Gas Being Stolen From Gorman Ambulance

A serious problem has been reported pertaining to the Gorman Ambulance service.

For some time the attendance have noticed that gas has been taken from the gas tank of the ambulance, not all of the gas but up to a half a tank.

On Monday a patient from Gorman was being rushed to Abilene with a serious trauma injury. The ambulance was filled and only five miles had been driven, but the ambulance ran out of gas at Clyde.

This is a serious thing to happen. The driver of the ambulance knew he had filled the gas tank and did not know he needed to check the gas reading.

The person or persons who are taking gas from the ambulance should stop and think, the next person who needs the ambulance service may be you. The delay in stopping to get gas or if its a midnight run, gas may not be available and a life could be lost.

Locks have been placed on the gas tanks of the ambulance in hopes of preventing such an incident from happening that happened Monday.

Marciel Justice In Parkland Burn Center After Fire

The home of Glen and Marciel Justice of Carbon was destroyed by fire early Monday morning.

The couple escaped the inferno by driving their car through a garage door.

Marciel suffered second and third degree burns on her face, chest and arms and remains in serious condition at Parkland Hospital's burn unit in Dallas.

Marciel was flown to the hospital by Care Flight and arrived in Dallas around 1:30 p.m. Monday.

Glenn suffered minor burns and is listed in satisfactory condition in Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Carbon Fire Chief, Collin Campbell said the Justices' brick home, located three miles southwest of Carbon was engulfed in flames when firemen arrived at 2:30 a.m.

Fire officials said the fire started in the attic and suspect it to have originated from the electrical system.

Rural firefighters from Carbon, Cisco, and Eastland fought the blaze for approximately six hours and only part of the walls were standing afterwards. According to Mr. Campbell the fire had already blocked the front exit to the house when the couple awoke.

They went to the garage area, but the electrically controlled garage doors would not open.

Fire officials believed the fire had knocked the power out. The Justices' got into the car, and Marciel drove through the garage doors, then a half mile to the home of Florence Spruill.

Mrs. Spruill said flesh was left on the drive way by Marciel when she ran to her

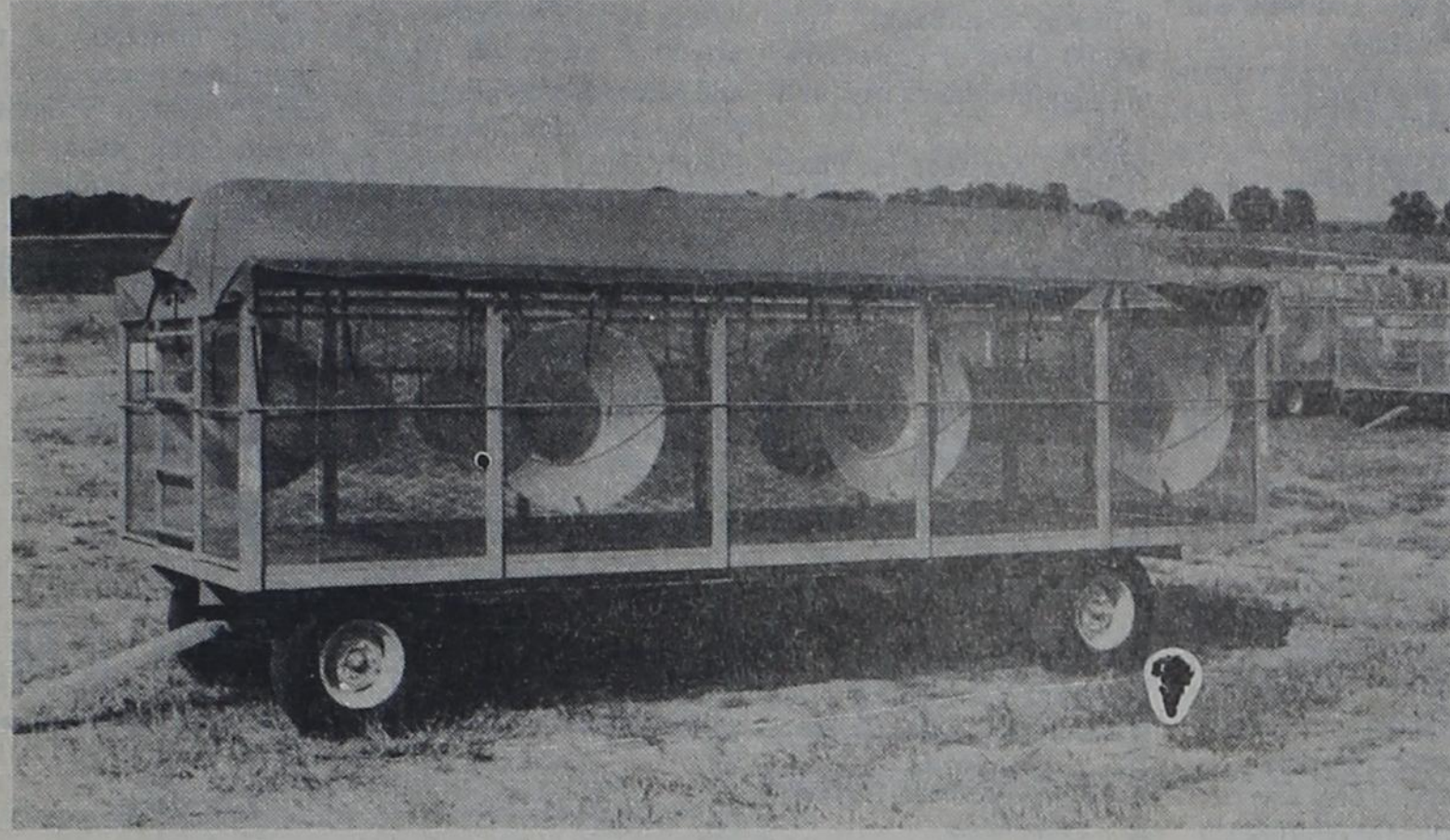

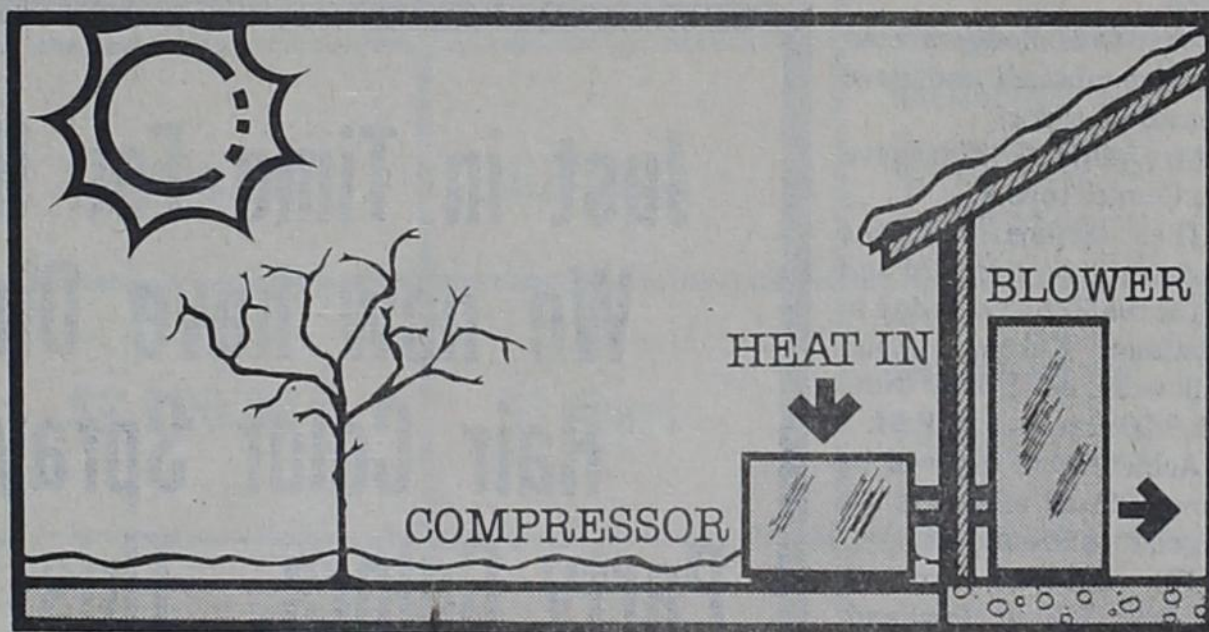
