

Carl Baugh To Speak May 1 At **New Hope Baptist**

Dr. Carl Baugh, director of Creation Evidences Museum and Archaeological Excavations at Glen Rose, will be speaking at New Hope Baptist Church on Sunday, May 1 at 10 a. m., 11 a. m. and 7 p. m.

Dr. Baugh's work along the Paluxy River near Glen Rose continues to receive international attention in the scientific community.

The most significant recent find is that of a fossilized human tooth in the same sedimentary layer as that of dinosaur footprints. This clearly demonstrates that man and dinosaur existed together on the earth. According to the evolutionary model, man and dinosaur were separated by tens of millions of years.

Dr. Baugh will be giving a report on the further evidences discovered on the Paluxy which support the creation model and refute the evolutionary model. He will also be reporting on the progress of the construction of the new museum which will house all of the exhibits including two dinosaurs that have been excavated along the Paluxy.

The public is invited to attend and hear firsthand of the mounting evidence that shows the fallacy of the entire evolutionary hypothesis.

Minutes were read and approved. The Commission approved the purchase of a 37180 (low band) radio for the Fire Department's Jeep. The

cost will be about \$410.00. Salary adjustments for the coming year were addressed, but was tabled at least until the next meeting.

The Commission re-appointed Dale Curb for another two year term to the Water Board. Bruce Hirst is the other city representative on the Water Board. I would like to express the appreciation of the Commission and myself for the good job these two men have done for Gorman on the

The City had the permit request for the North Sewer Plant returned, pending further information. The Commission had requested permission to install a lift pump and move the effuent from the North Plant to the South Plant. We were told that of our daily average flow was such that we would not exceed the allowable daily flow at the South Plant that this might be done. The Commission decided if our other measurements deded to take another flow measurement each hour for two days to determine if our other measurements were correct. We also voted to get Frank Kirk, a consultant in waste water, to come up and look at our plants and make some recommendations. Mr. Kirk came on Monday and will be presenting his findings to the Commission on May 9 at the first meeting in May. We will be meeting the 9th rather than the 5th so that the election returns may be canvassed and the new officials be sworn in.

The City accepted a street easement from Arlton Smith on the street just north of the nursing home. We also granted an easement to Delton Keesee to the alley just east of the Exxon Station.

It is time to renew the lease with the cable company on the land around the tower. When the franchise was granted, the company agreed to pay \$1.00 per year for five years and to have the option to renew that lease for ten more years. The lease agreement made by the Commission is a ten year lease at \$500.00 per year. We feel we made a good



THE GORDON

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent

This week, April 24-May 1, is Soil and Water Stewardship Week. The theme of this year's observance is "Stewardship Is Our Futrue." This focus is especially appropriate as our need for stewardship is vital if we are to maintain the productive capabilities of our basic natural resources of soil and water. Together we must work for the good of all to utilize, conserve and properly manage those resources in our care. It is a good time for us to reflect on the nation's renewable resource problems and consider actions to resolve or reduce their impact.

Soil and Water Conservation Districts have sponsored Soil and Water Stewardship Week in the United States since 1955. The decision to set aside a week each year to acknowledge before God our gratitude for His gifts of soil and all the bountiful resources associated with it has met an evident need of a great many people. This week has become a special tine to remind all people that these gifts of the Creator warrant their best in creative conservation and considerate management.

With hot, dry weather looming ahead, homeowners and others involved in landscape development should focus on water conservation.

Water conservation can be practiced in all areas of landscape development and maintenance, including plant selection, irrigation practices and equipment, and soil preparations. These practices can be

aesthetic as well as practical. You can lower your landscape water usage in several ways:

Use native and adapted plants.

Native plants often thrive on existing growth conditions and reduce the need for extra irrigation. Many plants have been introduced that show adaptability to soil, rainfall and temperaturee conditions. Take advantage of innovations in

irrigation practices and equipment. The landscape irrigation is experiencing a revolution, with new timing devices, low pressure systems, drip irrigation and other highly specialized water devices focusing on more efficient water usage. Irrigation systems and small ponds and fountains also can effectively use water as an aesthetic addition to a landscape.

Use mulches for insulation. By providing an insulation layer between the sun and soil, mulches prevent rapid drying and lower soil temperature in hot weather, which keeps the top soil from crusting or hardening. Low-cost materials such as hay, grass clippings, bark and pine needles are excellent for mulching and can add appeal with texture and color.

Properly prepare this soil. When soil has been loosened and improved with plenty of organic material, such as peat, pine bark or compost, it will hold significantly more moisture and release it over a longer period of time. However, organic materials break down over time and need to be supplemented. A compost pile can be a good source of these materials allowing the homeowner to recycle leaves, grass clippings and other waste to improve the soil.

These are just a few practices that homeowners can use to significantly reduce water usage in their outdoor environment.

Mid-Year Crop and Livestock **Reports Needed**

Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1988 planted acreage estimates and mid-year livestock inventories.

"These surveys are very important this year because they will be the first measure of the impact of the changes in the 1988 national farm program," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"Information from these surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their production and marketing plans in light of these changes.'

Individual reports will be combined with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1988 acreage forecast will be published July 12, and the mid-year cattle inventory will be published July 29.

"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley added.



Exemption Deadline Nears For Homestead Status

Residential property owners within Eastland County are reminded that the deadline to apply for a residential homestead exemption is May 2, 1988.

If a person owned and resided in a residence on January 1, 1988; he or she may qualify for this type of exemption. The homestead exemption is in the amount of \$5000 of taxable value for homeowners under age 65. For those homeowners over 65 or who are disabled, the exemption is an additional \$10,000.

It is emphasized that only those homeowners who have never applied for an exemption or who have changed residences since their original application need apply. If you have been receiving a homestead exemption and have not changed the status of your residence in anyway; there is no need to submit a new application.

Owners of mobile homes are eligible for the homestead exemption even if the home is located on a leased or rented lot. A copy of the
