## Gorman Peanut Co. Will Open New Peanut Plant

Gorman Peanut Company, long-time buyer of peanuts in the Southwest, has announced construction of a completely new, ultra-modern peanut shelling plant at Comyn, Texas. The location is on a 276-acre tract of land mid-way between De Leon and Dublin, one mile south of Texas Highway 6 on Texas FM Road 1496. Gorman Peanut Company was organized in 1940 by two brothers, M. E. and W. T. Shell, and their father, O. T. Shell. In 1946 O. T. Shell retired from the business and sold his interest to the brothers. A small shelling plant was built in Gorman, and was enlarged at various times until it reached a capacity of 400 tons per day at the time Gorman Peanut Company sold the plant in 1973.

As sole owners and operators of the company (until 1965, at which time Gorman Peanut Company entered into a partnership), M. E. and W. T. Shell, both life-long Texans, introduced in the Southwest many innovations in their Gorman shelling plant which are now commonplace in the peanut shelling industry. Some of these firsts are:

In 1948 installed the first peanut dryer.

In 1951 installed electric sorting machines, which remove damaged kernels, foreign material and blanched peanuts from shelled peanuts much more efficiently than hand picking.

In 1955 constructed the first refrigerated warehouse for storage of shelled peanuts to be owned by a shelling plant.

In 1957 installed the first hydraulic truck lift at a shelling plant which raised the entire truck-trailer for rapid unloading of farmers stock peanuts.

Improvements to the Birdsong Peanuts plant will be ready for the peanut farmer to bring in his crop this year. In fact, they are already underway with peanuts from the farmers of South Texas.

In 1958 installed the first bulk peanut dryers, marking the beginning of the change in harvesting methods from bagging at the time of combining to loading peanuts in bulk trucks and trailers. Thus, farmers were relieved of the labor and other costs of bagging peanuts. Additional dryers were added in 1960, 1961 and 1963.

In 1959 constructed a farmers stock cleaner and an automatic spout type sampler to provide automatic mechanical sampling of farmers stock peanuts. Because of demand from the peanut industry, Gorman Peanut Company built and sold automatic samplers to most of the shellers and handlers in the Southwest.

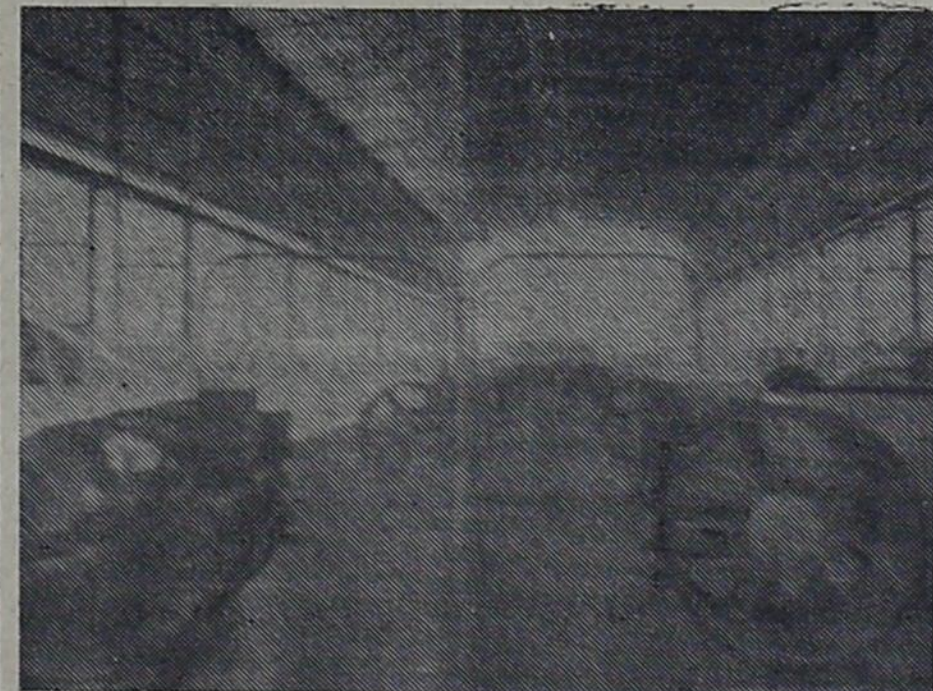
In 1960 became the first sheller to ship bulk peanuts in covered hopper cars.

The new plant at Comyn is scheduled for completion in September, 1974. These facilities include storage for over 35,000 tons of farmers stock peanuts dryers with over 500 tons daily capacity, three dump pits for unloading farmers stock, a farmers stock cleaner, and pneumatic peanut samplers. The truck dumps are designed to rapidly move a large volume of peanuts, thus enabling farmers to be unloaded quickly. The plant has over one mile of company-owned railroad track siding and is served by the Texas Central Railroad.

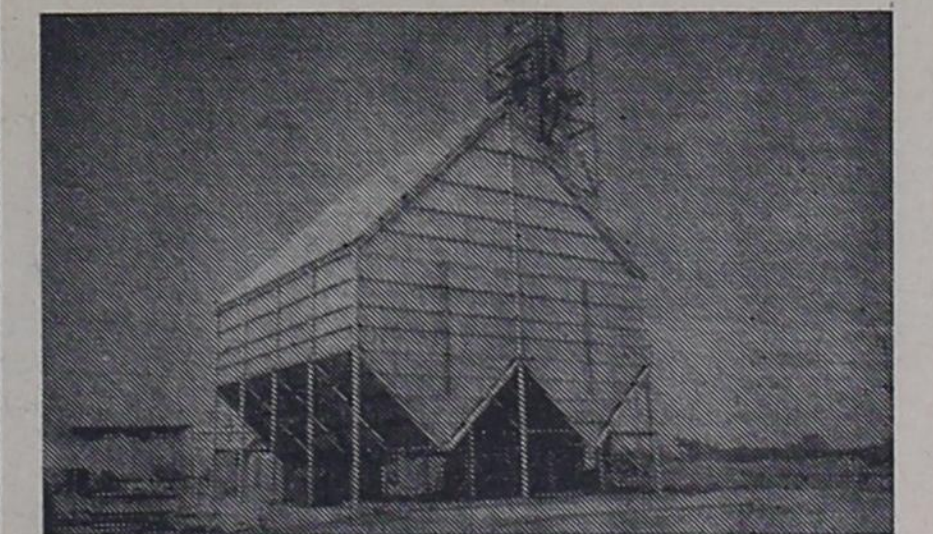
The samplers will be located on tracks over the dryers, enabling the sampling of peanuts in the dryers before they are moved and weighed. Peanuts will be handled with inclined belt conveyors, thus avoiding the excessive breakage of peanuts which occurs in the bucket-type elevators. These conveyors are self-cleaning after each load, eliminating the danger of mixing peanuts.

Gorman Peanut Company is providing a market in numerous locations in the Southwest for All Segregation 1 peanuts, both Spanish and Flo-runner, as well as Segregation 2 and Segregation 3. Keith Whitt, of Gorman, is Director of Farmers Stock Purchases and Seed Sales. He has over 26 years experience in this work, of which over 25 years has been with Gorman Peanut Company or with its partner-ship.

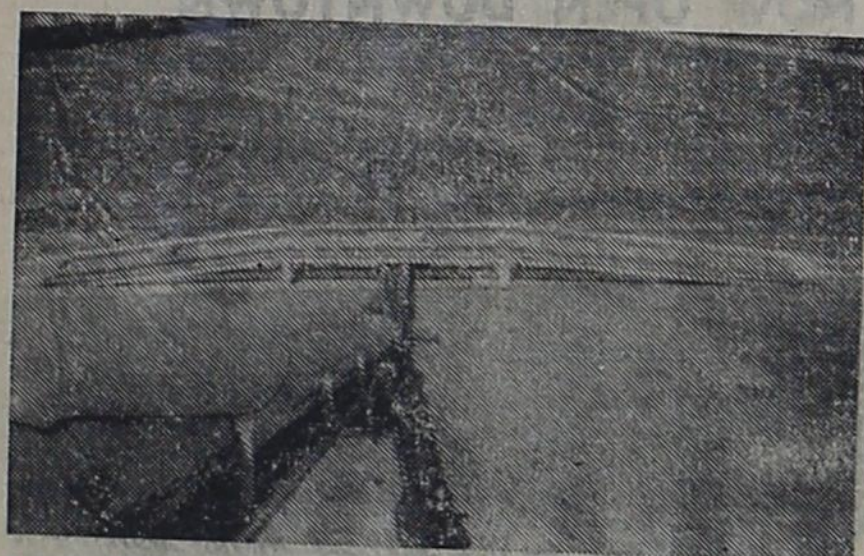
