


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According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is, currently estimated

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

# Transportation plan OK'd

EASTLAND — County Commissioners Monday endorsed a countywide transportation program for elderly and poor residents.

People receiving Medicare and Medicaid benefits will be eligible for the service for a small fee or at no cost at all.

The program will be supervised by Central Texas Opportunities Inc., and will be modeled after a similar program run by People for Progress in Sweetwater. Vans will be subcontracted from People for Progress, including one with equipment to accommodate wheelchairs.

An Eastland County coordinator will take appointments for doctor visits, grocery shopping trips and for bus connections inside the county and outside as well. No taxi service is now available in the county.

County Judge Scott Bailey said, "The need for this transportation is definitely there."

Commissioners hope the statefunded program can be operational by Dec. 1

In other business, after a discussion, commissioners voted to pay for repairs to a computer in the sheriff's department.

# THE GORDON SPOT

Fruit trees have not been very productive for the past three years in Eastland County due to late spring freezes and other weather related conditions. However, we are always optimistic that next season will be the one when we get that good fruit crop. Therefore, we need to take good care of our fruit trees.

Now is a crucial time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.

By applying a copper fungicide now we can stop or reduce three of the diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker.

Puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is in the fall with a copper-containing fungicide.

Timing of the spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage. Copper is a metal and may cause severe defoliation unless applied correctly.

Spray when 70 percent of the leaves fall off the tree. Spraying too eraly will cause leaf shed or cause the spray to be ineffective later.

Fungicides containing chlorothalonil (Bravo or Daconil) can also be used for the control of peach leaf curl.

Bacterial leaf spot and bacterial

canker can be partially controlled by fall spraying with a copper fungicide, but not fungicides containing chlorothalonil. But again, it's important to spray at the right time to prevent foliar burn with the copper fungicides.

Bacterial leaf spot affects both fruit and foliage. The infection causes fruit to crack and leaves develop angular spots which drop out. Bacterial canker will kill trees slowly. Infected trees will have gum or wax forming on the trunk and limbs.

The fall spray in this area of the state is applied from November 1 to December 1. The fall spraying is important to the health and production of fruit trees because there is no

other time when peach leaf curl of peach and plum trees can be controlled.

Fire ants are very active in several areas of Eastland County now. This is a pest we must deal with from now on. We have an Extension publication "Fire Ants and Their Control", which list a large number of insecticide products registered for fire ant control.














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

The Eastland County pecan crop is better than was expected says De-Marquis Gordon, Eastland County Extension Agent. The supply of native pecans will be small, but local growers of improved varieties report a good crop with excellent quality.

The best of these pecans will compete in the 36th Annual Eastland County Pecan Show in the courthouse lobby Tuesday, November 29th. Pecan entries are due to be entered by 4 p. m. November 28th. Pecan entries will be weighed and shelled on Tuesday morning. They will be judged Tuesday afternoon and will be on display until 3 p. m. on

Wednesday. The show is sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. Chamber members will help shell pecan entries for

the judging. The pecan show will include a bake show featuring delicious pecan pies, cakes, candy, nutbreads, and cookies on Tuesday, Nov. 29th. There will also be a pecan centerpiece class. James Wright, Chamber manager, invites everyone to come and see the best quality pecans in Texas, as well as prize winning baked goods.

The first county pecan show in the Unites States was held in Eastland County in 1952, according to Gordon. This educational program has grown in interest over the years. There are approximately 70 county pecan shows with over 100 counties partici-

Four reg ional pecan shows arnow held for the nearly 1,500 winning entries from the county shows. These regional shows are the "Show Window" of the Texas Pecan Industry. They demonstrate the superior quality of Texas pecans and play a major role in the evaluation of new varieties. Many other states from New Mexico to Alabama have pecan shows patterned after the original one that began here 36 years

Anyone who grows pecans are invited to enter pecans in the county show says Charles Walker, President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. A minimum of 43 pecans are necessary for each entry. This sample of 43 should represent the variety or individual seedling tree and be uniform in size and shell color. There will also be a class for the smallest pecans.

Plaques will be given for the three champion entries - Inshell, shelling, and native. Rosettes will go to the exhibitors of reserve champions and ribbons will be awarded to the first three place entries of each variety.
