

LOW INCOME FAMILIES ELIGIBLE FOR AID

Some low-income Texas households may be eligible for help in paying their heating bills, according to the head of the Texas Department of Human Resour-

ces.

Human Resources Commissioner Marlin W. Johnston siad the assistance with paying utility bills is available to low-income households who in January 1983 received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Supplemental Security Income, or needs-tested Veterans Administration benefits in January.

ans Administration benefits in January.

Potentially eligible veterans are those who receive payments under 414, 521, 541, or 542 of Title 38 of the U.S. Code or under Section 306 of the Veterans and Survivors Pension Improve-Survivors Pension Improvement Act of 1978.

Eligibility is limited by gross income. For instance, aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$334.49 gross income per month. The gross in-come limit is \$546.49 for a



WHAT'S IN IT FOR YOU?


