## Local Students In Who's Who

A total of six students from this area are included in the 30th Annual Edition of *Who's Who Among American High School Students, 1995-96*. *Who's Who*, published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Illinois, is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. ## Gorman Panthers Win "Peanut Classic" Held On Dec. 5-7

The Gorman Panthers took top honors in the Gorman "Peanut Classic" Tournament held here on December 5, 6 & 7.

In the first game on Thursday the Panthers were defeated by May by a 44-45 margin. Adan Rodriguez and Jason Posey led the Panthers with 12 points each; Justin Burleson and Margarito Sanchez each had 7 and Seaton hit 6. Posey had 2 three pointers and Burleson had 1. The game was close all the way through, but May got 17 points to Gorman's 10 in the final quarter for the win.

In Friday's game the Panthers bounced back with a win over Gustine by a 38 to 35 score. Coach Hurley stated that after a tough loss to May on opening night, our players showed great "persistence" avenging on earlier season loss to Gustine. We played as a team; disciplined. I am very proud of them. Posey led the Panthers with 23 points; Burleson had 8, Rodriguez 4, and Seaton 3. Posey hit 5 three pointers and Seaton and Burleson each had 1. Gorman led 19 to 18 at half and added 7 more in the third and hit 12 in the fourth for the win.

In the final on Saturday night the Panthers defeated Cross Plains JV by a 49 to 26 margin. Burleson had 15; Posey 14; Carlton 10, Rodriguez and Hagood each hit 4 and Seaton got 2. Posey had 2 three pointers and Burleson 1. The Panthers jumped to a 17 to 2 first quarter lead, and added 8 more in the second for a 25 to 11 lead at halftime. They added 16 in the third and 6 more in the final period for the 49 to 26 win.

The top scorers for the Tourney were Posey with 17 points, 10 rebounds, 2 assists and 2 steals; Burleson was 10, 2, 0 and 3; Rodriguez was 7, 1, 2 and 3; Carlton was 0, 8, 0 and 2 and Sanchez was 0, 0, 10 and 6.

Sanchez and Burleson made the All Tournament Teams. Posey was named Tourney Most Valuable. In the 3 point shootout Rodriguez was the winner. The Tourney 3 Point Shootout Team Players from Gorman were Posey, Burleson and Rodriguez.

It is very important to note that Margo Sanchez, since moving to point guard, has been a great factor in the team's success. He has sacrificed his point production for the betterment of the team. He has been a true "team player". Kris Carlton and Robert Seaton were also instrumental.

Coach's Comment: "I was very pleased to see our press work as well as it did. We did a better job taking care of the ball than in our last game and it payed off big time with lots of points."

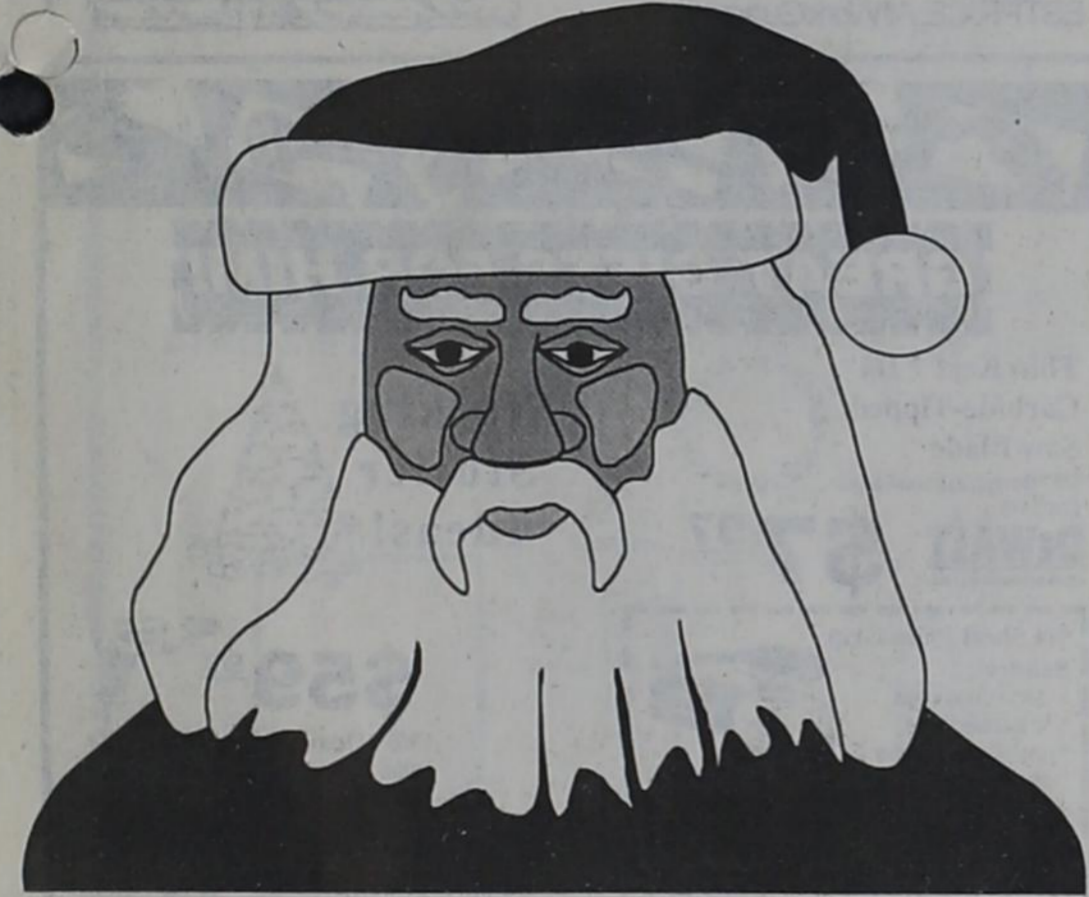

## FSA Accepting Emergency Loan Applications

Applications for Emergency Farm Loans for losses caused by drought are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson, Marilyn S. Richer said today.

Eastland County is one of 57 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought.

Marilyn Richer said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Ms. Richer said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 23, 1997 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Ms. Richer said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporation or cooperatives in which U. S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Anson is open from 8:00 to 5:00 Monday through Friday.

## When Social Security Is Not Enough

If you're currently receiving Social Security benefits, you may think that you can't get Supplemental Security Income (SSI) too. But, the fact is, you may be able to receive both if your total income and resources fall within the SSI limits.

To get SSI, you must be age 65 or older, or be blind, or have a disability. And, your income and the value of the things you own must be below certain limits.

Income refers to the money you have coming in -- earnings, SS, benefits other government checks, pensions etc. Non-cash items you receive such as food, clothing and shelter are also considered income. The amount of income you can have and still get SSI depends on whether you work or not, and where you live. The basic national payment rate in 1996 is \$470 per month for one person and \$705 for a couple. Some states add money to the basic payment, so they have higher SSI rates and higher income limits than other states. Your local SS office can tell you about the limits in your state.

Resources are the thing you own, including property, cash, bank accounts and life insurance, etc. We don't count everything you own when we decide if you can get SSI. For example, we don't count your home and many of your personal belongings. And, we usually don't count your car. You may be able to get SSI if the things you own that we count are worth no more than \$2,000 for one person; or \$3,000 for a couple. These limits are the same in every state.

Generally, if you don't work you may be able to get SSI if your monthly income is less than \$490 per month for one person, \$725 for a couple. But, if you're working, you can have more income each month. Your benefit is decreased as your income increases until your benefit is completely reduced. Keep in mind that, if you're applying for SSI disability benefits and earn more than \$500 per month, you probably won't be eligible for benefits.

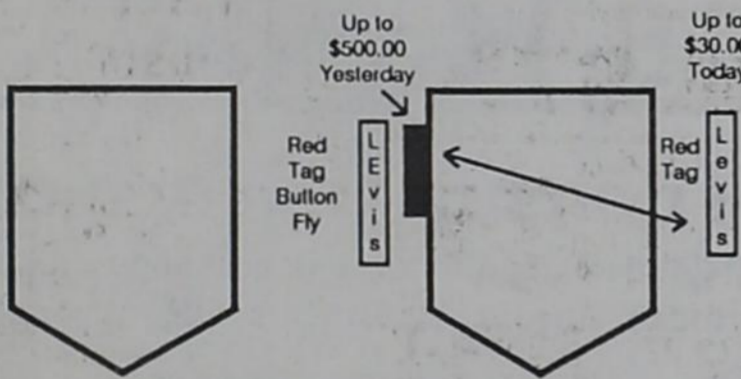

There will be an allowance of three (3) calls per month at no charge. Directory Assistance calls in excess of this allowance will be billed at \$0.30 per call. Call allowances are not transferable between accounts, nor can unused portions of the monthly allowance be credited to the customer's account in any other month service is rendered. The rates for Directory Assistance Service will not be applicable to calls placed from pay telephones or hospitals.

The Company also proposes to revise the following services: **Returned Check Charge** is assessed for each returned check or moneys not honored by a bank or depository; **Local Pay Phone** is a service using any coin, coinless, credit card reader, or cordless instrument that is accessible by members of the general public, provided that the user pays for local or toll calls on a per call basis; **Maintenance of Service** is used when service difficulty or trouble results from the customer-provided or maintained inside wire, jacks and/or equipment; and **Past Due Balances** is a one and one half percent (1½%) finance charge applied monthly to any customer's unpaid balance (residence or business) which is twenty five days past the billing date.

In addition, Comanche County is proposing a minor rate increase for the basic access line rates currently charged to customers. The affected services are: **Residence Access Line; Residence TelAssist; Business Access Line - 1 Party; Business Access Line - Semi-Public; Business Access Line - Rotary; and Business Access Line - PBX.**

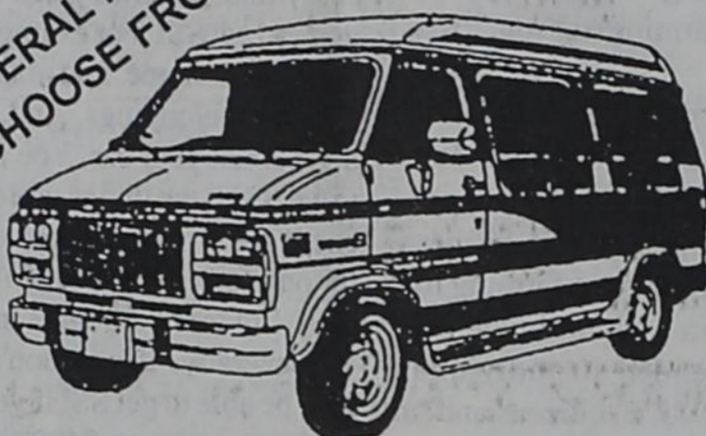

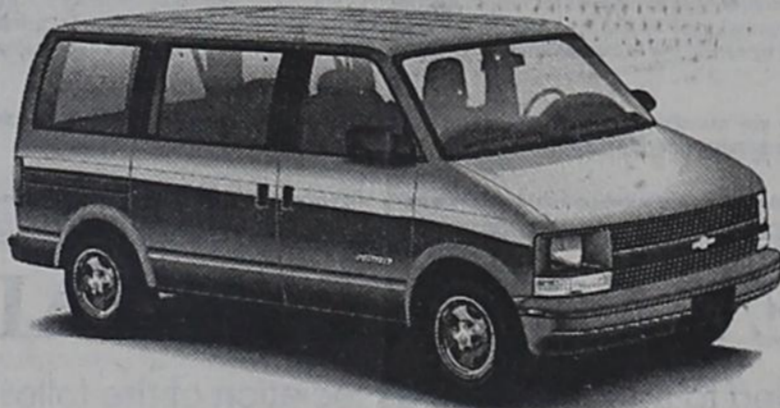
