

USDA PROPOSES PEANUT PROGRAM REGULATIONS

Washington, March 31 -The public has until May 4 to comment on proposed regulations for the 1978 peanut

price support program. According to Ray Fitzgerald, Administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), most of the changes under consideration are required under the new two-tier price support system set forth in the Food

and Agriculture Act of 1977. There are two categories of proposals. Included in the first are provisions to define additional and quota peanuts. Another provision would make freeze-damage a consideration when grading peanuts for price support. Others deal with operations of peanut handlers, availability of warehouse storage loans, the establishment of pools for quota and additional loans peanuts and conditions under which segregation II and III pea-

nuts may be pledged for quota support. The second category includes regulations governing acreage allotments, marketing quotas, poundage quotas and the transfer of farm poundage quotas from

one farm to another. The details on the proposed regulations will be published in the April 4 federal Comments on the first

talking about the flu epi) demic of World War I and the next thing I knew I had a pretty good case of flu myself. I guess there might be a lesson there for someone, but for the life of me I can't figure out what it is.

I had been trying to fight the flu of for two or three days but when my fever got to about 101 and my mother also had a slight temeperature rise, I decided it was time for both of us to go to the hospital.

I was the sick one. After we checked in the hospital and were sort of settled down, my mother, who was in the same room with me,

told a nurse, "I'm mot sick; I don't know what I'm doing here: I don't know why J oe brought me here." S he continued, "I ought to be home."

T here I was in all kinds of flu misery and my little mother proclaiming to the world she wouldn't be in a hospital.

S omeone has to wait on that little lady and as it was up to me I had to do something with her. The best Icould do under the circumstances was to take her to the hospital with me. S o that is what I did.

My brother Rex was born while we lived at the corner of W alnut and W est M ain. H e is about three and a half years younger thatn I. H e too wasdelivered by D r. J .L J ohnson. O n the day of this great event after all of the excitement was over and D r. J ohnson was getting ready to go, he and D ad were talking on the front porch. D r. J ohnson asked dad, "W hat are you going to name that boy, W alter? "

D ad answered that he didn't know but that they might name him after W oodroe W ilson, who was then the P resident of the U nited S tates.

A ctually, M other and D ad named the youngster W alter R ex, and he went by the name of R ex, and still does.

Y ears later, R ex was working away from Eastland and for some reason or other he needed a birth certificate. W riting to the clerk's office here about one he was told that his parents did not show his having been born but on the day he was born his parents had a boy nanedWoodroe Wilson G ray.

R ex then had to go through all of the formality of getting a sworn-to delayed birth certificate. A 1 parently D r. J O hnson had filed a certificate of birth using the information he got from D ad on the front porch right after the boy was born. But that information failed to consider my M other's thoughts on naming the baby.

W ith the thought of being near to a school D ad bought a lot on S outh S eaman street catacorned from the proposed site of S outh Ward S chool and built our home in the spring and summer of 1920.
