**CITY CHIT CHAT**

The Gorman City Commission met July 7, 1983 with all Commissioners and the Mayor present. Other present were Mrs. Keesee, acting secretary, Chief Funderburg, Judge Ingram, Mr. Barnett, Mr. Joe Bennett, Mr. Lonnie Bennett, Mr. Clea Echols, and Mr. Ake. Minutes of the last meeting were approved as read. Bills for June were presented and approved. Heads of departments gave monthly report. The reports showed that the general business of the City was progressing in a normal fashion.

We received the new water rates from the Upper Leon Water Dist. They were raised from the present rate of \$0.9531 per thousand gallons to \$1.1280 per thousand. This represents and 18.3% increase over present rates. We wish we could absorb this, but we can't, so we set the following rates to be effective with your August reading. The minimum will increase from \$6.50 to \$7.25 for the first 2000 gallons. The cost per thousand for all over 2000

gallons will increase from \$1.50 to \$1.75 per thousand. At the same time we are increasing the charge for hauling trash from \$3.00 to \$3.25. We feel that our rates are still reasonable and are below those cities who are getting their water from Lake Proctor. We hate to have to raise any fees or charges, but with costs up to the City we have no other choice if we continue to give the service we are giving.

Due to many requests to change the hours that the landfill will be open, we voted to make a change and see how it would work. The landfill will be open from 10:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M. each Friday. This will give people who are working two hours after work time on Friday. We know that this change will not satisfy everyone, but we will see how it works out. These new hours will become effective on Friday, July 15. Remember this date.

We are having a few people who are dumping along the road and in the gate at the landfill. I am asking you to please not dump in these areas. It is very unsightly and is also unlawful. Please cooperate with us on this matter so that we can better serve you at the landfill.

I want to express a belated thanks to all who helped to make the Fourth of July Celebration such a success. The Park Committee will never know just how much we appreciate what they are doing to help the City provide a Park that we can all be proud of. I will not attempt to name names, because they were many. Everything was well planned and went off just like it had been planned.

Then I would like to say thanks to all citizens and visitors who turned out and enjoyed the day together. I did not attempt to guess how many came at various times, but there were hundreds. Everyone was enjoying the contests, the games being played, the good food that was served and the splendid fireworks display that was presented as the closing number. If you did not attend, you missed a very enjoyable day with your friends and neighbors.

Thanks again to all who worked long and hot hours, planning, preparing the grounds, securing the food, the serving of the food, furnishing the music and for everything else that I may have overlooked.

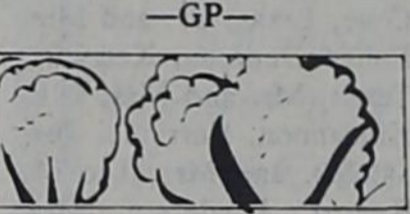
**COUNTY 4-H FASHION SHOW**

**THE GORDON SPOT**

by De Marquis Gordon

Eastland County residents who have elm trees in their yards should keep a watchful eye on the trees to spot infestations of elm leaf beetles.

The beetles are a serious pest of elm trees as they eat the surface of the leaves, leaving only the veins. The skeletonized leaves turn brown and eventually fall from the trees. The damage weakens the trees and makes them more susceptible to borers that attack elms.

The adult beetles are oval and about a quarter of an inch long. They are yellowish to olive yellowish to olive-green in color with a black stripe along each side of the wing covers.

The beetles lay yellow eggs on the undersides of elm leaves. Full grown larvae are about half an inch long, dull yellow in color with black stripes on their back, and have a distinct black head.

Although many insecticides will kill the adult and larvae beetles, the major

problem is thorough coverage of infested trees. Trees often have to be sprayed several times because there are at least three or more generations of beetles a year.

High-pressure, high-volume sprayers are necessary to completely cover the foliage. Some degree of control can be obtained by spraying the trunk and lower when the larvae move down to the ground to pupate.

Bag worms are also destructive pests on evergreen and deciduous shrubs and trees. If you have not treated ornamentals for these pests you should check to see if you have a problem.

The young worms or caterpillars construct a small tapered bag of silk-like material and attach to it pieces of bark and foliage.

The bagworm protrudes its head and front feet from the bag as it moves about the plant feeding but will withdraw into the bag when disturbed. In late summer the bag is attached to a branch and the mature caterpillar pupates within the bag. At that time it is not possible to control the worms with insecticides.

The bagworms are easier to control when they are young.

Webworms have been a noticeable problem recently. Usually, there is only one infested branch per tree. The best control is to remove the infested branch and dispose of it.

Our seasons seem to be very late this year. Spring came late and summer has been late arriving. This has confused many insects. The pecan nut casebearer usually begins infestations about May 25 in Eastland County. This year we did not find eggs of the casebearer until about June 6. At that time most pecan growers sprayed and thought that pest was controlled. However, the casebearers continued to hatch and cause damage until about June 20, almost one month later than usual.

The rainfall in Eastland County has been less than most areas around us. While many areas are experiencing a wet year we are a little behind the average rainfall rate. Ronald Bailey's weather records show that we have had 13.25 inches of rain during the first half of the year. Our average rainfall for the first six months is about 15 inches.

# CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker



Having discussed the teacher pay raise issue last week's article, I would now like to mention some other areas which the Select Committee on Public Education may be studying along with possible problems which the Committee must eventually face.

Something the Committee will hear about and that we have all heard about these days is the decrease in the average achievement scores of students compared to those of 20 or 30 years ago. Does this mean the kids today are not as smart or learning as much today as "when I was in school?" Does it mean that the schools are not teaching as much?

Some people believe the tests given today are "outdated" and are simply not measuring learning in all

areas of education, while other believe the schools have spent so much time on areas not considered "the basics" such as art, music, drama, field trips and just trying to make learning fun, that they have fallen behind in teaching the "3R's." Some people believe fine arts, such as music, art, etc., social graces and such are of major importance for a good education, while others believe those areas are outside the function of the school system which should, they believe, teach

more of the basics and require more work and higher standards for advancement from grade to grade. They believe teachers should demand learning, even going back to having students learn by rote if necessary.

We often hear that the European and Japanese high school students are far above U.S. students in overall education. They are required early to learn at least one foreign language and are years ahead in both math and the sciences. Assuming it may be true that their high schools are equivalent to our Jr. Colleges as some say, we must remember that in those countries only those students who have passed certain tests and met certain requirements even go to high school. Others, at around the 6th or 7th grade level, are diverted into technical or trade schools. We need to be aware that we are comparing their brighter students to the "average" students over here.

With regard to the education of teachers, I believe some of the Colleges turning out teachers are requiring a certain number of hours in "education courses," some of which, in my opinion, are absolutely a joke. It would seem that time could be better spent in courses in the field the student plans to teach.

The Committee will hear testimony regarding these issues, as does the State Board of Education each year. They will also hear of all the Federal requirements such as head-start programs, busing to integrate, bi-lingual education and special education requirements, even for those under school age, which have been added to the school systems' responsibilities in our country.

Just where does the responsibility of the schools for education end or does it at all? What priorities, if any, should the school system have--reaching the most students, including handicapped, non-English speaking, etc., or quality education for the average and brighter student? Should we have separate schools for "college bound" and vocational training or continue to mix the students except for a couple of classes per day? What do you think?
