

> Then following the intermission, the Buffs took the kickoff on the Gorman 47 yard line and moved the distance in 10 plays, featuring an outstanding run of 27 yards by Tommy Johnston, before Johnston carried it for the TD on a 1 yard blast into the line with 8:17 left in the third quarter. Then Dennis Koenig passed to Ronald Hinburn for the two pointer and the Buffs had shocked the Big Red to lead 8 to 6.

The Panthers came back to reality following the Buff score and decided to cranked up as they took the kick on their own 33 and went the distance in 8 plays with Swanner getting the final 6 yards on a run with 4:04 left in the third. The drive featured a pass of 21 yards to Eddie Pettit before Swanner took it in for the score from the 6 yard line. A pass from Dane Gressett to Russ Gressett added the two pointer and the Panthers went ahead to

The Panthers came back after recovering a Buff fumble on the 20 and scored in one big blast as Swanner took the handoff and raced 20 yards fot the score with 3:42 left in the quarter. The run for two points failed and Gorman was up 20 to 8.

For the next several weeks, I well be discussing with you the Six proposed Constitutional Amendments that will appear on the November 2, 1982, ballot. From this information, it is hoped you have enough facts to decide how you wish to vote on the issue.

The first reference is how the proposed amendment will be stated on the ballot, and the rest is a discussion thereof.

Amendment No. 1. constitutional amendment repealing the

state property tax." This proposed amendment repeals the State property tax. This tax is pledged for funding construction at 17 named state universities. These 17 universities do not participate in the Permanent University Fund. North Texas State University and Texas Woman's University are the colleges from this Senatorial District that re-

ceived funding for construc-

tion from this tax. This property tax is the only remaining state property tax that is set at a value of 10 cents per \$100 evaluation. In 1979 the Legislature attempted to effectively repeal the tax by reducing the tax rate to .001 cents per \$100 evaluation (thus making the tax revenue so minute that the amount would not even justify collection). Legal scholars and subsequently the Legislature agreed that this "back door repeal" of a part of the Texas Constitution could not be done by statute but must be done by submission of voters for a repeal. This tax has not been collected since 1979.

Underlying arguments for and against the repeal are as

FOR

(1) Property taxes are the primary means of support for local governments, which are generally hard-pressed for revenue. The State, which has other means of support, should not compete with local governments for taxes by continuing to tax already overburdened property

owners. (2) The need for dedicated construction funding for universities is not as great as it once was. The Constitutional provision that is being repealed was passed in 1947, at a time when college enrollments were booming because of the GI Bill and other reasons In the 1980's the colleges are not expanding nearly as rapidly as they once

(1/3) Constitutionally dedicated funds unnecessarily limit legislative disgretion to appropriate funds where the most need is shown. Also, in the appropriations process the needs of the colleges can be compared and weighed along beside the needs of the

**AGAINST** 

(1) The constitutional provision providing for source of funding construction at non-PUF colleges provides the most rational and cost effective method of providing construction monies for these universities. Construction requires an orderly, planned process and is most efficiently achieved through the issuance of bonds to carry out the plans. Constitutionally dedicated funds, allocated according to an equitable formula provide for orderly, planned growth based on anticipated and actual need. The few universities that have political "muscle" of those that will be conpeting will receive a disproportionate share of the funds allocated through the appropriations process.

(2) Although a 10-cent state property tax levied against 100 percent of market value might generate more money than actually needed, repeal of the tax is not the proper answer to that problem. Proposals such as reducing the tax to 3 cents could generate the amount needed without imposing a burden on property owners -or threatening local government revenues. A 3-cent tax on a \$50,000 home would result in a tax liability of only \$15 a year, disregarding any applicable exemptions. The State itself faces potential revenue problems, and repealing the tax will increase the drain on general reven-

(1/3) Article VII, Section 17, is part of a tradition in this state. Beginning in 1845, each Texas constitution has provided some form of dedicated funding for elementary or secondary education. If education is to retain its status as a top priority, all forms of dedicated funding for that purpose should be preserved. The repeal of Article VII, Section 17, would result in an inequitable situation in which only a few preferred universities in The Uviversity of Texas System or The Texas A&M Uviversity System have dedicated construction funding.
