**EASTLAND** — Frank Tucker, 84, former Eastland County Sheriff, died at 10:55 a. m. Saturday, Nov. 10 following an apparent heart attack at his residence in Carbon. Services were held at 2 p. m. onday at Bakker Funeral Home Chapel.

The Rev. Delbert Smith, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Carbon officiated, assisted by the Rev. Dwaine Clower, pastor of Mangum Baptist Church. Burial was in Murray Cemetery.

Born March 3, 1895, in Eastland County, he married Nora Solomon Dec. 1, 1935 in Carbon. He was a lifetime resident of the county, a former truck driver and served as sheriff of Eastland County from 1950-1954. He was a member of the Knights Phythys Lodge. He was a member of Mangum Baptist Church.

## Randy Green Receives Highest FFA Degree

**KANSAS CITY, MO., NOV. 8** — Randy Green of Gorman received the American Farmer Degree today at ceremonies held during the 52nd National Convention of the Future Farmers of America (FFA), in Kansas City, Missouri. He was one of 789 FFA members selected to receive the American Farmer Degree, highest degree of membership in the FFA. As a holder of the American Farmer Degree, he joins a select group representing about one percent of all the nation's FFA members.

Randy is the son of Mr.

and Mrs. B. D. Green of Gorman.

Each American Farmer Degree recipient is presented a gold key and certificate by the Future Farmers of America, an organization of almost one-half million members studying agriculture in the United States. They also receive a cash award for travel to Kansas City and attend a breakfast in their honor both of which are co-sponsored through the National FFA Foundation, Inc., by J I Case Co. of Racine, Wisconsin; Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc. of Des Moines, Iowa; The Federal Land Bank Systems of the United States; Amoco Oil Co., of Chicago, Illinois, and The Chevrolet Motor Division, General Motors Corporation of Detroit, Michigan.

The American Farmer Degree is the highest degree of membership in the FFA. It is presented only by the National Organization of the Future Farmers of America to members who have demonstrated exceptional agricultural and leadership ability. State FFA Associations may submit candidates for the American Farmer Degree based on total FFA membership in the state. The 789 members awarded the Degree this year represent the highest achievement of more than 494,000 FFA members in almost 9,000 high school vocational agriculture departments.

All the FFA members who receive the American Farmer Degree begin as "Greenhands." After at least one semester of vocational agriculture, members may be advanced by the local chapter to the degree of "Chapter Farmer." The third degree, that of "State Farmer" is presented by the State FFA Association. Only students who have earned the State Farmer Degree are eligible for the American Farmer Degree. Each advancement is based on proficiency in combining classroom learning, practical "hands-on" experience and leadership.

In addition to having earned the State Farmer Degree, candidates for the American Farmer Degree must have been active members of the FFA for a least three years. They must have a record of participation in local and state FFA activities and they must have completed all of the vocational agriculture instruction offered in their high school. American Farmer applicants must also have earned at least \$1,000 by their own efforts.

The National FFA Convention is an annual event of the FFA and is carried out in cooperation with the U. S. Office of Education, of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. This year over 20,000 FFA members, vocational agriculture teachers, parents and guests are taking part in the 52nd National FFA Convention, a meeting held each year in Kansas City since the FFA was founded there in 1928.

## PANTHERS WIN ZONE TITLE; PLAY ROBERT LEE FRIDAY

The Gorman Panthers won the East Zone Title over the Blanket Tigers on Friday night 16-0 to go undefeated in zone play with a 5-0 record and advance into the District Playoff game with the Robert Lee Steers on Friday night in Abilene at Rose Park Stadium. Robert Lee were undefeated in West

Zone play. This District playoff game will be a repeat of last year's playoff teams as the Panthers and the Steers met at Abilene last season where the Steers embarrassed the Panthers in a one-sided victory in a game that didn't go right for the Panthers all night.

However the Panthers are really looking forward to this rematch game and will be going all-out to win this one. Rose Park Stadium is on 7th Street and Barrow. You may go down South 1st to Sayles Blvd, continue to 7th Street, turn right and then go down 7th St. to Barrow, which runs through Rose Park (old Fair Park) or go down South 1st to Barrow and turn left on

Barrow and go to the stadium. Parking is available on each end of the stadium and on the east side of the field. There are only bleachers on one side (west) and no parking is available on the east side. Game time is 7:30p. m. Gorman fans will set on the north end of the bleachers. If you are now going to be able to attend the game, it will be broadcast over KOXE FM 101 of Brownwood.

The Panthers repeated as Champs of East Zone 6-B play with a 16-0 defeat over the Blanket Tigers on Friday night. The Panthers scored on their second possession after fumbling on their first possession. Larry Keith,

running out of the quarterback position ran the option, faked a pitch to Johnson and cut back up the middle and broke into the clear and raced 40 yards for the TD with 4:15 left in the first period. The drive covered 71 yards in 6 plays. Jimmy Johnson ran for the bonus points and Gorman led 8-0.

The Panthers moved to the Blanket 9 late in the second period but were penalized 5 yards after a 5 yard gain back to the nine, then failed to score. A 41 yard pass from Gressett to Riley Curb set the Panthers up at the Blanket 9. The first play netted 5 yards, then the penalty came, then the Panthers failed to score and Blanket took over on their own 5.

The Panthers came back after intermission and went 49 yards in 5 plays. The Big Red defense got the ball on a fumble recovery by Kip Nemir at the Tiger 49. After 13 and 14 yard runs by Johnson, a 3 yard run by Larry Keith, Johnson set up the Panthers with another 13 yard run at the Blanket one yard line. Keith did the honors with a 1 yard run with 10:00 left in the third period. A pass to Riley Curb added the bonus points and the Big Red led 16-0.

The Tigers got to the Gorman 1 yard line late in the game but the Panthers held on downs and took over at the 1. Then the Panthers started a drive to kill the clock that covered 34 yards before time ran out.

The Big Red were led by Larry Keith who had his best overall on offense and defense. He is a leader on the Panther team and really sparks the Big Red on. All the Panthers should take a big bow for holding the Tigers scoreless because they were the toughest (or 1 of the toughest) teams we met this year. The Big Red defense has performed superbly all year and deserve our highest praise.

Johnson led the Panthers on the ground with 127 yards on 25 carries. Keith had 121 on 21. Toofer Bond had 4 on 1 carry and Steve Spivey had 6 on 2 trips. Gressett had 4 on 4.

Lets all travel to Abilene on Friday night at 7:30 to back the Big Red to the District 6-B Title over the Steers. The winner will advance to the Bi-District next week against the winner of the Gorec-Windthorst game. Get 'em Big Red!

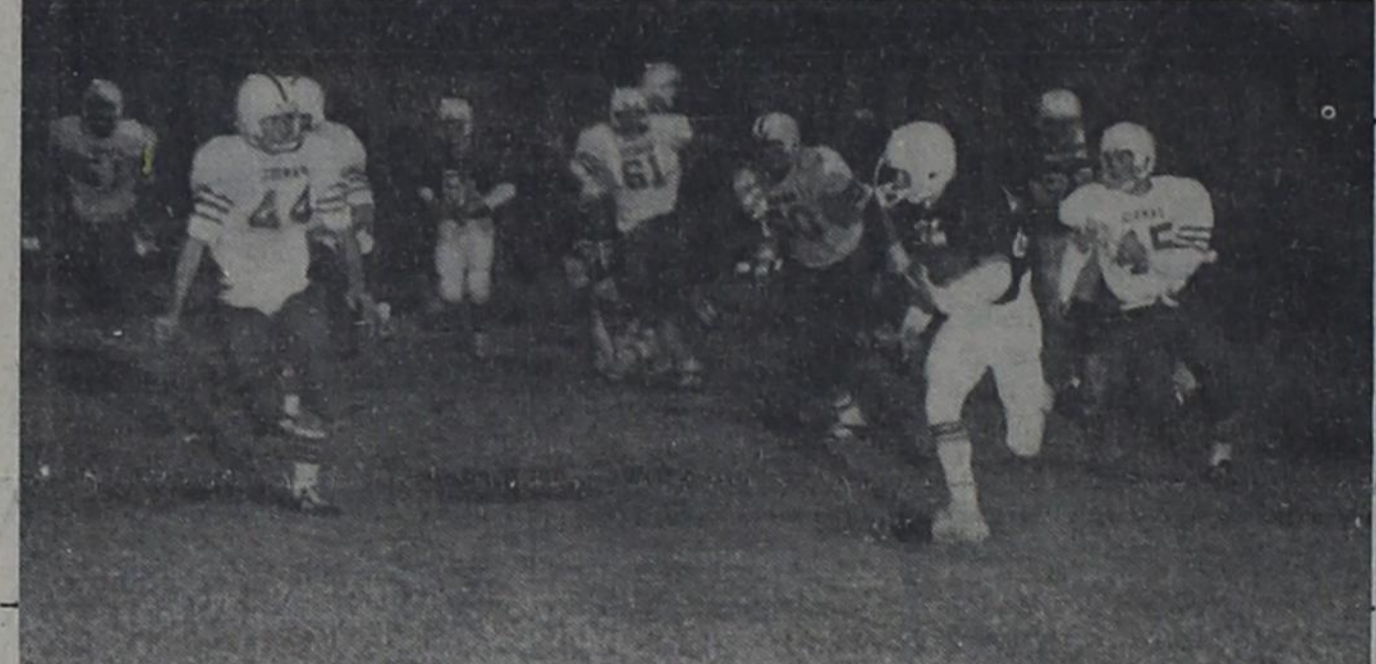

**RURAL HOMEOWNERS MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR LOAN OR GRANT FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION**  
An Eastland County homeowner whose house needs

fixing up may be eligible for a loan and/or grant from Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

The Agency makes home improvement loans to families who may not need or cannot afford a new house, but need some work done on their present house to bring it up to minimum property standards. It also makes loans as well as grants to homeowners to remove health or safety hazards from their dwellings. Grants are made only to low-income elderly homeowners, sixty-two years or older.

A borrower's income is the key to the type of assistance for which he is eligible.

In income is so low as to permit only removal of health or safety hazards, a repair loan and/or grant may be available.

For families with somewhat higher income, a home improvement loan may be possible to bring the house up to FmHA minimum property standards.
