
Persons who tried but were unable to give blood due to low hemoglobins were Wynogene Smith, Burma Broom, Deborah Cypher and Rhonda Honson.

REPORT FROM SENATOR BOB **GLASGOW**

Texas Sen. Bob Glasgow and Texas Rep. Jimmy Mankins announced today that, after completing several public meetings, and at the request of the Texas Aeronautics Commission, they will make several changes to their proposed bills affecting aviation in the state.

Both legislative members agree the public input received at the scheduled meetings prompted them to delete a general aviation aircraft and ultralight vehicle lecensing and license fee program, and to delete authority for the state to adopt rules concerning safe aircraft operations, this being the responsibility of the Federal Aviation Administration. Also deleted is a provision that would have authorized the Aeronautics Commission to coordinate defense conditions. A section of the proposed bills has been modified to authorize the Aeronautics Commission to administer federal blockgrant funds only for general aviation airports, if such a program is enacted by the U.S. Congress.

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

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

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
