An Open Letter

Gentlemen:
As we indicated on our recent visit to your community, our health care corporation, an administrative and financial group, is definitely interested in purchasing and acquiring the Blackwell Hospital of Gorman, Texas.

We feel we can provide a service to you and your community, a service which is not being provided at this time. We intend to provide you and the community with the best possible medical facility, one in which your community can take a great deal of pride.

We would like to take this opportunity to discuss several points of mutual interest which are important to you, the community and certainly to us.

First, we wish to state plainly that our group has never been affiliated with HMA, is not now affiliated with HMA and has no intention of ever being affiliated with HMA. There seems to have been some suspicion on the part of the community and some members of the board regarding this matter. Our group feels our aims, objectives and management philosophy differ 100% from that of HMA. For this reason, we further see no possibility and/or desire to ever enter into any working relationship with HMA.

Second, it is our intent to request the members of the board, existing as the time of purchase, to serve as members of the first advisory board to the hospital. We certainly welcome community input into the management philosophy of your hospital from both the advisory board as well as from the members of the community on the Board of Directors.

It is our feeling that an advisory board, as well as some members of the Board of Directors, consisting of members of the community, would be an important part of the continuing operation of this hospital. We certainly all recognize that the future success of your hospital depends solely on the complete cooperation between the hospital management, medical staff and the community as a whole. Without community representation by the advisory board, the management team has no way of gaining insight as to what the true community feeling might be on health related issues.

Third, it shall always be our aim to do everything reasonable, within our power, to secure and maintain an excellent relationship with the doctors of the community. They are certainly important to all of us. The success of any hospital depends upon a harmonious relationship between hospital management and the doctors of the community and surrounding areas.

Fourth, our group will hire qualified employees of the community. It is our understanding that Gorman and the surrounding area has a sufficient number of excellently qualified employees to provide the staffing of the hospital. It would appear unnecessary to look further in order to secure qualified employees. Any business enterprise existing in any community should not only seek to render a service to that community, but should ideally look to that community as a source of its employees. We would remind you that if we can help the economy of the city of Gorman to be healthy and strong, both the community and the hospital stand to profit. It is our aim to accomplish just that.

Finally it should be pointed out that we have dedicated substantial funds for working capital of the hospital and a sizeable portion will be expended for capital improvements. The finest doctor must rely on the equipment at hand in order to accurately diagnose and treat his patients. Perhaps some of the equipment in existence at this time desperately needs to be updated and/or replaced. We shall commence with that process the moment ownership is acquired.

CROP INSURANCE FOR PEANUTS

Because peanuts are a high-risk crop, with annual yields often fluctuating widely in dryland production, farmers need to consider some plan for risk reduction.

All-Risk Crop Insurance, available from a number of private insurance companies, can reduce the risk involved in peanut production. And a Microcomputer program known as ARCIE (All-Risk Crop Insurance Evaluation) has been developed to provide farmers with quick and concrete decision-making information, says Dr. Ashley Lovell of Stephenville, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

However, farmers need to act soon since the deadline for applying for crop insurance is mid-April, in familiar with and made no effort to understand. The people of Gorman have had good ethical service for many years from fine dedicated people who provide the best medical care and were proud of the quality of medicine they promoted. We knew what to expect about price, hospital behavior towards patients and doctors were proud of our physical plant.

It was the behavior of the H.M.A. who assumed the role of instructing the town about hospital that first affronted many of us through their own behavior towards us, and the Dr's Agulia also had been our good friends before H.M.A. came.

It was the people of Gorman who first came to the H.M.A. with complaints, about changes. Account complaints and delayed diagnostic procedures in the hospital after being examined by Dr's Agulia.

For ourselves, we saw the condition of deterioration.

We know you had a nursery and cribs - a fully equipped lab and a usable X-Ray machine in repair that took good pictures.

The people of Gorman noticed the change themselves. It was not the Dr's Agulia, but the people of Gorman who realized that better hospital care was cheaper elsewhere.

The board has responded to the people who elected them. It was after many had spoken to the H.M.A. about things they were dissatisfied with, that they asked Dr. Agulia if they could go elsewhere.

The board was not affected by the letters and innuendos published as paid advertisement in the Gorman Progress.

You published that Dr. Agulia was going to compete with the hospital lab and x-ray. The next week you wrote that, that was not so. Where did you get your information for both letters.

Most people who are patients of Dr. Agulia would gladly have helped you understand that most doctors offices have a diagnostic laboratory in their offices. Why did you not know that?

The letters written by your staff told us one week that unless you were managers we probably could not get passed by a medical inspection. The next week you published that one hospital could pass inspection if they qualified. Why the difference in your attitude?

Gorman hospital passed Medicare inspection many times when you were not here - it can be done again.

You, Yourselfs have convinced many of us by your innuendoes about people who have always tried together to keep this hospital open and working - No matter who tried to take it from us by one way or another.

We want our doctors and our hospital, not people you chose and management you think you can manipulate us into accepting. These people understand what a good hospital is. They have had one for many years in Gorman and will have one again one day.

most cases. "Before ARCIE was available, the evaluation of yield coverage and indemnity price elections was a difficult and time-consuming task," Lovell says. "ARCIE has reduced that burden."

Over the years, farm management economists and farmers have identified and tried many strategies for reducing price and yield risks, Lovell says. Among these have been diversification, contracting, maintaining flexibility in cost structures, dispersing the farm operation over a geographical area, and intensification of production inputs such as irrigation.

"Though the list of strategies is relatively easy to identify, the economic evaluation of each strategy is more involved," he says.

All-Risk, or Multiple Peril, Crop Insurance is now a viable alternative for managing yield risk in peanut production, contends Lovell.

The ARCIE computer program is designed to help the farmers decide whether he needs crop insurance, and if so, what level of coverage he should choose. Twenty options are available to peanut farmers under the insurance program.

For ARCIE to evaluate all the options of All-Risk Crop Insurance, specific data are required based on the peanut farmer's production budget for the crop as well as his cash flow and the market situation, explains the economist.

The interpretation of the computer output on cash flow with each option requires careful consideration and weighing of the trade-offs between risk protection and cash flow, he warns.

The economist gives one example of how crop insurance might apply. "If the financial situation of the farm is weak enough that it could not stand some loss in cash flow, and if it is probable that yields will be low, a high level of insurance coverage is the only alternative to protect against a negative cash flow," says Lovell.

"However, if the farm is financially sound and yields will be high, a lower level of protection will limit the yield risk protection but will allow higher yields to produce higher cash flows," he adds.

Since each farm's production system is different, ARCIE can help producers evaluate their individual situation regarding crop insurance.

AGRIBUSINESS IS 'BIG' BUSINESS

Without question, agriculture is big business in Texas as well as across the nation. But the agribusiness sector that supports the nation's corps of food and fiber producers also does a high volume business.

"Of the more than \$300 billion consumers spent last year for domestically produced farm foods, about \$215 billion was for services rendered by the so-called 'middleman,'" points out Dr. Forrest Stegelin, agribusiness economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

This dollar volume for services added between the farm and the retail establishment where consumers purchased the final product accounts for 72 cents of every \$1 spent by consumers, notes the economist. The remaining 28 cents goes to the farmer.

"The agribusiness sector not only turns raw agricultural items into ready-to-buy products, but also supplies inputs to generate a long line of raw farm products," notes Stegelin.

From an employment standpoint, agriculture is the nation's largest employer. Farming and agribusiness combined employ more than 15 million people, with two-thirds of these involved in storing, transporting, processing

SALMON LOAF
1 pound can salmon
1/2 cup bread crumbs

2 egg yolks
1 teaspoon chopped parsley
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup hot milk
2 egg whites
2 tablespoons melted butter
Remove skin and bones from salmon - add all ingredients except egg whites. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites, bake in buttered mold in moderate oven 1 hour. Paprika sprinkled on top.
