

The suit asks the court to force the county commissioners to abide by a recommendation of the Eastland County Salary

On June 22, Gold Kist Peanuts concluded an agreement with Shell Peanut Co. for Gold Kist to begin operating the peanut shelling plant and storage facilities at Comyn.

John Lochridge, plant manager said, "This should prove to be a great benefit to our marketing program in Texas by giving us the shelling capacity to serve our members in marketing both their Spanish and runner peanuts."

Lochridge stated, "We will continue our peanut procurement and storage operations in Comanche as well as handle our seed program at Comanche. George Pratt will manage our seed operations and Dendy Scott will serve as procurement manager at Comanche."

The wind storm Monday night that dumped 1.65 inches of rain in Gorman also brought havoc to trees, TV antennas, roofs of building and doors.

The roof was lifted at the A.E. Smith Peanut Dryers and ended up in a tree nearby and the door at the loading building at Gorman Milling Company was twisted off, and the storm traveled on the Tom Broom home damaging the roof of their home. A small sheet iron building at the First Pentecostal Church was demolished and blown several feet from the location.

Many trees were up rooted and limbs were blown from others. Most of the trees that were uprooted were china berry trees.

Gorman must have received the brunt of the storm, as we have not received any reports of other damage. -GP-

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




