IT'S FAIR TIME IN GORMAN. Saturday is the day for all of the residents of Gorman, Carbon, Desdemona and the Gorman trade area to bring your baked goods, canned foods, clothing and crafts to the High School Gym between 8 and 9 a. m. to be exhibited for judging. There will be a place for everyone to exhibit from Junior and Senior Youth to Adult and Senior

Citizens. One entry per person in each of the following classes will be accepted: Cakes, Candy, Cookie, Pies, Yeast Breads; Vegetables, Fruits, Juices, Jellies, Preserves, Pickles, Sweet, Dill and Relish; Clothing, casual and dress wear; Crafts, general crafts and hobbies, Bedspreads, Quilts, Jewelry, Furniture, Knitting, Crochet and Tatting, Embroidery and Stuffed dolls, toys and Pillows.

First, second and third place ribbons will be given in the different classes with all other entries receiving participation ribbons. The judges' decision will be final.

There will also be an exhibit table for items to be displayed only, not for judging, such as vegetables, fruits nuts and plants. The public is invited to view the exhibits from 1 to 5 p. m.

The winning entries in the baked good and food preservation will become the property of the Bicentennial Fund and will be sold. They may be purchased anytime after the judging, but may not be picked up until 5:00 p. m. No crafts will be sold. All exhibits must be picked up between 5 and 6 p. m.

There will be a PIE EATING CONTEST at 2:00 p. m. So come one and all and prove that you are the best pie eater in town.

THE PRETTY BABY CONTEST will be at 3:00 p. m. in the auditorium and also the YOUNG AGE CONTEST will be in the auditorium at 7 p. m. followed by the COLONIAL FASHION SHOW. Admission for these events will be 75c with one ticket admitting you to both the Young Age Contest and the Fashion Show.

So come on everyone, and let's make this a Fair that will be a lot of fun for all the family.

Panthers Shock Hounds 50-13; Journey To Hico on Friday Night

The Gorman Panthers of 1975 continued their winning ways on Friday night when they traveled to Throckmorton to take on the Greyhounds in a rather tough ball game in spite of the one-sided margin of 50 to 13.

The Panthers scored on their first possession, going 66 yards in 7 plays. Following a Hound penalty, which set the Panthers up first and ten on the Hound 35, Billy Burgess raced for 34 yards on a beautiful scamper that put the Panther backers in a high pitch. Billy got the final yard with 8:07 left in the first period. Mel Maxfield added the two-pointer on a keeper play and the score was 8-0.

The Panthers held the Greyhounds after they had sustained a long drive ending on the Panther 34. From there the Big Red rolled for another score in 9 plays featuring a 29 yard pass to Kirk Arnold, and another aerial to Arnold for the final 20 yards with 9:34 left in the second quarter. The pass try for points failed and the score rose to 14-0.

The Panthers got the ball again on their 48 yard line following a pass interception by James Webb. Gorman scored in 7 plays with James Webb ramming in from one

yard out with 5:22 left in the first half. This drive was sparked by a sensational 20 yard run by Webb. Burgess ran for the two points and the margin was raised to 22-0.

The Big Red added another tally with 1:32 left in the first half when Billy Burgess raced for the final 19 yards on a brilliant run. This drive also featured a 16 yard pass to Burgess. The run for points failed and the Panthers led by the score of 28-0.

The Panthers added still another touchdown in the final seconds of the first half when Maxfield hit Kirk Arnold on a pass of 13, then another aerial to Arnold for the final 26 yards as time ran out. This drive was set up by an interception by James Webb and the Hound 39. The run for two points failed and the halftime bulge was 34-0.

The next Gorman score came with 3:22 left in the third period on a pass from Maxfield to Tony Ripley for the final 13 yards. This drive covered 25 yards in just three plays. Robert Lewis ran for the two pointer and the score jumped to 42-0.

The Hounds got on the scoreboard with 1:54 left in the third quarter when Mike Pirtle pounced on a Panther bobble in the end zone following a pitch-out play. The kick for the point failed and the score stood at 42-6.

The Panthers got their final score on a beautiful 30 yard punt return by Mel Maxfield with 5:09 left in the fourth period. A pass to Arnold added the two extra points and the score climbed to 50-6.

With 31 seconds left in the game the Greyhounds scored on a 10 yard pass play to Ash to cap a 77 drive. The kick for extra point was good and the final score read 50-13.

This was a great game for the Panther offense. And it wasn't "no slouch" for the Panther defense either! The Panther defense was tested rather hard in the first period but after they started picking up their keys and settled down to it, they shut down the Greyhound offense.

The entire team played a great game on defense, which we feel was led by Bruce Gibbs, Robert Lewis, Mel Maxfield, who got several real good hits, and also James Webb who was in on numerous plays, plus getting the two interceptions. Also Chuck Troutman did a fine job from his defensive end position.

The Panther offense was again led by Billy Burgess who had 129 yards on 14 tries for a 9.2 average. He had an amazing total of 94 yards at halftime. Webb had 32 on 9 carries; Carl Burleson had 26 yards on 4 totes; Robert Lewis got 7 on 4 carries; Blaine Gibbs had 5 yards on 2 trips and Maxfield wound up with a plus 2 on 4 keeps, but lost 10 yards on two QB sacks.

And there will be no time to savor the victory this week as the Panthers had to prepare for the always tough Hico Tigers who have a fine record so far and their last two victories came over the Hamilton Bulldogs and the Dublin Lions. The Tigers have a real fine team and the Panthers will have to be ready from the starting gun to stop the Tigers. On the other hand, the Tigers are also expected to have their hands full with the up-and-coming Gorman Panthers. And we believe the Panthers will be more than two handfulls for the Tigers on Friday night at Hico. Go Get 'Em Panthers!

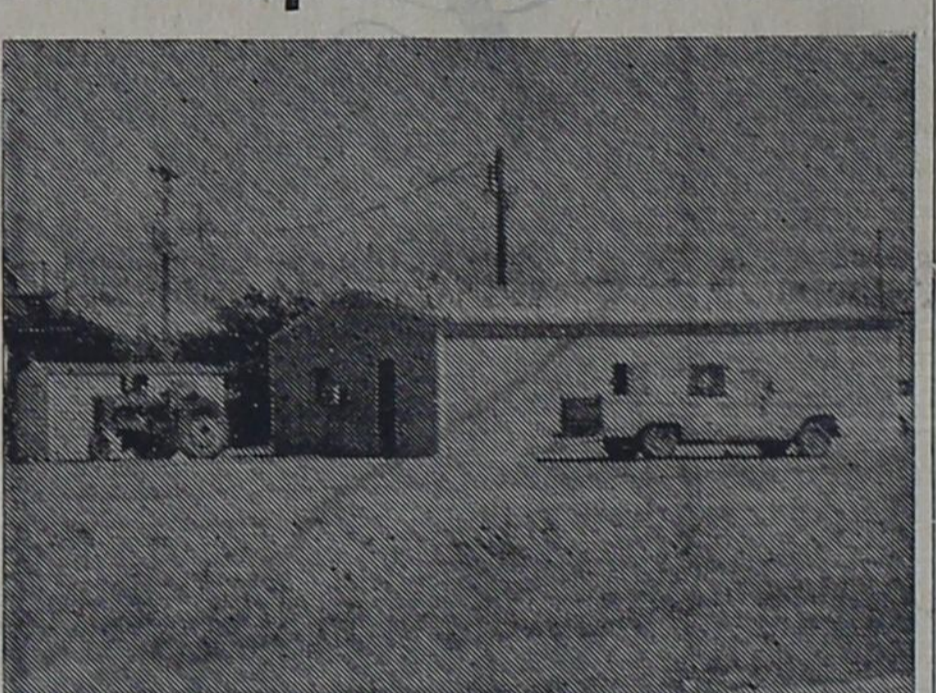
Gorman School Homecoming is only a month away. Make plans Exes for the big weekend November 1st.
