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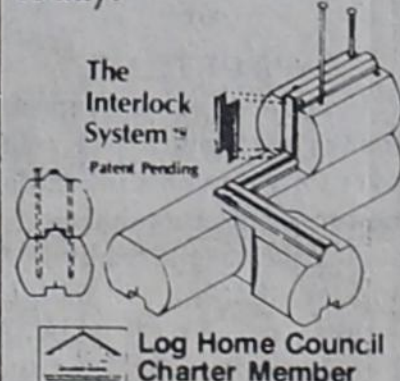

**Postal Service Will Handle Large Parcels**

The U.S. Postal Service will put simplified parcel mailing regulations into effect February 27, 1983.

Under the new regulations, parcels weighing 70 pounds or less and measuring not more than 108 inches in length and girth combined can be mailed from any post office to any destination within the United States. These standards apply regardless of whether the package is shipped by Express Mail, Priority Mail, parcel post or another fourth-class service.

Previously, most post offices in the nation's 6,200 largest cities could not accept parcels weighing more than 40 pounds or measuring more than 84 inches.

The exceptions to these size and weight limitations are for space available mail (SAM), parcel airlift mail (PAL), parcels to certain APO/FPO addresses and for mail sent via the Department of State United States government personnel abroad.

The Governors of the Postal Service voted to adopt the new regulations at their February 1 meeting in San Francisco, California.

Paraskiing is an unlikely combination of two sports—skydiving's jumping-for-accuracy and skiing's giant slalom racing.

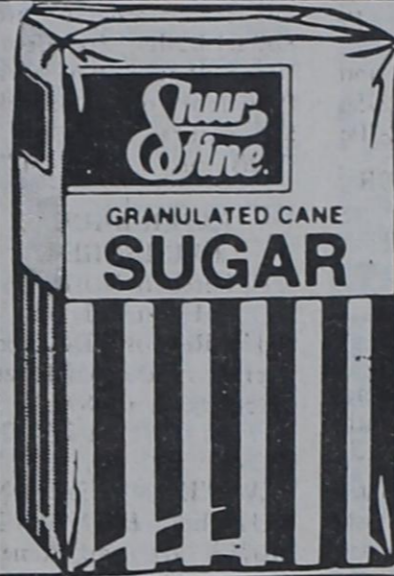
Sometime's called the "hit-and-ski" sport, paraskiing will debut this winter at the Camel Ski Adventure events at 28 ski resorts in the United States.

# REPORT FROM THE HOUSE

By Jim Parker

The 68th Legislature moved at a snail's pace this week and, to an extent, it is discouraging to know that so many have to be addressed but that we can not commence that process until the running of the constitutional time period of the first sixty (60) days of the session. I suppose the lighter side of that coin is that if the Legislature can not do anything, at least it can do no damage.

I will begin, in this week's column, to discuss issues that will

be coming up and, of course, elicit response from you, the voter, on these issues.

Since it is one of the largest areas of requested state expenditures, I shall commence with the Texas Department of Corrections. T.D.C. has requested 1.5 billion dollars for the biennium for all operations. There are 37,000 inmates in T.D.C. fifty percent (50%) of which are under age twenty-five (25), and the rate of increase of population in T.D.C. is four (4) to five (5) hundred per month. At current rate the State of Texas would have to build a 2,000 inmates prison every four (4) months. T.D.C. has more inmates than any other state, the Federal Prison system or, for that matter, any other free world nation.

The budget request for T.D.C. would equal out to \$40,450.00 per inmate for the two (2) year period.

I readily see the absolute necessity for penal institutions; however, my very conservative philosophy and whatever business sense I may have tells me that Texas is, very soon, going to reach an economic impasse in regard to criminal incarceration. My attitude on this problem is that I do not have any "miracle" solutions but someone sure needs to come up with some reasonable solutions and soon.

Our correctional system, as currently structured is itself a thief, stealing precious resources from other meritorious State programs, such as educa-

tion, agriculture, highways etc. I surely do not want to be painted with a liberal brush as being "soft on crime" because I am not but the only solution I see is to try alternatives to incarceration so some convicted, non-violent felons can be made to work to repay the expense they cause the State and, perhaps to compensate the victim of their crime. Up to this time we have failed to consider alternatives to incarceration maybe now we must.

In Texas we used to call one inmate to a cell, "solitary confinement" and thought of it as punishment. Federal Judge William Wayne Justice says it's a

## DA Warns Of Check Forgeries

Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton said that within the last three months there have been a substantial increase in forgeries of checks and in the last two weeks members of the Sheriff's Department, Cisco Police, Eastland Police and Ranger Police have been investigating an epidemic of forgeries. In one instance, an apparent forgery ring had come into the county for the purpose of passing forged checks within the county. In another instance this week, it has been determined that a person has passed between 20 and 30 forged checks all within two towns of the county.

Any person in business should require that a valid driver's license be presented when a check is given. Even when a driver's license number is shown on the check, the number should be checked with the actual driver's license because the situation is arising more frequently that the driver's license printed on the check is not the person's driver's license but a fictitious driver's license. Also, frequently the forgeries are two party checks which, along with the increasing number of hot checks, are such that any person in business taking a check should not take two party checks. If the two

party check is hot or drawn on an out of state bank, criminal charges cannot be filed by the person taking the check.

Also, he pointed out that in a couple of recently incidents a forger had stolen some blank checks from his employer and used carbon paper to trace his employer's signature onto the stolen blank checks. In another instance, when a person had received personalized checks which contained a printing error he threw the incorrect checks into his trash only to have someone find them and start forging his name to the checks and the checks were readily accepted because the person was well known in the community. In this regard, Walton urged citizens to be cautious by not leaving their check book in the automobile or other place where they could easily be stolen and if an account was closed or the checks were bad to tear up any such checks rather than just discarding the checks in the trash.

Walton said that Assistant Criminal District Attorney John Hawkins is working with the businesses on our hot check problems by taking criminal theft complaints regarding hot checks and asking the Court to impose fines and jail terms.

## CAR CARE CORNER

Tips For More Safety, Economy, Convenience

### Tire Rotation

The front and rear tires on your car perform different jobs and, accordingly, do not have a uniform wear pattern. Tire wear usually depends on three things:

1. Personal Driving Habits
2. Type of Vehicle
3. Roads Traveled

New radial tires should be inspected and rotated according to the recommendations contained in the automobile's owner's manual or maintenance folder. To increase life expectancy, the tire industry recommends that tires should be rotated every six to eight thousand miles.

Any of the common rotation patterns are acceptable for radial ply tires; however, Bill Woehrl, manager of industry standards for the Uniroyal Tire Company, suggests the rearward X rotation for best results. The right front tire is switched to the left rear and the left front tire is switched to the right rear position. The rear tires are brought directly forward as the diagram indicates.

This rearward X pattern, Woehrl says, should increase the life of your tires.

Have you given your fruit trees their annual "lube" job? I'm referring, of course, to an application of dormant oil to control scale insects.

Scale insects aren't usually recognized as insects, but if scale such as the San Jose scale or white peach scale get started, they can kill your trees.

Dormant oil can be purchased at stores where garden supplies are sold. Be sure to follow all label directions and apply the mixture when the temperature is between 40-70 degrees F. Do not apply if a freeze is likely within 48 hours after application, and do not apply after the tree has budded out. Dormant oil is applied when the tree is dormant. Spraying flowers and leaves could cause leaf burn and flower drop.

Scale insects are difficult for most people to detect, so dormant oil should be applied once each year. Sooner or later your tree will pro-

bably be attacked by scale insects, so be ready for guarding against them with applications of dormant oil.

As vegetable gardeners in Eastland County prepare for spring planting, their first step should be to control soil insects.

For effective control, mix insecticides into the soil at a depth of 4-6 inches at least two weeks before the garden plot is planted.

Among destructive soil insects are wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggots, cabbage maggots, mole crickets, sowbugs, slugs, snails and cutworms. Some destroy plant seeds, roots, tubers and underground stem parts while others cut off young plants at or near the soil surface.

Most soil insects can be controlled with diazinon 25 percent liquid concentration or Spectracide 6000 applied as a 5 percent granule. Granules usually give the best control. If cutworms or sowbugs become a problem after the garden has been planted, broadcast 5 percent Sevin bait over the soil surface. This bait containing
