

THERE ARE ALREADY EXISTING FEDERAL REG-ULATIONS on contaminates in water which could cause a communicable disease. The sponsors of this new law say that present regulations do not provide enough authority to condemn drinking water supplies which could cause chemical poisoning or other diseases.

IT IS NOT A MATTER OF WHETHER DRINKING WA-TER should be pure or not. Of course, there should be adequate standards to see that water for human consumption is wholesome. The point is that State and local authorities have this responsibility and should keep it. They know what is needed and are qualified to do the job without the Federal Government looking

over their shoulder. THE FEDERAL GOVERN-MENT MIGHT DO BETTER by spending the nearly \$200,-000,000 which this measure will initially cost in helping communities improve their water supplies.


