JOE GRAY SAYS
 I missed out with these little weekly visits with the readers of this paper last week because my having the spend five days and nights in Eastland Memorial Hospital with a case of the flu.
 Week before last I was

talking about the flu epidemic of World War I and the next thing I knew I had a pretty good case of flu myself. I guess there might be a lesson there for someone, but for the life of me I can't figure out what it is.
 I had been trying to fight the flu for two or three days but when my fever got to about 101 and my mother also had a slight temperature rise, I decided it was time for both of us to go to the hospital.
 I was the sick one. After we checked in the hospital and were sort of settled down, my mother, who was in the same room with me,

told a nurse, "I'm not sick; I don't know what I'm doing here; I don't know why I brought me here." She continued, "I ought to be home."
 There I was in all kinds of flu misery and my little mother proclaiming to the world she wouldn't be in a hospital.
 Someone has to wait on that little lady and as it was up to me I had to do something with her. The best I could do under the circumstances was to take her to the hospital with me. So that is what I did.
 My brother Rex was born while we lived at the corner of Walnut and West Main. He is about three and a half years younger than I. He too was delivered by Dr. J. L. Johnson. On the day of this great event after all of the excitement was over and Dr. Johnson was getting ready to go, he and Dad were talking on the front porch. Dr. Johnson asked dad, "What are you going to name that boy, Walter?"
 Dad answered that he didn't know but that they might name him after Woodrow Wilson, who was then the President of the United States.
 Actually, Mother and Dad named the youngster Walter Rex, and he went by the name of Rex, and still does.
 Years later, Rex was working away from Eastland and for some reason or other he needed a birth certificate. Writing to the clerk's office here about one he was told that his parents did not show his having been born but on the day he was born his parents had a boy named Woodrow Wilson Gray.
 Rex then had to go through all of the formality of getting a sworn-to delayed birth certificate. Apparently Dr. Johnson had filed a certificate of birth using the information he got from Dad on the front porch right after the boy was born. But that information failed to consider my Mother's thoughts on naming the baby.
 With the thought of being near to a school Dad bought a lot on South Seaman street catcornered from the proposed site of South Ward School and built our home in the spring and summer of 1920. We moved into this house in 1920 in time for me to start to school in the first grade the first year South Ward operated as a school.
 For some reason or other though, the teachers there saw fit to promote me from the low first grade to the high first grade, which meant that from the time I started to school until I finished grammar school, or the seventh grade, I started each school year in the high part of the grade instead of the low part and moved to the low part a mid-term. This meant that I finished grammar school at mid-term and entered high school in January instead of September as most freshmen students do.
 Other in this class of students were Robert S. Parr, who was the first member of my high school graduating class to die, the Weaver twins, George B. Rodgion, J. R. and Guy Guinn, Jr.
 Our class was the first to enter high school at mid-term and we entered high school the last year, or rather, the last semester, that the old building on the site of Eastland Memorial Hospital was used. We attended school in that building for one semester. I'll see you next week.

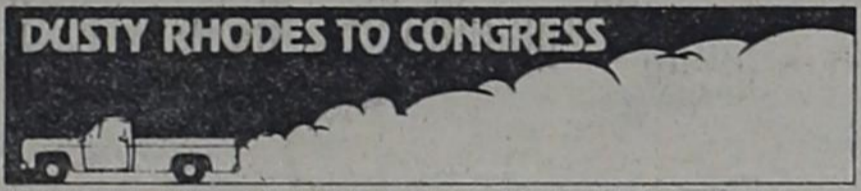

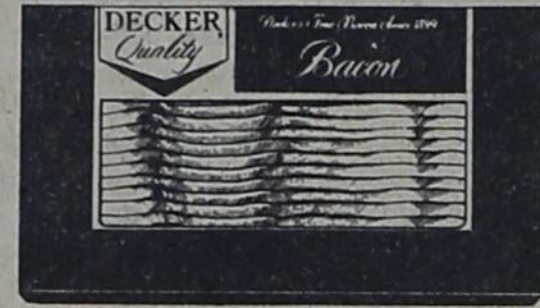

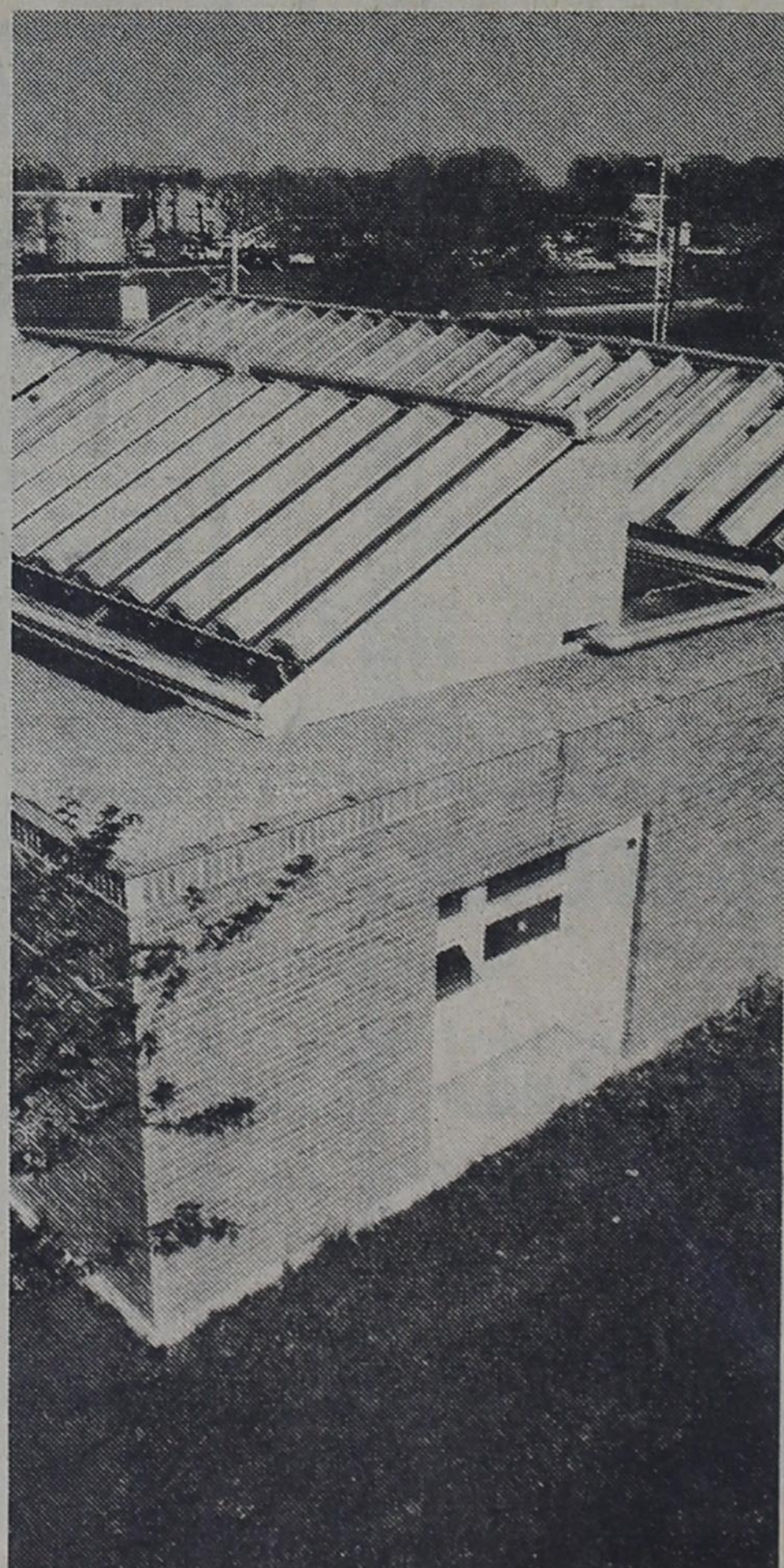
