Gorman Voters Help **Elect Democrats**

Approximately 70% of the eligible voters in Gorman voting district went to the polls Tuesday and voted overwhelmly for the Democrat candidates.

481 votes were cast and Jim Collins, candidate for U. S. Senate received 119 votes and incumbent Lloyd Bentsen polled 347 votes.

The Gorman Panthers put the Homecoming fans in the right mood on Friday night when they ran away from the visiting Evant Elks by the score of 54 to 24 in a battle that saw the Elks lose their first three possessions via the fumble or interception route. The Panthers took advantage of the misques and scored 24 points in the opening period to get things started. From that time on the Big Red just kept on

running and passing. The Elks took the kickoff on their own 25, and on first down tried a long pass, which was intercepted by Ricky Hunter at the Gorman 47. From there the Panthers scored in 11 plays with Jacky Johnson rambling for the final 12 yards with 6:39 left in the period. Jacky also added the two pointer. The drive included a 17 yard scamper by Johnson.

The Elks received the kick on their own 30, and on the first snap, fumbled the ball, which was recovered by the Panthers' Rhett Harrison at the Elk 31. The Panthers again turned an Elk misque into a touchdown, scoring in 6 plays with Johnson getting the final 2 yards with 5:26 left. Mark Swanner added the two pointer on a run to make the score 16-0. The drive featured a 16 yard pass to Swanner.

The Elks then received the kick on their own 31 and moved to their 46 before again losing the ball via the fumble route with Rodney Reese making the recovery. From there the Big Red scored in just 3 plays. Ricky Hunter broke into the open and raced 43 yards. Then following one more running play, Rhett Harrison got the first of three touchdowns for the night on a 1 yard run with 2:09 left in the quarter. Swanner added the two point conversion on a run and the Panthers upped their lead to

24-0. Following the third score the Elks started their scoring drive. They took the kick at their own 36 and moved the distance in 10 plays with Daron Standard tossing an 8 yard pass to Timmy Brown for the score with 9:34 left in the second period. The first play on the drive was a pass covering 34 yards, which a Panther defender tipped into the hands of the Elk receiver. The try for two points failed

and Gorman led 24-6. The Big Red was not to be outdone, however, as they took the kick on their own 32 and went the distance in 8 plays with Swanner going the final 4 yards on a run with 5:56 left in the half. The drive featured a 14 yard run by Johnson, a 37 yard pass to Eddie Pettit, and 11 yard pass to Swanner. Dane Gressett added the two pointer on a QB roll out to make the score 32-6.

The Elks came back on a drive but fumbled the ball on the Gorman 1 after the pass receiver for the Elks had covered 47 yards before being tackled at the 1, where he lost the ball on a fumble. The Elks scored a safety on the Panthers on the first play as Dane Gressett was caught in the end zone on a roll out for a 2 point safety. This made the score 32-8. The Panthers came back

for another score after recovering another Elk misque on the Gorman 42. Harrison got his second TD on an electrifing 48 yard run with just 7 seconds left in the half. The run for two failed and the Big Red had a 38-8 lead at halftime.




