An Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SAL-ES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COM-MERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF GORMAN, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PRO-VIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED.

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service date for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Gorman by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof; \$2.444 Gross; \$2.20

Next 3,000 cu. ft. @ \$.778 per Mcf Gross; \$.70 per Mcf

Next 6,000 cu. ft. @ .700 per Mcf Gross; .63 per Mcf Net. Next 15,000 cu. ft. G .644 per

Mcf Gross; .38 per Mcf Net. Next 75,000 cu. ft. @ .611 per Mcf Gross; .55 per Mcf Net. All Over 100,000 cu. ft. @ 589 per Mcf Gross; .53 per

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be for lumber. subject to the following adjustments; Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the 42.5 cents per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportonate part of any rew tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, coutny, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to April 1. 1972, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or justment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable there-

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary o conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Com-

> The conservation of soil is the most important and most complicated of all conservation problems. The soil itself may be carried away by erosion, by wind or water; the elements in the soil may be dissolved in water and leach out: and nutrient elements may be removed from the soil by the harvesting of crops away, but agents are nearly as destructive in removing the

plant nutrients from the soil. To maintain the fertility of the soil, a number of conservation measures become necessary. In the first place the soil must be tilled correctly. In dry regions it is important to leave the land bare at certain times of the year to gather and conserve the moisture from rainfall. In humid regions, on the contrary, it is necessary to keep some sort of plant cover on the land to avoid the dangers of leaching and erosion. Secondly, it is important to replace the nutrieut elements that are lost through cropping, leaching and erosion. In-organic nutrients can be replaced by the application of chemical fertilizers which are rich in needed elements. No manufactured product, however, can entirely replace organic mater-
