Richard Arnold Named To Chair EMS Council

Richard Arnold, Blackwell Hospital administrator was appointed Thursday, Sept. 8, to chair the West Central Texas Emergency Medical Services System Advis or y Council.

He succeeds John Nunn as chairman of the group. Because Arnold previously was vice chairman, Don Comedy of the Haskell Free Press was elected to the secondplace office.

Formerly a training coordinator for emergency medical services, Nunn was hired in June as emergency systems coordinator for the West Texas area. Since the coordinator is a state position, the former chairman had to relinquish the position, Nunn explained.

Other business at the monthly meeting included preparing the final copy of the questionnaire for the 38 ambulance services in West Central Texas. Prepared by Richard Cox, owner of the Abilene Emergency Medical Service, and Comedy, the survey will ask for information such as name, type of equipment and training.

Information will be compiled into a form for area hospitals, Nunn explained, so emergency rooms will know what to expect from incom ing ambulances.

The types of equipment and staff training of out-oftown emergency services are needed particularly by Hendrick Medical Center and West Texas Medical Center Nunn said, because the Abilene hospitals are transfer pointed from smaller area hospitals.

Composed of 16 members from a 19-county area, the advisory council is a stipulation of an emergency services grant from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The grant is funneled through the Texas Department of Health, which provides staff services for the advisory council.

The advisory board's next meeting will be at 1 p. m. October 13 in the Old Courthouse.

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

(S.J.R. 49) S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, nondiscriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices

The wording of the protain cultural, historical, posed amendment as it will or natural history re- appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."



PECAN SPRAY TIME

Adult pecan weevil emergence has been observed. After an egg has been deposthrough out Eastland County reports DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent. That means it's time to spray for the control of the weevil, one of the most damaging pests of pecans.

Gordon said last year many pecan growers lost a large portion of their pecans because of weevil damage.

Chemical control will reduce adult weevil numbers before feeding and egg laying occurs. Once the pecan has been punctured or eggs have been deposited, the nut is destroyed. Proper timing of insecticide applications & retreatment schedules are important in achieveing pro-

tection of the pecans. Gordon said about this time each year pecan weevil

and move into pecan trees to mate and deposit their eggs. ited, the larva will develop

inside the pecan, cut a hole in the shell about 1/8 inch in diameter and emerge from the pecan as a fully grown larva from late October to December. The little white grubs with red heads or larvae will tunnel into the soil 4 to 12 inches. Much of the pecan weevil's 2 to 3 year life cycle is spent as a larva in the soil. Larvae that enter the soil this fall will emerge in August of 1979 with the exception of about 10 percent

fall of 1980. Early maturing varieties are unusually more susceptible to weevil attack. Feeding of adults weevils causes the nuts in the water stage to

of these larvae which will

emerge as adults during the

drop. Chemical control during the water stage may be required to protect the fruit on the tree. After the kernel begins to reach the dough stage, the nut is susceptible to egg laying. A single female may deposit up to 60 eggs over a month period. Adult weevil populations will vary greatly from year to year but in heavily infested orchards pecan weevil populations will probably be present in most years.

Insecticide applicat i o n s should be applied to pecans as the pecans reach the dough stage. This can be determined by cutting through a developing pecan kernel. It will contain water or gel or dough depending of its stage of maturity.

Nut protection can be achieved with several applications of Sevin, an application
