#### MAY 19, 1977 Clears House Panel

According to Ross Wilson, Manager, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, Gorman, Texas, the House Agriculture Committee on May 11, 1977, passed the peanut bill reported by the House Agriculture

Subcommittee for Oilseeds and

Rice on May 5, 1977. The bill as passed by the full Committee was changed in only one respect from the bill reported by the Subcommittee. The provision was added to the bill giving the Secretary of Agriculture discretion to establish area type pools in the computation of profits or losses on peanut loan stocks in the distribution of pool earnings to growers.

A vigorous effort, led by Representative Paul Findley (R- Ill.) to set price support rates as initially suggested by USDA on Mar ch 17, 1977 (\$390) in '78; \$375 in '79; \$360 in '80 and \$345 in '81) was defeated after long and heated debate by a vote of 25 against and 11 For.

A second effort to beat the support level down was led by Congresswoman Margaret Heckler (R- Mass), when she offered an amendemnt that would have established \$420 per ton as the maximum rather than the minimu support level during the period 1978- 1981.

The Heckler Amendment failed with 23 members voting "Against" and 13 voting

"For". Wilson said major credit for holding the support level at a minimum of \$420 per ton is accorded House Agriculture Committee Vice Chairman W.R. "BOB" Poage (D- Tex.) and Subcommittee Chairman Dawson Mathis (D- Ga.) both of whom reportedly performed superbly during the long and often heated session of the Committee.

An effort by Representative Glenn English (D- Okla.) to pass an amendemnt to substitute a straight acreage plan and a support level of 70 percent of net parity (the Ballmon- Helms Bill) failed to pass on a voice vote.

An amendemnt offered by Representative Berkley Bedell (D- Iowa) that would have given the Secretary of Agriculture discretion in permitting sale and lease of acreage allotments, was soundly defeated.

The bill as reported by the Senate Agriculture Committee on April 27, 1977, and that passed by the House Agriculture Committee on May 11, 1977, differ in only two

respects. The Senate Bill provides that the peanut allotment for New Mexico befrozen at the 1975 level while the House Bill is silent on that matter. The House Bill authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to establish area- type pools for grower earnings on loan peanuts while the Senate Bill does not deal with this matter.

A Senate House Conference Committee from the two Agriculture Committees will resolve the differences in the two bills when the General Farm Bills, as reported by both the Senate and House Committees, are adopted by the respective bodies.

Close observer expect Representative Paul Findley (r- Ill.) to head a major effort to lower the peanut support levels when the House Bill reaches the floor.


