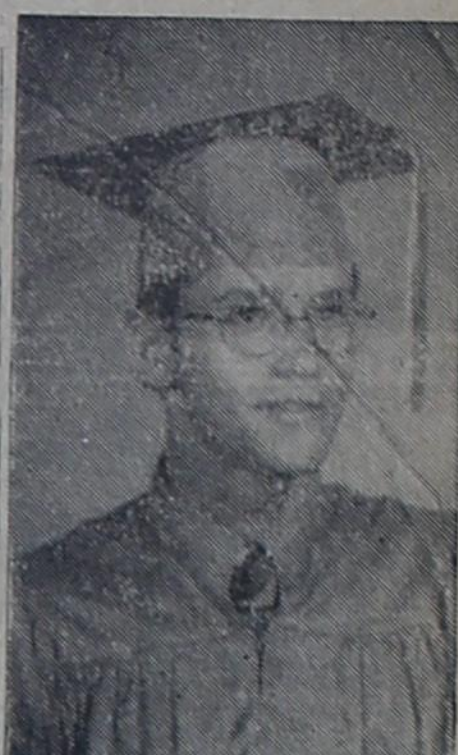

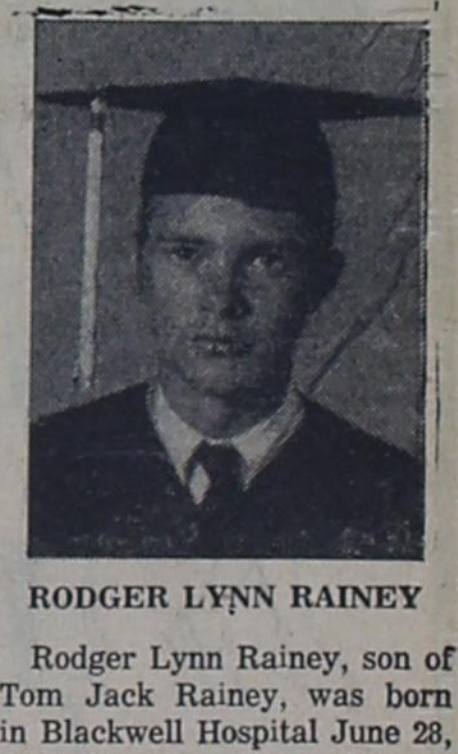

An Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF GORMAN, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED.

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Gorman by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof; \$2.444 Gross; \$2.20 Net.

Next 3,000 cu. ft. @ \$.778 per Mcf Gross; \$.70 per Mcf Net.

Next 6,000 cu. ft. @ .700 per Mcf Gross; .63 per Mcf Net.

Next 15,000 cu. ft. @ .644 per Mcf Gross; .58 per Mcf Net.

Next 75,000 cu. ft. @ .611 per Mcf Gross; .55 per Mcf Net.

All Over 100,000 cu. ft. @ .589 per Mcf Gross; .53 per Mcf Net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments; Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the 42.5 cents per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to April 1, 1972, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make any adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Com-

CONSERVATION: KEY TO SURVIVAL

Conservation is the preservation of the world's natural resources through careful use and replacement. From the economic point of view, the natural resources of any country are its fundamental capital; and the wasting of them results in a loss that affects the country as a whole. Before conservation was practiced in this country man had ruined the land by overstocking it, plowing up the grass, and cutting down all the trees for lumber.

The conservation of soil is the most important and most complicated of all conservation problems. The soil itself may be carried away by erosion, by wind or water; the elements in the soil may be dissolved in water and leach out and nutrient elements may be removed from the soil by the harvesting of crops away, but agents are nearly as destructive in removing the plant nutrients from the soil.

To maintain the fertility of the soil, a number of conservation measures become necessary. In the first place the soil must be tilled correctly. In dry regions it is important to leave the land bare at certain times of the year to gather and conserve the moisture from rainfall. In humid regions, on the contrary, it is necessary to keep some sort of plant cover on the land to avoid the dangers of leaching and erosion. Secondly, it is important to replace the nutrient elements that are lost through cropping, leaching and erosion. Inorganic nutrients can be replaced by the application of chemical fertilizers which are rich in needed elements. No manufactured product, however, can entirely replace organic material.

The conservation of forest resources involves two factors: the prevention of forest fires and scientific management of forest lands.

A number of methods are used to prevent soil erosion or wind erosion. Some of these methods are: using cover crops to protect the land during the seasons when regular crops are not being grown; plowing and cultivating land so that furrows are level and follow the contours of the ground and do not become channels for water running

CONSERVATION — KEY TO SURVIVAL

Most of the food that we eat grows in the soil. When all of the soil goes away no one can grow anything and man will die. Because man needs vegetables to live one. Some people say that man can live on meat, but the animals need plants to live on.

It takes nature a long time to make an inch of soil. But wind or rain can blow or wash it away in just a few weeks. When it rains, water can make gullies in hillsides. And wind can blow the soil off hillsides or off level ground. In the United States erosion has destroyed more than 50 million acres of farm land.

There are more ways than just erosion that can make soil lose its fertility. Heavy rains can take out elements that plants need to grow on. Farmers can also ruin their land by not fertilizing it.

Most farmers add chemicals and fertilizers to the soil to help produce better crops. The farmers plow the manure from animals and plow under green plants to increase the plant food. Crop rotation is an important way of keeping soil fertile. When a farmer rotates his crops, he can plant corn and other crops in the same place. He tries not to plant the same crop on the same land as he did the last year.

The soil conservationist tries to keep the soil fertile and productive. In contour plowing

a farmer plows his field across instead of up and down. The rows catch the rain water and keeps it from running off the hill. The deep gullies can be controlled by planting trees or grasses, or by building dams to catch the runoff. One of the best ways of preventing erosion is to keep land covered with plants such as permanent grass and trees.

In order for our nation to survive in the future, the farmer of tomorrow will have to carry out good conservation practices on his land. And keep informed about the changes in agriculture in order to produce enough food and fiber for our nation.

Boone stated, "For the first time in Texas, the county people are organizing early enough and in a strong way which will give us some protection before the metropolitan areas grab all the power."

Holmes Blasts Tom Creighton

State Sen. Tom Creighton has used \$26,565 of the state's money to pay office rent and a secretary for his private law business, State Rep. Tom Holmes charged Wednesday.

Holmes, who led Creighton in the hotly contested senate race which pits the two men in the runoff June 3, blasted Creighton and accused him of a "political assassination attempt" on him in the timing of the Travis County grand jury investigation which he said was instigated by his opponent.

Creighton could not be reached for a reply to the accusation this morning, but a spokesman from his

office said Creighton would have no comment on the statement.

Holmes also said Creighton had checked out more than \$2,900 in stamps between January 1971 and March 1972 "but there has been no investigation of him or his secretaries on the state payroll."

Holmes claimed Creighton had used \$22,655 in contingent expense money over the years to pay the salary of Mrs. Dorothy Winston in Creighton's Mineral Wells law office, and \$3,910 in tax money to pay Mrs. B. H. Martin for the rent on his law office.

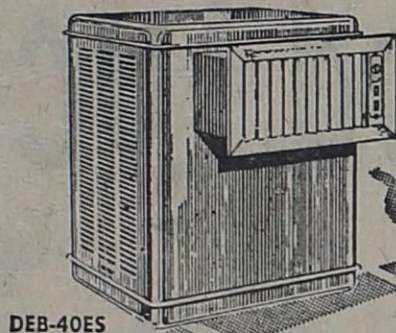

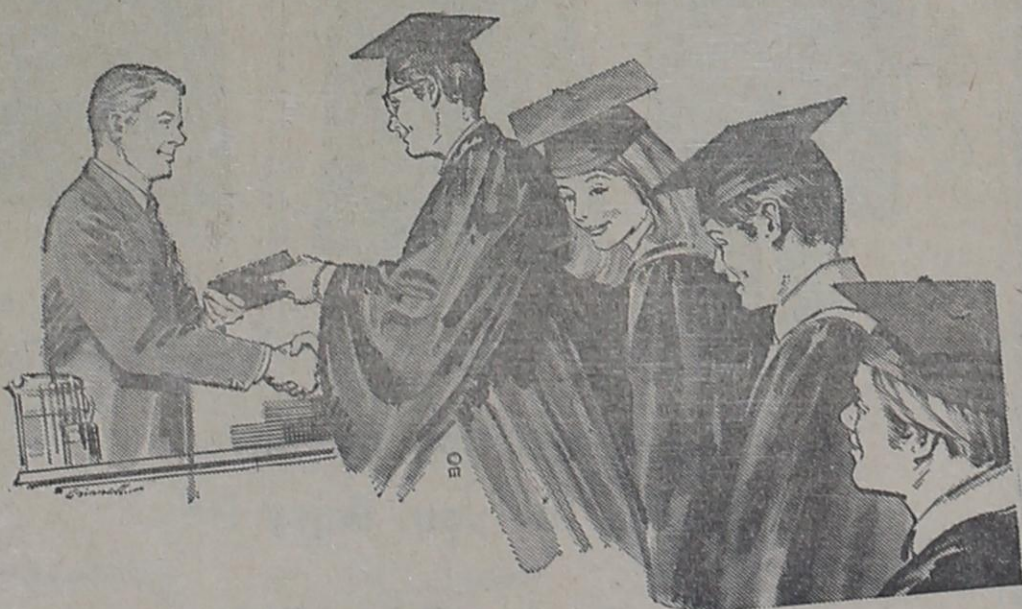

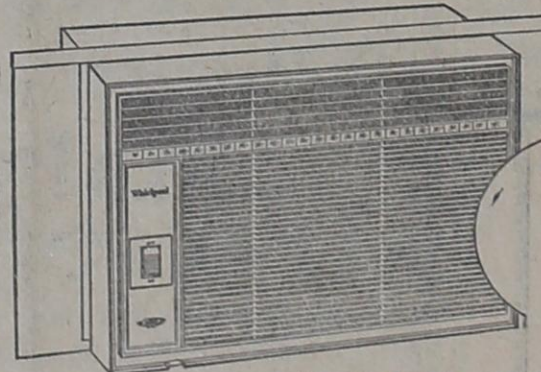

New Rules On Registration

S. B. No. 51

"Subdivision 1. Beginning with the elections held during the 1972 voting year, whenever a registered voter votes in a primary or general election for nomination or election of State and county officers, his registration is automatically extended or renewed for the succeeding three voting years unless, prior to the beginning of the first succeeding year, the registration is cancelled under some provision of this code.

Within 3 days after each

second (runoff) primary for nomination of State and county officers, the presiding officer of the county committee, board, or other body which is responsible for furnishing supplies for the primary elections of each political party shall deliver to the registrar the lists of registered voters used at the party's general primary and runoff primary in each election precinct in the county, marked to show the names of persons who voted at the election as provided elsewhere in this code. Within 30 days after the date of each general election for State and county officers, the county clerk shall deliver to the registrar the lists of registered voters used

From these lists, the registrar shall make a record on the registration record sheets of the voters who voted at these elections and shall extend or renew their registrations for the succeeding three voting years. The registrar shall preserve the lists for a period of four years following the close of the voting year in which "the election occurred."

area in America. Our cities are literally falling apart, attempts to help the large intercities with all sorts of Federal programs have been about like trying to cure cancer with a Band-Aid.

THE PROSPERITY OF THE UNITED STATES is unparalleled by any country in all history. During the early years of this Nation, we were a striving country with a balanced growth. Fertile lands enabled agriculture to lead the way in our economic growth. Gradually but dramatically came industrialization which brought about fast growing towns and cities. We continue to have growing pains but of a different nature. Changes have come about by urban centralization and has ended our balanced growth.

FOLLOWING THE DEPRESSION OF THE 1930's, there started a migration from the rural areas to the cities. In a quarter of a century, that is up to about 1955, a decisive turn was made away from small towns and rural life. Since the beginning of World War II more than 30 million Americans have left the farms and small communities and the migration

rate continues at about 600,000 people each year. This is a slackened pace of movement but still a serious one.

COSTS FOR PROVIDING SERVICES for city dwellers have skyrocketed and yet services received continually diminish in quality.

SMALL TOWNS, ONCE VIABLE AND PRODUCTIVE, are having difficult times providing their own services, finding employment and the wherewithal to support the essentials of modern life.

WITHIN A FEW WEEKS THE CONGRESS will probably enact legislation for the purpose of alleviating what is becoming a crisis in both rural areas and urban centers.

THE MEASURE IS KNOWN AS THE Rural Development Act of 1972. Different versions of the proposal have been passed by both the House and the Senate. They now go to Conference between the two Bodies of Congress where these differences will be ironed out.

THE LEGISLATION IS LABELED "Rural Development Act" but its intent is to "develop America." It provides a comprehensive program of investment credits and incentives for people in

industry to locate or remain in rural America. A system of credit would be provided to improve community facilities and finance business enterprises. It would expand authority for the development of natural resources and conservation and would improve fire protection. It would also expand rural non-farm and small farm development services.

THE CENTRAL PURPOSE OF THE LEGISLATION is to make it possible for rural communities to develop in all facets of its community life and hopefully return to a balanced economy.

IF THIS CAN BE ACCOMPLISHED, people will no longer have to go to cities to find jobs but rather remain in

smaller communities and keep our population dispersed. It will afford a better life in all of its aspects. If this could be accomplished, the results would improve conditions for a better future and a better choice of location for living and raising a family. The cities would be relieved of the tremendous pressures which have created insoluble problems and flights to suburbs, leaving dead cities behind.

IT IS RECOGNIZED THAT THERE is a vast difference between theory and practical application but unless something is done along these lines, conditions for improvement can only worsen. People crowded together in our cities is a chief cause of crime, disease, poor schools, inadequate health care and all the other

deficiencies apparent in our society. These circumstances drain the resources of the more rural areas and everyone is the victim.

SOME WAY MUST BE FOUND to enable people to help themselves to reverse the trend of migration to the already partially paralyzed cities. If properly administered the Rural Development Act could be a step in the right direction.

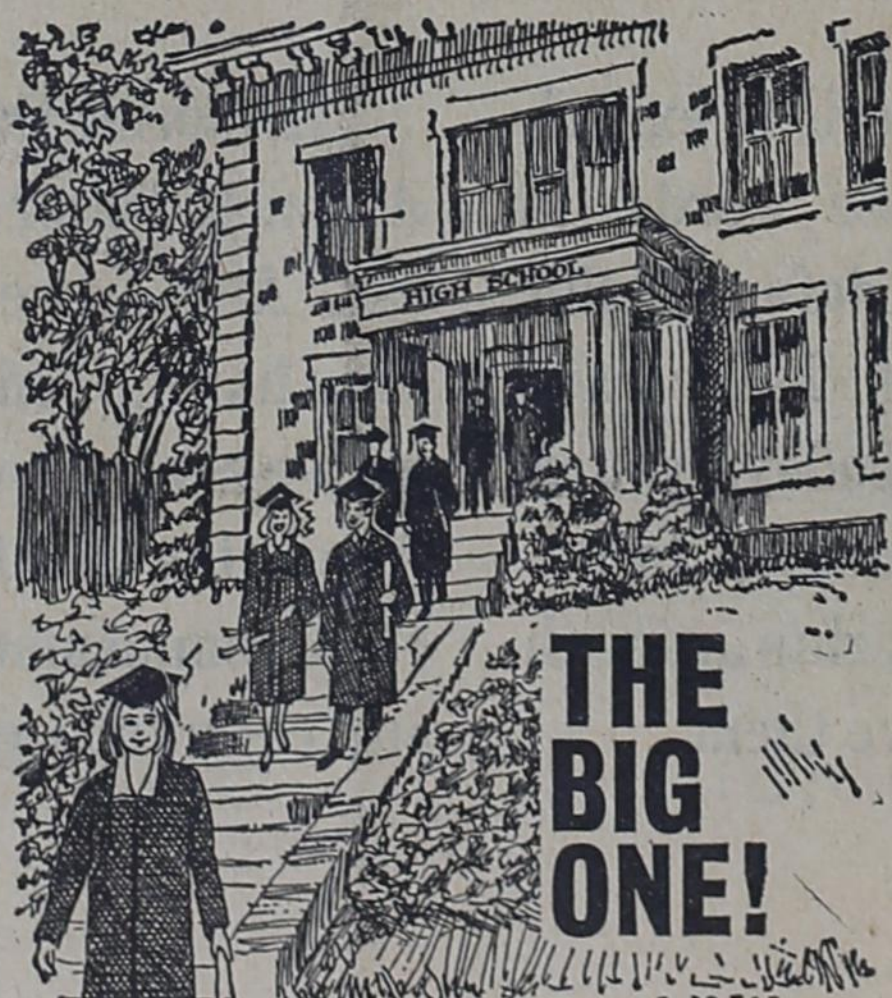
